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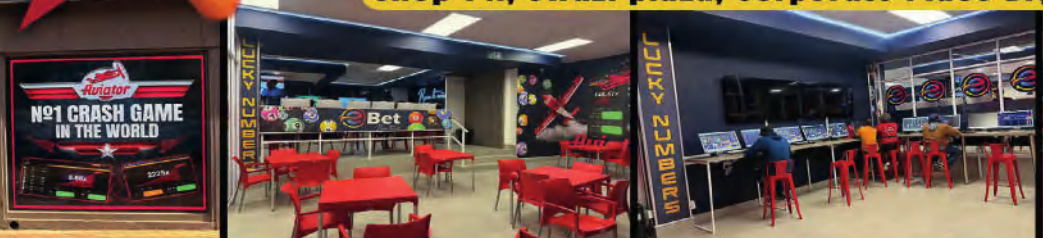


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His Majesty King Mswati III unveils bold emissions reduction target

NEW YORK, USA - His Majesty King Mswati III has announced Eswatini's plan to reduce 2.24 million tonnes of greenhouse gas emissions by 2035.

He has also revealed that the country is among the first 10 countries to submit its Paris Agreement-compliant NDC 3.0 plan to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change. The plan outlines programmes, resources and a clear plan to achieve this target by 2035.

Speaking at a high-level event on Climate Change on the sidelines of the 80th United Nations General Assembly on Wednesday, His Majesty said despite the Kingdom's low emissions, it remains committed to the Paris Agreement.

To meet this goal, His Majesty revealed that Eswatini would need approximately E43 billion (US\$2.4 billion). "Despite this, Eswatini comes to this meeting determined to turn vulnerability into resilience. We are pleased to announce that we have concluded and submitted the Paris Agreement-compliant NDC 3.0," he said, noting the Kingdom was among 10 African nations meeting the September deadline, supported by the local UN Office and partners.

The NDC 3.0 revision was comprehensive and inclusive, with locally driven greenhouse gas data demonstrating national ownership. Lessons from NDC 2.0 and meaningful dialogues shaped the robust report, aligned with the 2023-2028 National Development Plan and the long-term Low Emissions Development Strategy. "Eswatini will reform laws and strengthen all institutions to improve capacity, accountability, monitoring and reporting," His Majesty said.

Financial constraints limited NDC 2.0, which targeted US\$900 million (E16.2 billion) to US\$1.5 billion (E27 billion), raising only US\$449 million (E8.1 billion) since 2018. The NDC 3.0's E43 billion cost requires scaled-up, predictable climate finance. "Thus, we expect stronger collaboration with our partners, including

the local private sector, to finance the US\$2 billion (E36 billion) gap," the King said.

"Eswatini will remain a net carbon sink and reduce 2.24 million tonnes of greenhouse gas emissions by 2035. We will also invest in climate-smart agriculture and technology. Early warning systems, water resource management, waste management and infrastructure will be improved to protect our most vulnerable society," he stated. A just energy transition will promote affordable, clean technologies and a low-

carbon, climate-resilient economy.

Green finance instruments and incentives will align financial flows with climate priorities to attract sustainable investment.

A Sendai-aligned Disaster Risk Management Fund will enhance risk financing and reporting, while renewable energy and digital tools are prioritised. "Climate-smart technologies should be affordable for farmers, homeowners and entrepreneurs after the loss and damage

fund is recapitalised," His Majesty said.

"Eswatini cares about survival and opportunity. With the right support, the country can turn climate challenges into green growth, food sovereignty and shared prosperity," he concluded.

China's President Xi Jinping, addressing the session via video link, supported the Paris Agreement, committing to a 10 per cent emissions reduction by 2033, countering US President Donald Trump's claims about China's green technology practices.

A distinguished delegation from Taiwan's tourism sector is scheduled to visit the Kingdom of Eswatini from September 26 to October 1, 2025, marking a significant move to deepen bilateral cooperation in tourism.

This high-level delegation comprises executives from some of Taiwan's foremost travel agencies and hotel groups, alongside representatives from the Taiwan Hotel Association. According to a press release by Eswatini Tourism Authority, their visit aims to foster direct collaboration with Eswatini's local tourism operators and to gain firsthand experience of the country's unique attractions and hospitality offerings.

The Taiwanese delegation includes leaders from Richmond Tours, CP Travel Service, South East Travel, YS Travel, Discovered Travel Service, Lion Travel, Phoenix Tours, Leofoo Tourism Group, and Colourful Tour Travel Agency. This diverse group reflects Taiwan's strategic intent to build robust tourism partnerships with Eswatini, leveraging the country's rich cultural heritage and natural beauty to enhance mutual tourism flows.

The visit will commence with a Tourism Partnership Briefing on September 26, hosted at the Hilton Mbabane. The event will feature opening remarks by Ching-lin

Tsuei, Minister of the Taiwan Embassy, who will highlight the importance of tourism as a bridge for cultural exchange and economic development between the two nations. Vusie Dlamini, CEO of the Eswatini Tourism Authority, will present an overview of Eswatini's tourism landscape, accompanied by insights from representatives of the Hospitality and Tourism Association of Eswatini (HOTAES) and the Eswatini Tour Guides and Tours Operators Association (ENTOTOGA). This briefing aims to set the stage for fruitful dialogue and collaboration.

Throughout their stay, the delegation will undertake extensive cultural and natural site visits to iconic destinations

such as Sibebe Rock, one of the largest exposed granite domes in the world, and the Malolotja Nature Reserve, renowned for its breathtaking landscapes and biodiversity. Visits to Hlane National Park and Mlilwane Wildlife Sanctuary will provide immersive wildlife experiences, while the Mantenga Cultural Village will offer a deep dive into Eswatini's rich traditions and cultural heritage. The delegation will also explore prominent craft hubs including Swazi Candles and Ngwenya Glass, showcasing the nation's artisanal craftsmanship and potential for cultural tourism development.

In addition to site visits, the delegation will conduct thorough inspections of

key hospitality facilities. These include the Hilton Garden Inn, Summerfield, Sibebe Resort, Mountain Inn, Mantenga Lodge, and Happy Valley. These tours will facilitate direct engagement with Eswatini's hospitality industry leaders, enabling discussions on service excellence, infrastructure development, and joint marketing strategies aimed at attracting Taiwanese and international tourists.

A pivotal moment of the visit will be the official courtesy call on September 29 with the Acting Minister of Tourism. This high-level meeting will focus on exploring practical avenues for enhanced cooperation, including exchange programs, joint promotional campaigns, and potential investments in tourism infrastructure. Both parties are expected to express optimism about expanding tourist arrivals and the broader economic benefits that can result from a strengthened partnership.

This visit highlights the growing momentum in Taiwan-Eswatini relations, with tourism emerging as a key sector for bilateral collaboration. The delegation's direct engagement with Eswatini's travel stakeholders and their firsthand experience of the country's natural beauty, cultural richness, and hospitality infrastructure are poised to pave the way for sustainable partnerships. These efforts promise to expand tourist flows, stimulate economic growth, and deepen cultural ties between Taiwan and Eswatini.

King urges UN to form ad hoc committees for global peace

NEW YORK, USA - His Majesty King Mswati III has called for the United Nations to establish ad hoc committees to mediate the global conflicts.

Addressing the 80th General Assembly. The King proposed these committees to tackle escalating global tensions, reinforcing the UN's founding mission to foster peace. He urged the committees, to be supported by the UN Secretariat, to visit conflict zones and engage directly with communities to broker solutions.

Focusing on Africa, His Majesty highlighted conflicts in Sudan, South Sudan, Somalia, the Sahel, and the Great Lakes, advocating for equitable representation to ensure all affected nations have a voice.

In the Middle East, he suggested the committees facilitate dialogue, asking Palestinians what it would take to release hostages and Israelis what would halt bombardments, to prevent further loss of life and property.

Pathways

Regarding the Russia-Ukraine conflict, the King proposed that the committees mediate discussions to identify peace pathways and provide actionable recommendations to the UN. "We must remind ourselves that when the United Nations was established in 1945, it was during a time of widespread global strife," he said.

"Now is the time to ask ourselves what has gone wrong and what steps must be taken to correct these challenges." He emphasised that this approach complements existing peace efforts, warning against actions that escalate tensions. "Millions of lives have already been lost during the Covid-19 pandemic. We therefore,

cannot afford to lose any more to conflicts," he added.

The King also addressed UN Security Council reform, Sustainable Development

Goals, digital transformation, health rights, disaster resilience, and empowerment of youth, women, and persons with disabilities, aligning with the theme "Better Together."

Ezulwini consensus reform of UN security council urgent

NEW YORK, USA - His Majesty King Mswati III has renewed calls for restructuring the United Nations Security Council to ensure inclusive representation, during his UN address. Speaking at the 80th General Assembly on 25 September 2025, the King stressed that the UN must represent all member states through regionally balanced decisions, warning that without reform, its legitimacy and effectiveness remain incomplete.

This position aligns with the Ezulwini Consensus, the African Union's common stance on UN reform adopted in 2005 in Ezulwini, Eswatini. The Consensus demands at least two permanent seats for Africa with veto power, plus five non-permanent seats, to address historical injustices and enhance Africa's role in global security.

Originating from an Extraordinary Session of the AU Executive Council in Addis Ababa, the Ezulwini Consensus also tackles broader threats like HIV/AIDS, poverty, and environmental degradation, advocating debt relief for indebted nations and curbs on small arms trade.

It emphasises a cautious approach to the Responsibility to Protect, safeguarding state sovereignty, and supports UN funding for regional peacekeeping, including a Peacebuilding Commission.

The subsequent Sirte Declaration in July 2005 reinforced these demands, underscoring Africa's push for a democratic, equitable UN system.

This call comes amid global conflicts, with the King proposing ad hoc committees for peace mediation, complementing Security Council enhancements.

... Eswatini calls for Taiwan's UN inclusion

NEW YORK, USA - His Majesty reiterated Eswatini's stance on Taiwan's participation in the UN system.

"The United Nations General Assembly Resolution 2758, adopted in 1971, did not address the issue of Taiwan's representation in the United Nations, and it does not preclude their participation in the UN system," he stated.

"The United Nations must seek suitable ways of including Taiwan so that it can better contribute to realising the UN Sustainable Development Goals. In that way, this will fulfil the UN mandate to ensure that no country is left behind."

This call reiterates Eswatini's ongoing advocacy for Taiwan's inclusion to enhance global cooperation and sustainable development efforts.

Encouraging strides in SDGs amid challenges

NEW YORK, USA - The Kingdom of Eswatini has reported notable progress on several Sustainable Development Goals(SDGs).

In his speech at the 80th UN General Assembly yesterday, His Majesty the King highlighted advancements in pursuit of the aspirations of Agenda 2030, particularly in economic sectors, health, education and gender equality.

He said through his national call of "Nkwe" for urgency in sustainable development, Eswatini has improved literacy rates and empowered citizens via targeted

programmes.

He pointed out that the country's GDP has shown growth, and so have initiatives to attract investments and expand trading opportunities, including access to regional and international markets. Eswatini is actively pursuing digital transformation as a catalyst for development, opening doors for partnerships with advanced nations in technology.

On health, he said the kingdom was proud of the progress under SDG 3, welcoming the ratification of the Pandemic Treaty to bolster preparedness against future emergencies.

He said efforts in disaster resilience address the increasing frequency of natural disasters, integrating humanitarian relief with long-term development.

He further highlighted that empowerment of youth, women and persons with disabilities remains a priority, tackling unemployment and inequality through UN-supported programmes that create enabling environments.

"However, challenges persist, including a fragile global economy, inflation, and debt servicing burdens diverting resources from social programmes," he lamented,

saying Sub-Saharan Africa, including Eswatini, spends an average of 12 per cent of government revenues on debt, hindering SDG acceleration.

His Majesty called for UN support to elevate Eswatini to advanced economy status, advocating for trade facilitation and diversification through the African Continental Free Trade Area (AfCFTA), which could boost intra-African trade by up to 52 per cent.

With only five years to Agenda 2030, the King called for redoubled international efforts, noting how global progress is off track with only 17 per cent of targets on course.

Mutharika declared Malawi's

PROFESSOR Arthur Peter Mutharika has been declared the winner of Malawi's 2025 presidential election, securing a decisive victory to return to the State House as the country's seventh President.

The Malawi Electoral Commission (MEC) announced the results on Wednesday evening, following a thorough verification process and resolution of post-election complaints.

Out of 7.2 million registered voters, 5.5 million cast their ballots, representing a turnout of 76.4%. Mutharika, leader of the Democratic Progressive Party (DPP), polled 3,035,249 votes, representing 56.8 per cent of the valid votes cast.

His closest challenger, incumbent President Dr Lazarus McCarthy Chakwera of the Malawi Congress Party (MCP), secured 1,765,170 votes, or 33 per cent.

Seventeen candidates contested the presidency, but the race largely came down to Mutharika and Chakwera. UTM Party candidate Dr Dalitso Kabambe finished a dis-

tant third with 211,413 votes (4 per cent).

Former President Joyce Banda of the People's Party attracted 86,106 votes (1.6 per cent).

Meanwhile, MEC Chairperson Justice Annabel Mtalimanja stated that the results reflected the will of the Malawian people. "The Commission has meticulously followed the entire electoral process based on the law that governs elections in Malawi. We assess that this presidential election was free and fair and that these results are a true reflection of the will of the people," she said.

District-by-district results underlined Mutharika's dominance. He won overwhelmingly in the Southern Region, including Mangochi (257,098 votes), Blantyre (118,691 votes) and Phalombe (134,205 votes). Chakwera, however, held strong in the Central Region, winning Lilongwe (511,625 votes), Kasungu (160,210 votes) and Mchinji (126,187 votes).

Despite some polling anomalies and more than 155,000 void votes, the Commission said these did not affect the outcome. "It is the voter who decides who wins the election," Mtalimanja said.

The Commission noted that the President-elect cannot be sworn in

before the expiry of seven days and not later than 30 days after the results are declared, in line with the Constitution.

In her closing remarks, Justice Mtalimanja urged Malawians to ac-

cept the outcome peacefully.

"What binds us together as Malawians is much stronger than what separates us into political parties. Let us all work together to give our future generations a stronger and

prosperous Malawi," she said.

With this victory, Mutharika returns to lead Malawi five years after leaving office, carrying the hopes of millions of voters who endorsed his comeback.

Chakwera concedes defeat, commits to peaceful transition

OUTGOING President Dr Lazarus McCarthy Chakwera has conceded defeat in Malawi's 2025 general election, congratulating Professor Arthur Peter Mutharika on his victory and pledging a peaceful transfer of power.

In a national address delivered from Kamuzu Palace hours before the Malawi Electoral Commission (MEC) announced the final tally, Chakwera acknowledged that his main rival had secured an insurmountable lead.

"A moment ago, I called Professor Mutharika directly to congratulate him on his historic victory and to wish him well in his upcoming tenure as the seventh President of the Republic of Malawi," Chakwera said.

While acknowledging the disappointment of

his supporters, Chakwera said respect for the constitution and the will of the majority demanded that he step aside.

"Regardless of whether or not you voted, and regardless of how you voted, if you are a Malawian citizen anywhere in the world, I want to thank you for conducting yourself throughout this election in a peaceful, orderly and lawful manner," he said.

The outgoing leader assured Malawians of a smooth handover. He revealed he had instructed his team to work with the incoming administration to ensure continuity of services and stability. "I am fully committed to facilitating a peaceful transfer of power," he said.

Chakwera praised the MEC for its handling of the polls, singling out Chairperson Justice An-

nel Mtalimanja throughout the process.

He, however, urged the Commission to follow through on addressing anomalies detected in some districts, noting that accountability would strengthen Malawi's democracy. The president also called for unity behind his successor. "Professor Mutharika's success in leading our nation towards prosperity will depend on all of us standing as one people," Chakwera said. Chakwera concluded by thanking Malawians for entrusting him with the presidency over the past five years.

"I will forever be grateful for the privilege to serve as your sixth President. What matters now is for all of us to work together as one nation to make Malawi better, because that's how we will all be winners in the end," he said.

PROFESSOR Arthur Peter Mutharika has been confirmed as the Seventh President of the Republic of Malawi following the 2025 General Election, capping a process that has been widely praised by regional observers for its adherence to law and exceptional peacefulness. The Southern African Development Community (SADC) has issued a robust statement endorsing the outcome, highlighting the successful conclusion of the electoral period. The SADC Electoral Observation Mission (SEOM) confirmed that the election, held on September 16th to elect the President, Members of Parliament, and Councillors, was conducted in a peaceful and orderly manner. The SEOM, being His Majesty King Mswati III noted that the Malawi Electoral Commission diligently processed all results in strict accordance with the stipulated electoral law, lending strong legitimacy to the final tally announced on the evening of September 24th, 2025.

His Majesty hails Malawi for democratic maturity

However, the defining moment of the transition came hours before the final official announcement. Incumbent President H.E. Dr Lazarus McCarthy Chakwera demonstrated remarkable statesmanship by addressing the nation at midday on September 24. Dr Chakwera acknowledged his main contender, Professor Mutharika, had secured an insurmountable lead and was the presumptive winner of the presidential election. In a significant display of democratic maturity, President Chakwera informed the nation that he had personally called Professor Mutharika to congratulate him. The official statement, issued under the highest regional authority, underscores the importance of the peaceful transition. His Majesty King Mswati III in his capacity as the Incoming Chairperson of the SADC Organ on Politics, Defence and Security Co-operation, released the statement regarding the outcome. He formally acknowledged the crucial finding of the SEOM.

King commends peaceful election

THE Southern African Development Community (SADC) has praised Malawi for conducting its 2025 general election in a peaceful and orderly manner, describing the process as a model of democratic maturity in the region. In a statement delivered on Wednesday by His Majesty King Mswati III of Eswatini, the incoming Chairperson of the SADC Organ on Politics, Defence and Security Co-operation, the regional bloc commended both Malawians and their leaders for upholding democratic values throughout the polls. The SADC Electoral Observation Mission (SEOM), which deployed monitors across the country, said the election and post-election period had been calm, with Malawians displaying patience as results were processed. Govt plans to upgrade Good Shepherd College into University

MINISTER of Education and Training, Owen Nxumalo, has revealed that the government is working towards transforming Good Shepherd College of Nursing into a fully-fledged university. This development is expected to greatly expand higher education opportunities in the health sector and beyond.

Speaking during the official opening of the Inter-Regional Meeting of Catholic Bishops of Southern Africa (IMBISA) Golden Jubilee Conference at Esibayeni Lodge, Nxumalo said the proposed upgrade is part of the government's long-term strategy to broaden access to tertiary education and to strengthen Eswatini's capacity in producing skilled professionals.

"The government has committed itself to invest in institutions of higher learning, and we are currently working towards upgrading Good Shepherd College into a university," said Nxumalo. "This will not only cater for our nation's health workforce needs but also contribute to academic research and development."

The Minister explained that the move comes at a time when the country is experiencing an increasing demand for specialised training in nursing, medicine, and allied health professions. By upgrading the college, students will have access to advanced degree programmes without the need to seek further training outside the country.

Nxumalo further highlighted that the establishment of a new university will complement existing institutions such as the University of Eswatini (UNESWA) and Southern Africa Nazarene University (SANU), thereby expanding the higher education landscape in the Kingdom.

Education experts welcomed the announcement, saying the upgrade would ease



the pressure on the few existing universities and open new pathways for research, innovation, and professional growth. Health sector stakeholders have also praised the idea, pointing out that Eswatini's health system needs more qualified professionals to meet growing population demands.

A student nurse at Good Shepherd College, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said: "This is encouraging news for us. Currently, we must look outside the country if we want to pursue postgraduate studies. Having a university here at home will save us costs and keep us closer to our families."

Good Shepherd College, located in Siteki, is a Catholic Church-owned institution with a long history of training nurses and mid-

wives for Eswatini and the region. The Minister's announcement was therefore fitting, as it was made in the presence of more than 120 Catholic bishops from Southern Africa who had gathered for the IMBISA Jubilee celebrations.

Father Ncamiso Vilakati, Media Liaison Officer of the Roman Catholic Church in Eswatini, said the church was pleased with the government's commitment.

"The Catholic Church has always placed education and healthcare at the heart of its mission. The news that Good Shepherd will be upgraded into a university affirms the church's long-standing contribution to nation-building," he said.

Correctional Services athlete wins LaMgabhi Army recruitment race

THE LaMgabhi community erupted in cheers on Thursday afternoon as Ncamiso Hlatjwako (34), an accomplished athlete and member of His Majesty's Correctional Services Athletic Team, crossed the finish line first in the army recruitment race. On the women's side, Neliswa Mabuza (23) clinched victory, completing the 3.2-kilometre course ahead of dozens of her competitors.

The race, which drew over one hundred eager participants, formed part of the ongoing nationwide Umbutfo Eswatini Defence Force (UEDF) recruitment exercise. Candidates were tested on their stamina, speed, and determination qualities essential for military service.

Hlatjwako, who has balanced his career as an athlete and employee with Montigny Investments since 2020, said preparation was key to his victory.

"I had prepared for this race, and I am grateful my hard work paid off," he told Eswatini Daily News (EDN) shortly after the event. "I also recently won a marathon race in the Republic of South Africa, and that gave me confidence coming into this competition."

Beyond his athletic prowess, Hlatjwako is

Tariffs could weaken dollar's reserve status

THE massive tariffs proposed by President Donald Trump on "Liberation Day" in April put the U.S. dollar's role as the world's anchor currency at risk, while the administration's eventual climbdown to more modest rates has likely left it secure, new economic research has concluded.

THE Public Service Pensions Fund (PSPF) has announced a significant milestone, confirming that its Net Surplus has surpassed the E3 billion threshold for the year ended March 31, 2025.

This achievement was revealed on Thursday at the PSPF Annual Stakeholder Engagement Forum, held at the Mbabane Hilton Hotel.

The financial data, presented to stakeholders, showed the fund's Net Surplus rising from an estimated E2, 897,445,643 in the 2024 fiscal year to an estimated E3, 007,786,301 in 2025.

This increase represents a robust growth of approximately 3.81 per cent, solidifying the fund's commitment to ensuring long-term financial stability for its members.

Lawrence Nsibande, the Director of Finance for PSPF, who presented the income statement, underscored the significance of the results, attributing the growth to a combination of prudent asset management and favorable market movements.

"This is a landmark moment for the Public Service Pensions Fund. To have grown our Net Surplus to over E3 billion is a testament to the resilient financial strategies we have implemented and our unwavering commitment to the financial security of every public servant in Eswatini," he said.

In addition, he said, the 3.81 per cent growth year-on-year, against a challenging global economic backdrop, shows the health of our portfolio and the dedicated efforts of the team to maximise returns for our members.

A deep dive into the income statement highlights the key drivers of the Fund's enhanced performance.

A major contributor was the substantial

growth in Fair Value Adjustments, which surged from E2, 897,278,242 in 2024 to an estimated E3,764,657,893 in 2025.

This significant jump suggests successful revaluations and appreciation across the Fund's investment holdings, including property and equities.

Furthermore, the Fund saw a healthy growth in its core Investment Income and Sundry

figures, which rose from E1, 337,366,425 to E1, 404,216,252.

This is critical as investment income remains the lifeblood of any pension fund, ensuring sufficient capital to meet future obligations.

Nsibande also pointed to the Fund's commitment to its primary mandate, noting the increase in Benefits Awarded and Accrued. The payments grew from E1, 565,768,398 in 2024 to E1, 641,609,302 in 2025.

"While we focus on growth, our ultimate responsibility is to our beneficiaries," Nsibande added.

"The increased amount paid out in benefits demonstrates that as the fund grows, so too does our capacity to deliver an excellent, memorable retirement service experience. We are not just growing numbers; we are securing livelihoods for thousands of families across the Kingdom," he added.

The presentation also addressed key expenditure lines. The financial statement indicated that while Administration Expenses saw a notable increase, the overall Net Revenue remained manageable, reflecting the comprehensive nature of the Fund's operations as it continues to expand its service delivery and operational capacity.

The positive movement in the Net Surplus provides a strong foundation for PSPF to continue its mission of protecting and growing the retirement savings of Eswatini's public servant.

PSPF investment portfolio reveals 6-point shortfall

THE Public Service Pensions Fund (PSPF) has revealed a significant gap between its strategic targets and actual investments, with the Fund falling short of its goal to allocate 50% of its portfolio to the Eswatini domestic market.

A slide presented during the PSPF Annual Stakeholder Engagement Forum outlined the Fund's Investment Strategy, showing that while the Strategic Allocation for Eswatini was set at 50%, the Actual Allocation stood at 44%.

This 6-percentage point shortfall immediately drew attention, given the importance of domestic investment in driving national economic growth and development.

The 50% strategic domestic allocation reflects a policy commitment by the Fund to utilise its vast capital to catalyse job creation and infrastructural development within the Kingdom. However, the data confirms the persistent challenges PSPF faces in finding sufficient attractive, liquid, and high-yielding investment instruments within the relatively small local market.

The actual portfolio allocation figures show a clear shift of capital

that was intended for the domestic market into the region's most mature economy.

The slide indicated that PSPF's investment in South Africa vastly exceeded its strategic target:

South Africa Strategic Allocation: 30%

South Africa Actual Allocation: 37%

This 7-percentage point over-allocation in South Africa strongly

suggests that investment opportunities were sourced across the border when suitable, high-quality projects failed to materialise within Eswatini.

The strategic necessity of balancing national development goals with the fiduciary duty to achieve optimal returns for members appears to have been guided by market realities. The remaining international allocation, labelled

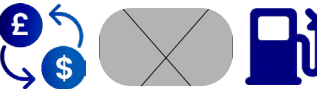
Offshore, was largely on target, with a strategic goal of 20% and an actual allocation of 19%.

The Fund has often reiterated its commitment to supporting the Eswatini economy, with its domestic portfolio largely consisting of fixed-income instruments, property, and strategic private equity stakes in key national sectors like healthcare and real estate.

Eswatini planned to contribute to the following three outcomes.

Inclusive economic growth and sustainable development

Resilience and risk reduction, incorporating sustainable natural resource management and good governance, equity and citizen participation.

The UNDP country programme document for Eswatini identified priorities for UNDP's interventions that were highly relevant to the country's development challenges.

Although activities implemented by UNDP have too often deviated from its set objectives and planned outputs. New projects and activities offer opportunities to diversify and attract new funding in areas such as youth, innovation and energy efficiency, but also increase the risk of moving away from UNDP's programme objectives.

Tariffs could weaken, but not yet reverse, the dollar's reserve status

THE massive tariffs proposed by President Donald Trump on “Liberation Day” in April put the U.S. dollar’s role as the world’s anchor currency at risk, while the administration’s eventual climbdown to more modest rates has likely left it secure, new economic research has concluded.

The research found that the country’s “exorbitant privilege,” with the dollar’s role as a risk-free asset drawing investment to the U.S. and allowing the country to borrow at lower rates, is tightly bound to open trade that couples the fate of other economies to what happens in the U.S.

Protectionism would weaken that connection and the benefits that go with it, with a tariff rate of 26% estimated as a tipping point that would allow competing currencies like the euro to become more central to the global economy, authors including Boston University economics professor Tarek Hassan, San Francisco Fed vice president Thomas Mertens, and Jingye Wang of the Renmin University of China, concluded from their research.

The average rates imposed by Trump, estimated now at around 17% to 18%, stayed

in a range the authors said might weaken but not fully undermine the dollar’s role.

“The dollar emerges as the safest currency in the world because shocks that affect the United States move a large share of global demand,” the authors wrote, driving demand for dollars as a hedge against currency and other risks.

“This safe-haven feature of the U.S. dollar is the key force that lowers U.S. interest rates, makes it a destination for global investment, and the target of exchange rate stabilizations,” they wrote. “A sustained trade war would threaten this equilibrium.”

The research, released as part of a Brookings Institution economic conference this week, comes during heightened attention to the dollar’s role in the world and how that might change under Trump.

A New York Fed conference this week will examine the issue, while investors try to parse conflicting data for evidence of any change.

A recent decline in the value of the dollar could be a warning sign, yet at the same time yields on U.S. Treasuries have fallen and stocks have hit record highs - a sign of continued demand for dollar-based securities that somewhat allays concerns the U.S. was at risk of losing its global status.

But, the authors warned, that can’t be taken for granted, pointing to last spring when markets sank in tandem.

“The fact that U.S. equities, Treasury bonds, and the dollar lost value at a time of disruption for international markets represents a stark departure from the usual pattern in which the dollar appreciates in times of global stress,” the authors wrote, referring to the backlash to Trump’s original tariff plans in April. “The dollar’s status as a safe-haven currency relies critically on relatively free trade: isolating the U.S. economy from world trade flows mitigates the forces that make the U.S. dollar the safest currency in the world.”

A slew of tariffs that U.S. President Donald Trump imposed on global trading partners on April 4 hit African countries hard. They were widely seen as the death knell for the quarter-century-old AGOA deal, putting millions of livelihoods at risk.

Lesotho initially got hit with the world’s highest tariff of 50% on Trump’s so-called “Liberation Day”

- ruinous for the tiny mountain kingdom’s export-led development model, which was almost entirely dependent on textile factories selling jeans and T-shirts to the U.S.

Trump reduced it to 15% in August. A Lesotho trade delegation visited the U.S. from September 15-19.

Minister of Trade, Industry and Business Development Mokheleli Shelile, who led the delegation, told a news conference late on Wednesday that they met U.S. officials responsible for AGOA on the House of Representatives Ways and Means Committee and the Senate Finance Committee.

“They all agreed that AGOA has to be extended and they promised

us that by November or December [at] the latest, it will be extended by a year,” Shelile said.

AGOA expires on September 30 and companies that benefit from it have warned that any delay in renewing it risked significant job losses and factory closures.

Lesotho qualifies for textile and apparel benefits under AGOA, according to the Office of the United States Trade Representative. U.S. goods and services trade with Lesotho totaled \$276 million in 2024, up 4.6% from a year earlier.

A White House spokesperson did not immediately respond to a request for comment.

CoreWeave expands OpenAI pact with new \$6.5 billion contract

The agreement marks the third major expansion of the partnership between the two companies this year. The company behind ChatGPT struck an initial cloud deal with CoreWeave in March worth up to \$11.9 billion, followed by a \$4 billion add-on in May.

The latest addition shows the deepening relationship between the two companies as OpenAI seeks multiple partners to help with an unprecedented data-center buildout to meet its growing computational demands.

The announcement follows major updates to OpenAI’s infrastructure project “Stargate”. OpenAI said Tuesday it will open three new sites with Oracle, its cloud partner with a \$300 billion deal over the next few years, and build two additional data centers with SoftBank.

CoreWeave’s shares pared losses in premarket trading and were down about 4%. Reuters was first to report the news.

“The combined capacity from these five new sites—along with our flagship site in Abilene, Texas, and ongoing projects with CoreWeave—brings Stargate to nearly 7 gigawatts of planned capacity and over \$400 billion in investment over the next three years,” OpenAI said in a blog post. OpenAI has said Stargate aims to secure a total of 10 gigawatts of capacity through an investment that could reach \$500 billion. (Reuters)

Seychelles president seeks reelection on back of economic recovery

VOTING began on Thursday in Seychelles' election, where incumbent President Wavel Ramkalawan and allied lawmakers are looking to block a comeback by the party that dominated politics for four decades.

Africa's wealthiest country per capita is an archipelago in the western Indian Ocean whose location makes it a target for investment from, and security cooperation with, China, Gulf nations and India.

Ramkalawan, a former Anglican priest, steered the tourism-dependent economy through a post-pandemic recovery, and says he wants a second five-year term to build social protections and infrastructure while defending the country's neutrality to draw investment.

His main rival, Patrick Herminie of the United Seychelles party that governed from 1977 to 2020, says the population of 120,000 suffers from problems such as soaring living costs, declining standards in schools, graft and drug abuse.

VOTE FOR CHANGE?

Over three days, about 73,000 voters will choose from eight presidential candidates and 125 challengers for the 35-seat National Assembly, where Ramkalawan hopes to maintain a majority for his Linyon Demokratik Seselwa coalition.

Voting began in the outlying islands and for some essential workers on Thursday,

with polling stations on the three main islands opening on Saturday. Results are due on Sunday.

Scores of essential workers queued to vote at the English River voting station in Victoria, the capital.

"I came to vote to remove the president," said Alberte, a police officer who declined to give his surname. "I did not like the things he did for the past five years, so I voted for a change."

Bus driver Gary Cado said he was happy with the government and wanted it to stay.

Long one of Africa's top economic performers thanks to tourism earnings and governance reforms, Seychelles has bounced back strongly from the COVID-19 pandemic. Last year it was removed from the EU's tax blacklist.

Inflation is less than 2% and public debt on course to drop below the government's target of 50% of gross domestic product before 2030, the International Monetary Fund says.

"We've embarked on an ambitious programme of taking care of our people," Ramkalawan told Reuters in an interview, pointing to an increased minimum wage, infrastructure projects and free school meals.

He hopes to build a new hospital and airport and a modern port, while relying on neutrality to maximise investment.

"We say keep your geopolitics to yourselves," Ramkalawan added. "A French war-

ship, an American, British, Chinese, or Indian vessel, all are welcome. If India and China have problems, those are not ours."

WITCHCRAFT ACCUSATIONS

Herminie, a doctor and former National Assembly speaker, has overcome unusual legal challenges, such as his 2023 arrest for trying to stage a coup with the help of witchcraft. He denied the charges, which were lat-

er dropped.

Herminie says the government has presided over spreading corruption, citing the lease of two islands to companies from Qatar and the United Arab Emirates.

He told Reuters his party had learned from its 43 years in power, when it faced corruption accusations of its own.

Kenya eyes US trade deal by end of year, seeks five-year extension to Africa pact

KENYA'S President William Ruto said on Wednesday his country expects to sign a trade, opens new tab deal with the United States by year-end and that he will be pushing Washington to extend its duty-free agreement with Africa for at least five years.

Ruto will be meeting with U.S. Secretary of State Marco Rubio later on Wednesday to discuss the African Growth Opportunity Act (AGOA), he said in an interview on the sidelines of the annual United Nations General Assembly in New York. The 25-year-old act grants qualifying African nations duty-free access to the U.S. market and is due to expire this month.

"I will be asking him for the U.S. to consider seriously renewing and extending AGOA for at least a minimum of five years, because it is a platform that connects Africa and the U.S. in a very fundamental way, and it can go a long way in solving some of the trade deficits and challenges that exist at the moment," Ruto said.

Ruto said he believes the U.S. administration has increased its appreciation for AGOA.

A bipartisan effort to secure a further extension to AGOA last year did not get a vote in Congress. President Donald Trump's return to the White House in January, with his tariff-driven trade policy, has further cast doubt on an extension.

"AGOA gives both Africa and the U.S. the best chance to expand and deepen trade," Ruto said.

ACCESS TO US MARKETS

The U.S. and Kenya have made "good progress" on a bilateral trade agreement, Ruto said, adding that he expects to sign a deal before the end of 2025. In April, Trump imposed a 10% tariff on Kenyan, opens new tab goods.

Kenya is looking for access to the U.S. market for its apparel, textile and agricultural products including tea, coffee and avocados. Ruto wants to explore new areas including mining and fishing. If a deal is reached, it would be the first of its kind between a sub-Saharan African nation and Washington.

Ruto said Kenya has robust trade agreements with several partners,

including China which has removed all tariffs from the East African country's agricultural products.

"We have a trade deficit in favor of China, but the one for the U.S. is fairly balanced, so we are still looking at avenues on how to balance trade with all our trading partners."

CONFLICTS IN THE DRC AND HAITI

On the conflict in the eastern Democratic Republic of the Congo, Ruto said a proposal has been made for the U.S., Qatar, the East African Community and the South African Development Community to come together next month to discuss the situation.

Congo, Rwanda eye October start to security measures under Trump-backed peace deal

DEMOCRATIC Republic of Congo and Rwanda agreed to start implementing security measures under a U.S.-mediated deal next month, the countries said in a joint statement on Wednesday, in what would be a key step toward carrying out the peace agreement amid concerns over lack of progress.

The agreement, reached in a meeting in Washington on September 17-18 and first reported by Reuters, would see implementation begin on October 1, according to the joint statement, which was also issued by the United States, Qatar, Togo and the African Union Commission.

The countries agreed to complete the measures by the end of the year, three sources familiar with the matter told Reuters. Operations to eliminate the threat from Congo-based armed group Democratic Forces for the Liberation of Rwanda (FDLR) and facilitate the withdrawal of Rwandan troops will begin between October 21 and 31, according to the sources.

The timeline offers specific dates for Rwanda and Congo to carry out the peace plan amid concerns it has faced headwinds.

The Congolese and Rwandan foreign ministers signed a peace deal in Washington on June 27

and met that same day with U.S. President Donald Trump, who is keen to draw billions of dollars of Western investment to a region rich in tantalum, gold, cobalt, copper, lithium and other minerals.

The deal included a pledge to implement a 2024 agreement that said Rwanda would lift defensive measures within 90 days.

Congolese military operations targeting the FDLR, a Congo-based armed group that includes remnants of Rwanda's former army and militias that carried out the 1994 genocide, are meant to conclude over the same timeframe.

The initial 2024 agreement's 90-day deadline falls on Thursday. One of the sources said the clock did not start ticking when the agreement was signed, but rather was meant to start with the first meeting of a new joint security coordination mechanism on August 7-8.

At the September meeting in Washington, Congo and Rwanda negotiated an operational order to advance that 2024 agreement and agreed to begin implementation on October 1, according to the joint statement.

The members of the joint security coordination mechanism also exchanged intelligence to establish an understanding of the situation on the ground, (Reuters)

Airport runway close calls spur hopes for wider adoption of cockpit alert technology

AS a Boeing 757 aircraft prepared to land, an audio alert started blaring in the cockpit: “Traffic on runway! Traffic on runway!” Seconds later, the same warning popped up on the navigation display.

It prompted the pilot to abort the landing to avoid a possible collision. The alert was triggered by a smaller Gulfstream jet that was on the runway.

This was not a real-world incident but a staged test flight of Honeywell’s, opens new tab new cockpit safety system designed to prevent incidents like a near-collision between a Southwest Airlines, aircraft and a private jet at Chicago’s Midway Airport in February and a crash at Tokyo’s Haneda Airport last year.

The technology known as SURF-A, or Surface-Alert, is the long-awaited addition to runway safety solutions that have been on the market for nearly two decades, but until recently failed to attract many customers.

But with recent high-profile runway incidents creating a new climate of safety concern, pressure is building on aviation authorities to make cockpit alert systems mandatory.

COCKPIT ALERTS SEEN BOOSTING AVIATION SAFETY

Japan has submitted a working paper, opens new tab to the ongoing triennial policy-setting meeting of global aviation leaders, highlighting cockpit alert systems as a crucial safety measure for preventing runway incursions. The paper was drafted in response to the Haneda crash.

The National Transportation Safety Board, which investigates all civil aviation accidents, has been consistently recommending it.

Southwest, which began using the technology this year, attests to the benefits. The Dallas-based airline has seen a significant improvement in its key safety performance

‘ChatGPT, what stocks should I buy?’ AI fuels boom in robo-advisory market

AS ChatGPT nears its third birthday, at least one in 10 retail investors is using a chatbot to pick stocks, fuelling a boom in the robo-advisory market, but even fans say it is a high-risk strategy that cannot replace traditional advisors just yet.

Thanks to artificial intelligence, anyone can select stocks, monitor them and obtain investment analysis that was once only available to big banks or institutional investors.

The robo-advisory market - which includes all companies providing automated, algorithm-driven financial advice such as fintech, banks and wealth managers - is forecast to grow to \$470.91 billion in revenues in 2029 from \$61.75 billion last year, marking a roughly 600% increase, according to data analysis firm Research and Markets.

NO ACCESS TO INFORMATION BEHIND A PAYWALL

Jeremy Leung, who spent almost two decades analysing companies for UBS, has been using ChatGPT to chase stocks for his multi-asset portfolio since he left the Swiss bank late last year.

“I no longer have the luxury of a Bloomberg (terminal), or those kinds of market-data services which are very, very expensive,” Leung said.

“Even the simple ChatGPT tool can do a lot and replicate a lot of the workflows that I used to do,” he said, cautioning that such a tool might however miss some crucial analyses as it can’t access data behind a paywall.

indicators since the system came on board, Southwest’s vice president of safety and security, Dave Hunt, told Reuters.

The U.S. carrier began installing the system in spring and now has it on almost all of its 800 aircraft. “We feel this is a very important and effective layer to prevent runway incursions, runway collisions,” Hunt said.

The International Civil Aviation Organization lists runway collisions or incursions among the top five risks to aviation safety. Runways were involved in 42% of accidents worldwide between 2019 and 2023, the ICAO, a United Nations agency, said.

The Federal Aviation Administration recorded almost five incursions or incorrect movements of planes or other objects per

day in the fiscal year 2024.

‘ANOTHER LAYER OF PROTECTION’

The SURF-A technology uses GPS, automatic dependent surveillance-broadcast (ADS-B) data, and advanced analytics to identify other aircraft on or near the runway that could cause a collision within the next 30 seconds.

Unlike systems that alert only air-traffic control, it provides aural and visual alerts directly to pilots in the cockpit. Based on the flight test results, Honeywell expects the FAA to approve the technology next year.

“It’s another layer of protection,” said Honeywell senior test pilot Kirk Vining. “It gives us more margin for safety.”

Airbus and Boeing are also working on runway-safety alerts for their aircraft. Cam Morast, lead product manager at avionics safety company Aviation Communication & Surveillance Systems, said his company is testing a surface alert technology, which will be available as a standard feature on new Airbus aircraft starting in 2028.

An FAA panel last year recommended requiring cockpit alert systems for newly manufactured aircraft. While the panel failed to reach a consensus on a retrofit mandate, it urged aircraft operators to make every effort to install the technology on their aircraft. It noted that safety was improved when aircraft were equipped with capabilities providing alerts to the flight crew.

Yet, doubts remain over how many airlines would be willing to invest in solutions like SURF-A without a regulatory mandate.

Safety experts say the system’s effectiveness relies on broad implementation across an airline’s fleet, which involves retrofitting older aircraft, maintenance planning, training for pilots and regulatory approval. It entails significant costs for carriers.

“It’s easier with the new fleet,” said Hassan Shahidi, chief executive at safety group Flight Safety Foundation. “Retrofitting the existing fleet is very challenging.”

COST CONCERNS SLOW ADOPTION RATE

The costs and efforts involved in upgrading safety features stymied the adoption of Honeywell’s previous runway safety solutions. In 2012, it launched smartRunway and smartLanding technology, known as Smart-X, to boost situational awareness of pilots during taxi, take-off and landing.

The technology was designed to prevent incidents such as the one in 2017 when an Air Canada, opens new tab flight mistakenly lined up to land on a taxiway instead of the assigned runway at San Francisco International Airport, nearly colliding with four other aircraft waiting to take off. businesses, with criteria such as levels of debt, sustained growth and assets that generate an advantage over competitors.

DENMARK said on Thursday that drone incursions overnight, which briefly closed two airports and affected military installations, were hybrid attacks aimed at spreading fear, though authorities could not identify the perpetrators.

The incident, the second in two days in Denmark alone, is part of what some European officials see as a pattern of Russian disruption that has exposed the vulnerability of European airspace at a time of high tensions between Moscow and NATO.

Poland shot down suspected Russian drones in its airspace on September 10. Danish authorities said on Thursday they decided not to take down any of the drones in their airspace for safety reasons, despite the disruption caused to air traffic.

Russia's embassy in Copenhagen rejected as "absurd" speculation about Moscow's involvement in the Danish incursions.

Danish Prime Minister Mette Frederiksen said she had spoken on Thursday with NATO Secretary General Mark Rutte about the drone incidents and that they had agreed to work together to ensure security.

DENMARK'S UNPREPAREDNESS IN FOCUS

The incursions forced Aalborg airport, used for commercial and military flights, to shut for three hours, while Billund airport, Denmark's second-largest, was closed for an hour, police said. Both reopened on Thursday morning.

Drones were also seen near Esbjerg and Sonderborg airports, as well as Skrydstrup airbase, home to Denmark's F-16 and F-35 fighter jets, and over a military facility in Holstebro, police confirmed. They are all located in the western Jutland region.

"This shows at least that we do not have the capacity at present to prevent the intrusion of drones over our airports," Peter Viggo Jakobsen, an associate professor at the Royal Danish Defence College, told Reuters.

Former French President Sarkozy handed 5-year jail term in stunning downfall

FORMER French president Nicolas Sarkozy was sentenced to five years in jail on Thursday for criminal conspiracy over attempts to raise campaign funds from Libya and will soon become the first former president of France to serve time in prison.

The sentence was harsher than many expected and Sarkozy, who was president between 2007-2012, will spend time in jail even if he appeals the ruling - which he said he would do.

As he exited the courtroom, Sarkozy, visibly moved, expressed his anger at what he said was a "scandalous" ruling.

"What happened today ... is of extreme gravity in regard to the rule of law, and for the trust one can have in the justice system," he told reporters.

"If they absolutely want me to sleep in jail, I will sleep in jail, but with my head held high," he said, adding that he was innocent. "I will not apologise for something I didn't do."

Sarkozy was found guilty of criminal conspiracy over efforts by close aides to procure funds for his 2007 presidential bid from Libya during the rule of late dictator Muammar Gaddafi.

He was acquitted by the Paris court of all other charges, including corruption and receiving illegal campaign financing.

SARKOZY WILL GO TO JAIL

However, the prison sentence is enforceable immediately, with the judge saying Sarkozy would have just a short period to put his affairs in order before prosecutors call on him to head to jail. That should happen within a month.

Sarkozy, who has always denied the charg-

The incursions come after Denmark this year its military budget to address acute shortcomings. Last week, it announced plans to acquire long-range precision weapons, while its decision to host Ukrainian missile fuel production near the Skrydstrup airbase has drawn criticism from Russia.

Police said the drones followed a similar pattern to those that halted flights at Copenhagen airport overnight into Tuesday.

"It certainly does not look like a coincidence. It looks systematic. This is what I would define as a hybrid attack," Defence Minister Troels Lund Poulsen told a press conference, adding that Denmark faced no direct military threat.

The head of Denmark's armed forces, Michael Hyldgaard, acknowledged weaknesses

in the country's ability to counter drone attacks: "We have a wide range of capabilities in the Armed Forces, but we would like to have more."

Danish opposition lawmaker Pelle Dragsted of the Red-Green Alliance slammed the government's handling of the incidents, saying on X: "Billions (are being) allocated to defence ... But no control over the most basic thing: Defence of our own vulnerable infrastructure."

DENMARK HAS POINTED FINGER AT RUSSIA

Prime Minister Frederiksen called the Copenhagen incident the most serious "attack" yet on Denmark's critical infrastructure and linked it to suspected Russian drone activities across Europe, though no evidence was provided.

Authorities in Norway also shut the airspace at Oslo airport for three hours on Monday evening after reports of a drone flying in the area.

Danish analyst Jakobsen also pointed the finger at Moscow.

"So the Russians - if it's them, and I think it is - are doing what they've been really good at for a long time: they're going right to the edge of what would trigger a military response from NATO, but not over it," he said.

Poulsen stressed on Thursday that there was no evidence linking the recent drone activities to Russia. He also said Denmark had not yet decided whether to follow Poland's example this month and invoke NATO's Article 4, which allows members to request consultations over any security concerns.

es, was accused of making a deal with Gaddafi in 2005, when he was France's interior minister, to obtain campaign financing in exchange for supporting the then-isolated Libyan government on the international stage.

The judge said there was no proof that Sarkozy made such a deal with Gaddafi, nor that money that was sent from Libya reached Sarkozy's campaign coffers, even if the timing was "compatible" and the paths the money went through were "very opaque".

But she said Sarkozy was guilty of criminal conspiracy for having let close aides get in touch with people in Libya to try and obtain campaign financing.

The 70-year-old has been on trial since January in a case he said was politically motivated.

The court found him guilty of criminal conspiracy between 2005 and 2007. After that he was president and covered by presidential immunity, the court added.

This was the second time this year that a French court handed down a ruling with immediate effect on a major political figure.

Far-right leader Marine Le Pen was convicted in March of embezzling EU funds and given an immediate five-year ban on running for office.

Le Pen was prompt to react to Sarkozy's sentencing, saying it was "a grave danger" that judges were opting for immediately enforceable rulings and not waiting for appeals.

SARKOZY'S LEGAL WOES

Despite his legal battles, and having his Legion of Honour, France's highest distinction, stripped in June, Sarkozy remains an influential figure on the French political stage.

He recently met with his former protege, Prime Minister Sebastien Lecornu, and has also lent credibility to Le Pen's National Rally (RN), saying the far-right, anti-immigrant party now forms part of the "republican arc."

Sarkozy has faced several legal battles since leaving office.

Last year, France's highest court upheld his conviction for corruption and influence peddling, ordering him to wear an electronic tag for a year, a first for a former French head of state. The tag has now been removed.

Also last year, an appeals court confirmed a separate conviction for illegal campaign financing over his failed re-election bid in 2012. A final ruling from France's highest court is expected on that case next month.

Vincent Brengarth, lawyer for economic justice campaign group Sherpa, which was party to the Libya trial, welcomed the ruling. "This confirms we have an independent justice system, that can be brave," he said.

Amapiano star has not been arrested – JCPS

It began when he went live on Instagram, claiming he was stuck in Nigeria after travelling there for a gig.

The 23-year-old musician pleaded for help to get a flight ticket to return home.

"I came here with people and when we got here, they started changing. I asked them to buy me a ticket so I could return home. Now they say there's no way I can go because they signed a contract," Mashego said.

Fellow musician DJ Karri stepped in, confirming on his platforms that he had secured a ticket for Mashego's return flight.

On the live videos, Mashego also alleged that the Scorpion Kings, Maphorisa and Kabza De Small, owed him millions in unpaid royalties for the hit song Biri Marung. **Citizen**

Cici threatens legal action over unpaid royalties

JOHANNESBURG - It never ends: artists continue to speak out about unpaid royalties.

This week, producer JL SA, real name Jackson Motla, took to social media to express frustration over not being paid for the 2023 viral hit "Hamba Juba", a collaboration with Lady Amar, Murumba Pitch and Cici.

"Did you know that I made this beat?" he asked while playing the track. "I've produced this song from scratch. This is my work. This is my own production, but I never got a cent from it. You can check."

"And if you can check now on Spotify, the song is hitting on like 23 million streams on Spotify only. The music video on YouTube has 32 million views. I have not counted the audio. My name is JL SA. I'm a South African. I love making music except that I don't get paid for it."

Fans flooded the comments with questions. One user asked, "Why don't you always ask before signing any contract?"

JL SA responded, "I didn't sign anything because there was nothing given to sign."

Another follower asked, "What was the deal from the get-go between you guys?"

"I was promised 50% of the song," he responded. The conversation quickly turned toward DJ Lady Amar, with fans tagging her and accusing her of withholding money.

Amar released a video asking people to stop insulting her. She said that it has been two years and that she has not received any form of payment.

Payment

Amar said that she has been quiet because she does not know how to speak for herself, and that maybe JL SA does. She said that this is the last time she is speaking about this issue.

Sannah Thwala, head of marketing and PR at The House of Thomm, which represents Cici, told "Independent Media Lifestyle": "We are aware of the concerns raised by JL SA regarding the song 'Hamba Juba' and it is important to clarify that Cici herself has not received her share of the royalties for the song in question."

"In addition, the House of Thomm, which owns 50% of the master, has also not received its agreed master share, despite a split sheet being signed by all parties involved prior to the release."

Thwala added: "As per agreements, revenues from the song were to be distributed fairly among all collaborators. Unfortunately, this has not been the case, and the matter has already been referred

to our legal representatives to ensure that all parties receive what is rightfully due to them."

The South African Music Rights Organisation (SAMRO)

had not responded to requests for comment by the time of publication.

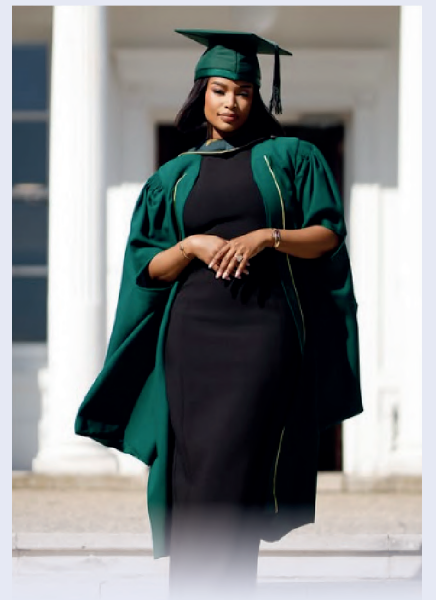
"I've always believed love songs have a special way of connecting people. With Mamma, I wanted to bring back that nostalgic, soulful feeling but still keep people dancing.

West will have a one-day concert at Ellis Park Stadium on Saturday, December 13. The event is organised by the Monyake Group, a local live-entertainment company.

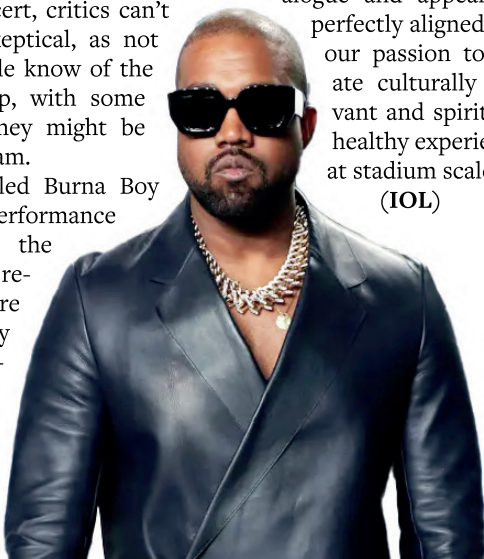
Prices for the concert start at R850 and range from R1 995,00 to R4 865,00.

McIlroy says Bryson matchup in Ryder Cup would be ‘wonderful’

RORY McIlroy says facing Bryson DeChambeau in a Ryder Cup grudge match would be “wonderful” after their verbal feud intensified this week, but he’s more concerned about Europe winning in America.

Europe talisman McIlroy, who won the Masters in April to complete a career Grand Slam, will lead the trophy holders against host United States starting Friday at Bethpage Black.

A war of words with American star DeChambeau began at the Masters, where two-time US Open winner DeChambeau vowed to chirp in McIlroy’s ear at the Ryder Cup.

McIlroy, a five-time major winner from Northern Ireland, said last month that DeChambeau, who plays in the Saudi-backed LIV series, can only attract attention by mentioning other golfers.

DeChambeau told Golf Channel on Monday that, “Whatever Rory says and whatnot is great. He didn’t mean anything by it. I hope we can have some good banter back and forth.”

McIlroy eased the spat Thursday, partly on orders from Europe captain Luke Donald, but was clear he’d be fine facing DeChambeau this week.

“I promised Luke I would only talk about the European team today. I’m going to stick to it,” McIlroy said.

“It’s so easy to play into narratives this week and to get swept up in this whole rivalries and Ryder Cup and whatever it is. All I want to do is go and try and put blue points

on the board. I don’t care who it’s against.

“If I come up against Bryson at some point, I think that’s great. That’s wonderful for the championship and wonderful for us, as well, in some ways.”

McIlroy and his teammates have a goal of capturing the Cup on US soil for the fifth time and ending a run of lopsided host Cup wins since the epic Europe 2012 “Miracle at Medinah” fightback road triumph.

“Winning another away Ryder Cup, just

considering how hard that has been over the past 12 years, it would be one of the greatest accomplishments of my career for sure,” McIlroy said.

“Since 2012, you look at the results of the Ryder Cup, the home team has won every time, but they also have won convincingly. It has been pretty one-sided either way.

Whatever team, whether that’s Europe or America, that’s the one to break that duck, I think, is going to go down as one of the best

teams in Ryder Cup history.

“We have a wonderful opportunity this week but we also understand it’s going to be very difficult.”

On the eve of his eighth Cup appearance, the most of any golfer this week, McIlroy is part of a team that returns 11 of 12 players from the triumphant Rome squad.

“It has been a really cohesive group for the last three years,” McIlroy said. “We all know what to expect. We all know what our roles are... that has us prepared to give it a really good go this week.”

STRIKING A BALANCE

McIlroy says he is trying to find the right balance for engagement with spectators, who have already booed him with vigor in practice.

“At times in the Ryder Cup, I’ve engaged too much with the crowd, but then there’s times where I haven’t engaged enough,” he said. “So it’s really just trying to find the balance of using that energy from the crowd to fuel your performance.”

From cupping his hand to his ear and yelling, “I can’t hear you,” after making a long putt at Hazeltine in 2016 to being mellow at Whistling Straits in 2021, it’s a delicate touch.

“At Hazeltine I probably engaged too much at times,” McIlroy said. “And then Whistling Straits, I didn’t engage enough and felt pretty flat because of it.”

Sinner eases past Cilic to launch China Open title bid

JANNIK Sinner beat Croatia’s Marin Cilic 6-2, 6-2 on Thursday to cruise into round two in Beijing on his first showing since losing the US Open final.

Next at the China Open the world number two from Italy faces qualifier Terence Atmane of France.

“We did a lot of work to be back in this position again, so I’m very happy,” Sinner said.

“I missed the competition. Of course, you are nervous, you have doubts and it’s normal... but you have to be also excited to go again on court.

“At the moment I feel great physically and mentally, which is the most important.”

The 36-year-old Cilic was looking to snap a winless run stretching back to the Wimbledon last 16.

The two were evenly matched in the first set until the 24-year-old Sinner broke for a 3-2 lead.

The Italian added the next two games without losing a point and closed the set with minimum fuss.

Sinner broke early to take control of the second set for a 2-1 lead and pushed that to 5-1, overpowering the 97th-ranked former US Open champion.

Four-time major champion Sinner secured a routine win when Cilic returned into the net.

“Big respect to him,” Sinner said. “I managed to break him quite early,

which then gave me the confidence to continue.”

Sinner has vowed to introduce some unpredictability to his play after losing the New York final -- and top ranking -- this month to Carlos Alcaraz.

“I don’t think it’s pressure off or on,” Sinner, who won the Australian Open and Wimbledon this year, said of their rankings swap.

“I’m very, very happy with the season I have played, or am playing, because it was remarkable for my side

what I did, but also for what Carlos is doing.

“At the moment he deserves to be there, you know, it’s as simple as that. He played more tournaments and he played all tournaments very, very well.”

Sinner is vying for a third straight Beijing final after winning on his China Open debut in 2023, before losing last year’s decider to Alcaraz.

A WTA 1000 event is also taking place in Beijing.

“I am wishing him the best in his new chapter.

“We decided with him and the club to do a normal transition. It changes nothing, only changing the man.

“We reacted quickly by bringing in one person I know personally. I have a lot of confidence with Roberto and he is coming to help us.”

Villa are 18th in the Premier League with three points and only one goal from their opening five matches.

Grosjean to drive Haas F1 car for first time since 2020 crash

ROMAIN Grosjean will drive a Haas Formula One car in Italy on Friday for the first time since a 2020 fireball crash ended the French racer’s grand prix career and nearly killed him.

Haas said the 39-year-old, who raced for the US-owned team for five seasons, would test a 2023 Haas VF-23 at the Mugello circuit.

Members of his original crew, including current team principal Ayao Komatsu, who was previously a race engineer, will be in attendance.

“To say I’m excited to get l of a Formula One car would naturally be an understatement,” said Grosjean in a statement.

“I really can’t believe it’s been almost five years, but to come back and have this outing

with my old team is truly something special.

“My kids had designed my helmet for what was meant to be my final grand prix in Abu Dhabi back in 2020 – I’m at last going to be able to give it a go in a Formula One car on Friday.”

Grosjean’s car, loaded full of fuel, speared through the metal barriers after a 192kph impact – ripping in half before erupting in a fireball – on the opening lap of the 29 November race at Bahrain’s desert Sakhir circuit.

The Frenchman, whose left foot was initially trapped and who suffered burns to his hands, miraculously managed to extricate himself after 27 seconds.

He said later he thought he was going to die but willed himself out of the inferno for the sake of his children.

Marquez looking to crown comeback with MotoGP title in Japan

MARC Marquez said he wanted to celebrate his “second life” in MotoGP by clinching his first world title since 2019 this weekend in Japan after a nightmare struggle with injuries.

The Spanish Ducati rider can win his seventh world title if he finishes the weekend in Motegi with at least three more points than his brother and nearest championship rival Alex Marquez.

The 32-year-old is back on top after an injury saga that began when he broke his right arm in 2020 and almost convinced him to hang up his helmet.

Marquez has a huge championship lead over his brother and still has five weekends left to clinch the title if he fails to get the job done in Japan.

But he said he is looking to “celebrate something big” this weekend after coming back from what he described as the biggest challenge of his career.

“Right now it’s my second life in MotoGP and this will be important if we can close all that circle in the best way possible,” Marquez said on Thursday.

“Still six races to go but I want to keep the full focus.” “Winning another away Ryder Cup, just considering how hard that has been over the past 12 years, it would be one of the greatest accomplishments of my career for sure,” McIlroy said.

“Since 2012, you look at the results of the Ryder Cup, the home team has won every time, but they also have won convincingly. It has been pretty one-sided either way.

Whatever team, whether that’s Europe or America, that’s the one to break that duck, I

think, is going to go down as one of the best teams in Ryder Cup history.

“We have a wonderful opportunity this week but we also understand it’s going to be very difficult.”

He has happy memories of the circuit in Japan, clinching the championship there in 2014, 2016, and 2018.

Marquez said he would try to “keep the same mentality” but would not panic if he has to keep the championship champagne on ice for longer.

“It’s true that I’m very close to close a cycle where I started five years ago with a very big injury, so let’s see if we can finish in the best way possible,” he said.

“I repeat, if it’s not this weekend, it will not be a disaster. We have another five chances in front.”

Marquez suffered a rare slip-up in San Marino two weeks ago when he crashed while leading the sprint.

He made no mistake in the following day’s grand prix, overtaking pole-sitter Marco Bezzecchi to move into the lead before calmly seeing out the win.

It was Marquez’s 99th race win across MotoGP, Moto2, and Moto3.

It also gave him his first opportunity this season to clinch the title and he said it was “impossible not to think about” achieving it.

“When you are in the interviews or when you are in the paddock, everybody is asking you the same question,” he said.

“How is your feeling? You feel, but in the end the emotions are quite constant, that is the most important.”

ESWATINI Police outfit Royal Leopard made things easier for themselves away in Botswana in the first leg by winning 2-0 against the tricky and youthful but inexperienced side, Young Africans.

How they go through:

- A goalless draw will be enough for Ingwe Mabalabala to go through with a 2-0 aggregate score.

- If Young African score and make it 2-0, it will be 2-2 aggregate, and penalties will decide the winner.

- Leopard must avoid conceding and score a goal if Young African prove to be difficult this time around to advance on a 3-0 aggregate.

- Leopard will not advance if the Young African or Youngile, as they fondly trade, win 3-1 or 3-0. This will equate to a 3-3 or 3-2 aggregate score, with the away goal rule going in favour of the visitors.

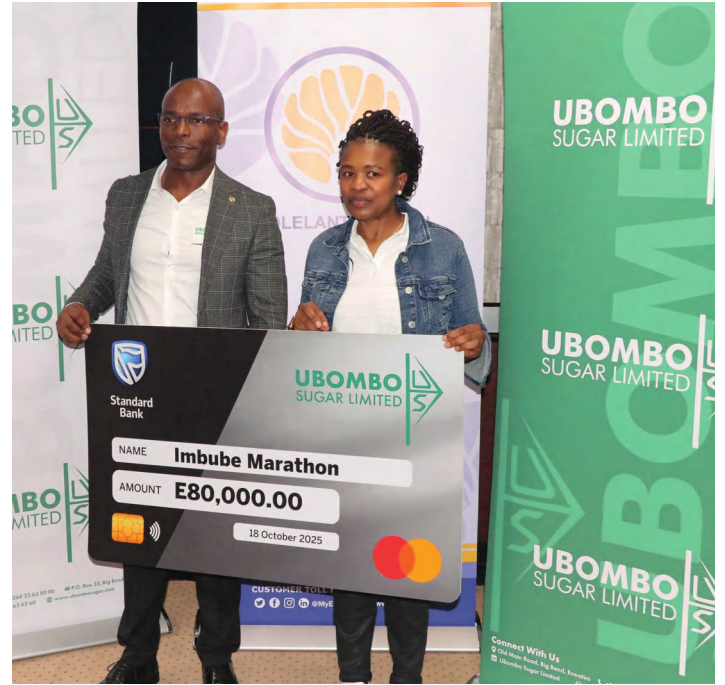

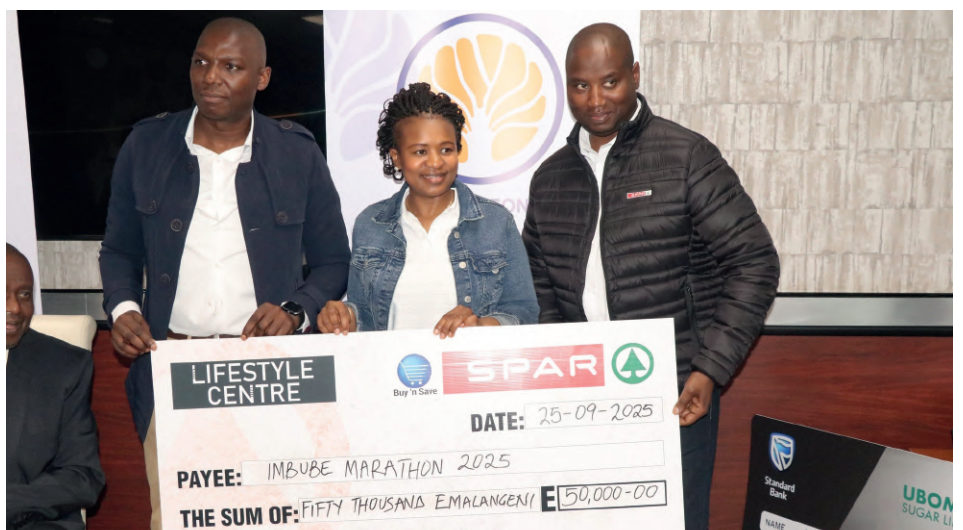
