TAVI pledges to champion food sovereignty in Eswatini through Agroecology

THE Interregional Meeting of Bishops of Southern Africa (IMBISA) Golden Jubilee Mass Celebration wrapped up on Sunday after a successful gathering that saw Archbishops from across the region descend to the kingdom.

IMBISA, which is an organ of liaison and pastoral cooperation between the Roman Catholic Bishops, whose main aim is its mandate of creating communion of best practices in each member country, celebrated 50 years of existence.

This saw a delegation of over 70 bishops from nine IMBISA member countries, namely, Angola, Botswana, Eswatini, Lesotho, Mozambique, Namibia, São Tomé e Príncipe, South Africa and Zimbabwe, convening in the country to celebrate the IMBISA Golden

Archbishop Raymond Mupandasekwa from the Roman Catholic Diocese of Masvingo in Zimbabwe said the decision to celebrate in Eswatini was deliberate as they sought to return where it all started in order to perhaps rediscover the spirit of their founding fathers, which drove them to come together at such a difficult time of racial discrimination, when also the cry for freedom could be heard on the lips of the oppressed majority.

He said they have come to listen again to the same Spirit of the Lord who blew so powerfully on these fathers as at Pentecost, moving their minds and hearts to add their voice to the voices of the oppressed, the politically and economically excluded, giving a divine inspiration to what the people were to fight for.

Mupandasekwa said the IMBISA fathers were clear about the need for political leaders to pay attention to political freedom as a means to achieve universal fraternity and social peace, bearing in mind the principle of the universal destination of all goods.

"We come to this moment of celebration here in Eswatini to look back with gratitude, reflecting on the path that was trodden, grasping its gifts and its lessons, and rededicating ourselves to the Spirit who is leading us into the future," he said.

He said they came together, accompanied by one of the founding fathers, Archbishop Zacarias Kamwenho, who was here in Eswatini with them to rediscover the joy of believing.

IMBISA wraps up 50 years celebration in Eswatini

"Our celebration of the jubilee, hence, is not just a celebration of the passage of time (50 years), but the joy of believing in a God who led our founding fathers through trials and tribulations to this jubilee moment in order to make a deeper commitment to serving Him and his people. It is a moment of rededication to living our faith now and into the future," he said.

IMBISA was officially constituted in 1978 to connect Bishops' Conferences and enable better communication between the regions. Today, almost half a century since its inception, IMBISA continues to connect the Southern African Church. It connects The Southern African Church across vast distances. It shares stories of particular relevance to Catholics in the region.

IMBISA also helps communities to stand in solidarity with one another. It inspires unity and provides a shared identity through ongoing communication.

Mupandasekwa said that as they re-dedicate themselves to living their faith with greater vigour, they should recognise that the gaining of political freedom was supported, but the founding of IMBISA has not brought with it the anticipated outcomes.

He stated that it was Nelson Mandela who once said, "Our freedom can never be complete or our democracy stable unless the basic needs of our people are met."

Mupandasekwa said that as IMBISA, they return to Eswatini to accept the challenge of making their governments see that the basic needs of their people have not yet been met.

"We have to accept the challenge of making our governments more accountable. Some of our leaders are blind to the destitution of our people, and to the plight of Lazarus, who lies skin and bones on the streets, unable to access what is even reserved for the house dogs," Mupandasekwa said.

He said they needed to add weight to the cries against corruption, the scourge that has destroyed their economies, giving the wealth of their countries to foreign powers.

Mupandasekwa pointed out that there was a lesson that came from their 50 year history, which sometimes made them silence in trying moments of member states and member conferences, that may be a sign that the inter-regional meeting must evolve into a conference that takes up greater responsibility to what was happening in the region and to its members.

Mupandasekwa mentioned that the synodal path that they have been invited to, demands that they discern how best they can be more effective.

He said it was Martin Luther King who said, "We are now faced with the fact that tomorrow is today."

"We are confronted with the fierce urgency of now," he stated.

He said in this unfolding conundrum of life and history, there was such a thing as be-

"This is no time for apathy or complacency. This is a time for vigorous and positive action. How can IMBISA become more vigorous and more positive in its action in the service of reconciliation, justice and peace?"

Eswatini to explore creation of Space Agency — Minister Savannah

NEW YORK, USA — The agreement signed between the Ministry of Information Communications and Technology and Canadian based space company, Stardust would see the Kingdom of Eswatini exploring the creation of Space Agency to be housed under the Royal Science and Technology Park (RSTP).

This is detailed in the Declaration of Intent signed on Friday in New York by ICT Minister Savannah Maziya and CEO and Founder of Stardust Jason Michaud, which was witnessed by His Majesty King Mswati III. The parties to the declaration agreed that their partnership would cover the following ares;

1. Exploration of the establishment of the Kingdom of Eswatini Space Agency

(KESA) as a national platform for space education, innovation, and international cooperation.

- 2. Support for the creation of a Space Academy that aligns with Eswatini's national education framework and inspires the next generation of innovators.
- 3. Provision of opportunities for youth engagement, innovation challenges, and scholarships to connect Eswatini students to global learning and mentorship opportunities.
- 4. Collaboration on public engagement initiatives - including festivals, workshops and cultural exchange activities - that highlight Eswatini's leadership in space-enabled sustainability.
- 5. Commitment to work in good faith toward defining concrete programs, policies and frameworks that will lead to a sustainable partnership.
- 6. Recognition of Eswatini's ambition to become a regional leader in space innovation, climate action and youth empow-



ternational cooperation.

The parties agreed that the declaration is a first step toward formalising a structured collaboration and would work jointly in the development of an MoU or its equivalent framework to guide the creation of longterm projects, including potential investments, infrastructure development and in-

The declaration states that the RSTP would be the implementing agent signaling the shared belief that Space is a bridge to sustainability, opportunity and prosperity and commit to advancing initiatives that empower people, protect the planet and inspire future generations.

NEW YORK, USA - His Majesty the King has invited emaSwati in the diaspora to come back home and work in the soon to be established industrial park and the strategic oil reserve.

The King was speaking to a gathering of emaSwati students and those who work in the United States of America on Friday who had come to pay a courtesy call.

"The Kingdom of Eswatini is transforming and establishing critical industries that requires high-end skills and know-how of some of you who are now based in the diaspora and have been exposed to these in-

"The investors who have shown interest to set their businesses at home would require your expertise hence I am making this call. emaSwati back home would like to learn from your experiences, hence we are appealing to you to consider returning home to contribute to the nation's development," the King said.

He said the United States is one of the advanced economies of the world, hence they must make use of the exposure whilst still working here.

Former Eswatini Revenue Services boss and former Principal Secretary Dumsani Masilela and former Chief Economist Nonkululeko Dlamini-Magagula and Linda Hlophe are some of the about 40 emaSwati who work at the World Bank and International Monetary Fund (IMF) holding very senior positions.

The King reminded both the emaSwati students that they should always work hard and continue to be exemplary in everything

cal emaSwati virtue.

His Majesty the King said they do not just want the emaSwati in living in the diaspora to return home just only to work, but they want them to open business that would attract huge turnover per annum running into millions of Emalangeni.

He also challenged emaSwati to venture into investment in the tourism space, to position the country as a tourist destination.

The King said people who visit Eswatini should be exposed to a variety of places other than just the cultural aspect.

"Some countries are not even endowed

they do by showing respect, which is a criti- with natural resources like we do but do more whilst attending the business of the United and create interesting opportunities. That's what we need to venture into. I witnessed signing of Memorandum of Agreement with huge companies like Google, Space company Stardust and the United Arab Emirates which are aimed at contributing to advanced technologies and place Eswatini as an innovation hub of not just Southern Africa but the continent at large.

"We are looking forward to be amongst the most developed economies of the world, hence your contribution to the country's advancement is key," His Majesty the King said.

Police launch manhunt after fatal hit-and-run in Ludzibini

THE Royal Eswatini Police Service (REPS) at Pigg's Peak has launched an urgent appeal to the public for assistance in tracing the driver of a white Ford Ranger suspected to have been involved in a fatal hit-and-run accident along the Buhleni/Msahweni MR 6 Public Road.

According to police, the incident occurred on Saturday, 27 September 2025, at approximately 4:20 p.m., when a 33-year-old woman from Ludzibini was struck by the vehicle while walking along the roadside. Tragically, the pedestrian sustained fatal injuries and was certified dead at the scene.

The driver of the vehicle, registered under plate number FSD 969 AH, reportedly fled the scene without stopping to render any form of assistance to the victim, in violation of traffic and criminal laws.

Deputy Police Information and Communication Officer, Assistant Superintendent Nosipho Mnguni, confirmed the case in a statement released on Sunday.

"The Royal Eswatini Police Service is urgently seeking the driver of

a white Ford Ranger LDV registered FSD 969 AH in connection with the hit-and-run accident that claimed the life of a 33-year-old woman at Ludzibini. We appeal to anyone with information that may assist in locating the suspect to come forward immediately," she said.

Police say such reckless behavior not only violates traffic laws but also denies victims the timely medical attention that could potentially save lives.

The latest accident adds to the growing concerns about road safety in Eswatini, particularly pedestrian safety along major highways. Authorities have consistently warned drivers against speeding, negligent driving, and abandoning accident scenes, which carry severe legal consequences under the country's Road Traffic Act.

Meanwhile, the identity of the deceased woman has not yet been released as police work to notify her next of kin.

The Royal Eswatini Police Service has assured the public that all efforts are underway to locate the suspect and bring them to justice.

REPS welcome sentence of serial rapist

THE Royal Eswatini Police Service (REPS) has welcomed the sentencing of convicted serial rapist Carlos Nhambombe (51), who has been sentenced to 48 years in prison after being found guilty on multiple counts of rape involving minors.

Nhambombe's crimes, described by authorities as "disturbing and predatory," were committed over a period of two to three years before his arrest in December 2012. His modus operandi involved targeting vulnerable girls between the ages of 12 and 15 at the Mbabane Bus Rank.

Police reports indicate that Nhambombe would monitor the movements of the minors before luring them away from the bustling bus rank to secluded areas near Checkers, using false promises of domestic employment or money. Once isolated, the girls were subjected to repeated sexual assaults.

His arrest in December 2012 came after one of his survivors recognized him while visiting a health institution in Mbabane and immediately alerted the authorities. This crucial moment ultimately led to his long-awaited capture and prosecution.

In a statement, REPS praised the dedication of the investigative team that ensured justice was delivered for the survivors. "The Royal Eswatini Police Service commends the unwavering dedication of the investigating team whose thorough effort brought the perpetrator to justice. The team comprised the late Sergeant Hlengiwe Dlamini, retired Sergeant Sibongile Dlamini, and Detective Constable Zweli Dlamini, who all worked diligently to ensure that justice is served for the survivors," said REPS Deputy Police Information and Communication Officer, Assistant Superintendent Nosipho Mnguni.

The police reaffirmed their commitment to the ongoing fight against gender-based violence (GBV), which remains a significant challenge in Eswatini and the region at large.

"We remain committed in the fight against Gender-Based Violence. We are here to serve the nation," the statement concluded.

The sentencing of Nhambombe sends a strong message to perpetrators of sexual violence that justice will eventually catch up with them, no matter how long it takes.

TAVI pledges to champion food sovereignty in Eswatini through Agroecology

THE Taiwan Africa Vegetable Initiative (TAVI) has reaffirmed its commitment to driving food sovereignty in the Kingdom of Eswatini, with a strong focus on agroecology as a pillar for sustainable agricultural growth, investment attraction, and climate resilience.

Speaking exclusively to the Eswatini Daily News, TAVI's Communication Officer, Nontobeko Mbuyane, highlighted the organisation's role in advancing solutions that bridge the gap between smallholder farmers and the broader agribusiness ecosystem.

"Agroecology is rising as a key solution for sustainable farming. With initiatives such as the Sustainable Agriculture Indaba, convened by PELUM Association Eswatini and supported by the EU, COSPE, and TAVI, the national conversation is shifting towards agroecology as a driver of food security, climate action, and investment opportunities," Mbuyane said.

TAVI's strategic goals

TAVI's overarching vision is to achieve food sovereignty empowering communities to produce their own food sustainably and reducing dependence on imported staples. This aligns with Eswatini's broader national development agenda of strengthening food systems, cutting the import bill, and improving rural livelihoods.

According to Mbuyane, TAVI's goals for the coming years include:

Scaling Agroecology Practices: Training

and equipping smallholder farmers with climate-smart and low-input farming techniques to improve productivity without over-reliance on costly synthetic inputs.

Market Integration: Building stronger value chains by connecting smallholder farmers to reliable markets, while promoting local produce as a competitive alternative to imports.

Investment Mobilisation: Positioning agroecology as an attractive area for impact investment and donor support, particularly for projects that blend food security with climate adaptation.

Policy Advocacy: Working alongside government and regional partners to embed agroecological principles in Eswatini's agricultural policy frameworks.

The business case for Agroecology

While agroecology is often viewed through an environmental lens, TAVI is driving the narrative that it is also a business opportunity. The model cuts costs for farmers, increases resilience to climate shocks, and creates green value chains attractive to investors.

Eswatini currently imports the bulk of its food, including maize, wheat, and vegetables, exposing the economy to global price volatility and trade disruptions. TAVI's strategy is to reverse this trend by boosting domestic production capacity through sustainable farming systems that also meet global standards for organic and climate-smart produce.

"Food sovereignty is not just about survival it's about creating thriving local economies where agriculture becomes an engine for job creation, investment, and export growth," Mbuyane explained.

The Indaba as a turning point

The 1st Sustainable Agriculture Indaba on Agroecology, hosted by PELUM Association Eswatini, marks a milestone for agricultural dialogue in the country. With support from partners such as the EU, COSPE, and TAVI, the event will convene policymakers, investors, researchers, and farming communities to chart a way forward.

For TAVI, the Indaba is not just a talk shop but a launchpad for action, providing an opportunity to showcase scalable agroecological models and build investor confidence in Eswatini's agri-sector.

As climate change intensifies and food security pressures mount, TAVI sees agroe-cology as a solution that merges profitability with sustainability. By investing in resilient farming systems, Eswatini can not only feed itself but also create new business frontiers in organic produce, agro-processing, and green exports.

Mbuyane concluded with optimism: "We believe Eswatini has the potential to become a regional leader in agroecology. Our commitment at TAVI is to ensure that food sovereignty is not just an aspiration but a reality built on sustainable practices, thriving markets, and resilient communities."

CBE pioneers digital financial inclusion with National e-KYC

ESWATINI is taking a decisive step toward digital transformation and financial inclusion with the launch of a national electronic Know Your Customer (e-KYC) system.

The initiative, led by the Central Bank of Eswatini (CBE), aims to streamline identity verification, facilitate secure access to financial services, and create a foundation for broader integration into the regional economy.

Unlike traditional paper-based systems, the e-KYC platform will allow for real-time digital verification, reducing friction in accessing banking services for the country's unbanked and underbanked populations.

By modernizing the onboarding process for both banks and other financial service providers, Eswatini hopes to eliminate barriers that have long prevented citizens from participating fully in the formal economy.

Deputy Governor Felicia Dlamini-Kunene emphasized that the e-KYC system is a strategic tool for advancing financial inclusion.

"The national e-KYC system is a key enabler for bringing the unbanked population into the formal financial system, which is a critical driver of economic growth and stability. Financial inclusion is fundamental for improving well-being and creating wealth," she said at a high-level stakeholder meeting convened to align commercial banks, regulators, and government ministries ahead of the platform's rollout.

Beyond banking, the digital identity framework supporting e-KYC can be extended to government services, simplifying access to social benefits and public programmes. This dual purpose underscores the system's potential to streamline service delivery while enhancing security and accountability

across sectors

Eswatini's e-KYC initiative is also designed with a regional perspective. The platform is part of a broader SADC (Southern African Development Community) effort to develop a shared digital identity verification system that enables cross-border financial transactions.

"This initiative is exploring the feasibility of a regional e-KYC registry that will enable secure, real-time, cross-border identity verification. It allows us to develop a cross-border payments infrastructure in the SADC region, advancing financial inclusion, efficiency, and security," Dlamini-Kunene explained.

By participating early in the regional framework, Eswatini positions itself as a leader in SADC efforts to reduce friction in cross-border payments a common challenge for member countries.

Paper-based verification processes in many states remain slow, costly, and prone to error, limiting regional trade and integration. The national e-KYC system will help overcome these structural barriers, allowing for more inclusive, secure, and efficient regional financial ecosystems.

A key part of the initiative is defining stakeholder roles in the national e-KYC roadmap. Dlamini-Kunene stressed the importance of tailoring solutions to national circumstances rather than copying best practices wholesale.

She called on stakeholders to undertake a strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats (SWOT) analysis to identify gaps and leverage strengths for successful implementation.

The platform's development has been supported by the Royal Science and Technology Park (RSTP), which provides the digital infrastructure necessary for a national identity verification system. This partnership underscores the importance of public-private col-

laboration in building resilient and scalable digital solutions.

The initiative also signals a broader vision for Eswatini's economy. By integrating digital identity with financial services and public programmes, the country is laying the groundwork for a more inclusive, innovative, and resilient economic environment. For migrants and rural populations, who often face the greatest barriers to formal financial services, e-KYC opens pathways to participate in the national and regional economy.

Eswatini's national e-KYC system is more than a technical upgrade; it is a strategic lever for economic and social transformation.

By combining financial inclusion, digital identity, and regional integration, the country is positioning itself as a pioneer in Southern Africa's journey toward a more interconnected and accessible financial landscape.

"The Central Bank of Eswatini sees this as a strategic priority. Our ability to contribute effectively to the regional framework depends on how well we develop our national digital identity infrastructure, technically, legally, and operationally," Dlamini-Kunene noted.

Sugar Bean ban lifted after Parliament intervenes

THE National Agricultural Marketing Board (NAMBoard) has lifted the recently announced ban on sugar bean imports, following a parliamentary motion requesting a suspension pending further review.

The decision comes after growing concerns over national bean supply and the potential economic impact on farmers.

The ban, originally scheduled to take effect last Monday, was intended to regulate imports in line with the NAMBoard Act No. 13 of 1985.

However, in a notice issued on Monday, NAMBoard confirmed that the restriction had been lifted with immediate effect. The board cited the need to balance local production levels with consumer demand and to protect both producers and buyers.

Last Thursday, members of Parliament passed a motion requesting the suspension of the import restriction. The motion was tabled by Lobamba Lomdzala MP Marwick Khumalo and seconded by Deputy Speaker Madala Mhlanga.

MP Khumalo argued that claims of national self-sufficiency in sugar beans were questionable, given recent reports of shortages in various parts of the country.

He emphasized that restricting imports



without clear evidence could negatively affect traders and consumers alike. MP Mhlanga added that the motion was intended to verify the situation on the ground before enforcement of such a policy, stressing the importance of evidence-based decision-making in agricultural regulation.

Despite the suspension, some lawmakers, including MP Chief Mshengu, a member of the agriculture portfolio committee, defended the initial ban. He said the committee had inspected bean storage reservoirs and confirmed that stock levels were sufficient to meet demand.

Mshengu further explained that many farmers had responded to government directives to increase bean production, with the assurance that the National Maize Corporation (NMC) would purchase crops at E27,000 per metric tonne.

He warned that enforcing the ban could have placed farmers at a financial disadvantage, potentially affecting their ability to service agricultural loans.

The Minister of Agriculture, Mandla Tshawuka, echoed these sentiments, confirming that there were adequate bean reserves to supply the domestic market.

NAMBoard emphasized that its decision to lift the ban followed a comprehensive assessment involving the ministry, the NMC, and the board itself.

The review considered both national production levels and market demand, concluding that imports were necessary to supplement local supply and prevent consumer shortages.

"The findings indicated a need to allow imports in order to supplement local supply and ensure that consumers' needs are fully met," NAMBoard stated in an official notice.

"We will continue to monitor production and market trends closely, making adjustments where necessary to maintain market stability while protecting the interests of both producers and consumers," further read the notice. The suspension of the ban underscores the delicate balance between protecting domestic farmers and ensuring affordable access for consumers.

While the government's previous policy aimed to encourage local production, market realities including loan obligations and storage levels required a reassessment to avoid negative financial consequences for farmers and market disruption.

By lifting the ban, NAMBoard aims to stabilize supply and prices, allowing importers to complement domestic production without disadvantaging local producers.

This approach demonstrates a measured regulatory strategy that considers both market sustainability and the welfare of agricultural stakeholders.

NAMBoard, together with the ministry and NMC, has pledged to continue monitoring sugar bean production and imports.

The agriculture portfolio committee will review the situation further, assessing the accuracy of stock levels and ensuring that future policies align with actual market conditions. A report is expected within 14 days, providing guidance for any additional measures needed to maintain supply stability.

This development highlights the importance of coordinated policymaking in the agricultural sector. By balancing production incentives with market realities, Eswatini can support both farmers' livelihoods and consumers' access to essential foodstuffs.



THE Eswatini Communications Commission (ESCCOM) has strengthened its financial position, reporting an asset base of E52.7 million for the 2025 financial year, up from E46 million in 2024.

According to the regulator's latest annual report, this also revealed a sharp rise in trade and other receivables from E39.2 million to E45.2 million.

The commission said the growth reflects its stability and continued progress in fulfilling its mandate.

ESCCOM Chairperson, Dr Sibongile Ndlela-Simelane, said the commission remained committed to shaping Eswatini's digital future as regulator of electronic communications, broadcasting, and postal services, as well as custodian of data protection and cybersecurity.

"As a regulator of electronic communications, broadcasting and postal services, and as the custodian of data protection and cybersecurity in the kingdom, the commission continues to contribute meaningfully towards building an inclusive, secure, and digital Eswatini," she said.

Dr Ndlela-Simelane stressed that the mission of ESCCOM is centred on improving connectivity, lowering communication costs, safeguarding consumer rights, and strengthening overall service quality.

"In today's digital era, where technology underpins almost every aspect of life and business, cybersecurity and data protection have become paramount," she said.

The annual report shows that ESCCOM has been implementing the Data Protection Act, 2022 and the Computer Crime and Cybercrime Act, 2022, which expanded its oversight to include digital security and trust.

These responsibilities have placed ESCCOM at the core of ensuring that the country's digital ecosystem is safe, reliable, and conducive to innovation.

The regulator said it has focused on balancing affordability for consumers with the sustainability of licensed service providers.

According to Dr Ndlela-Simelane, most licensees remain financially stable, recording

revenue growth and investing strategically in infrastructure and innovation. These investments, she said, directly contribute to Eswatini's national development goals.

Through the Universal Access and Service Programme, ESCCOM has played a central role in improving connectivity in underserved and rural areas.

The programme also supports government efforts to digitise public service delivery, in line with Eswatini's National Digital Strategy.

That strategy is expected to usher in new opportunities in digital trade, e-Government, and inclusive social services, further embedding digital tools into the country's social and economic systems.

Despite the positive results, the commission acknowledged challenges in the communications sector. One key concern is the sustainability of internet service providers (ISPs). While consumer demand for internet access continues to rise, shrinking profit margins threaten the long-term viability of some ISPs.

Dr Ndlela-Simelane said collaboration with stakeholders would be essential to strengthen competitiveness and ensure the affordability of internet services.

"The rapid growth in demand cannot be ignored, but we also cannot allow unsustainable business models. We must work closely with service providers and partners to strike the right balance," she said.

Another area identified as requiring urgent attention is the regulation of courier services.

Dr Ndlela-Simelane said courier services are vital to the growth of e-commerce and Eswatini's competitiveness in the digital economy.

She highlighted the importance of fast-tracking the National Addressing System, which is designed to improve logistics, enhance delivery efficiency, and support businesses relying on online trade.

"Courier services are essential enablers of e-Commerce, and their proper regulation is critical for accelerating economic growth and national competitiveness," she said.

The report indicates that ESCCOM will continue to focus on expanding access to communications services, strengthening the digital ecosystem, and promoting affordable pricing while ensuring that providers remain sustainable.

Its regulatory agenda also includes, supporting the rollout of next-generation infrastructure to improve broadband coverage.

Ensuring strong consumer protection frameworks in both traditional and digital services and expanding data protection awareness and enforcement under the 2022 laws.

Dr Ndlela-Simelane emphasised that the commission's role is not limited to oversight but extends to enabling the environment for investment and growth in Eswatini's digital economy.

"As a commission, we are committed to not only regulating but also guiding the industry towards practices that create value for consumers and ensure the long-term competitiveness of our economy," she said.

With assets now valued at E52.7 million, ESCCOM has demonstrated financial growth while expanding its regulatory reach in a rapidly evolving sector.

The commission's efforts in implementing key digital laws, promoting universal access, and addressing affordability challenges show its determination to balance consumer needs with industry sustainability.

At the same time, the focus on courier services and e-Commerce underscores its recognition of new drivers of growth in the digital economy.

While challenges remain, particularly in maintaining ISP viability, ESCCOM's strengthened asset base and regulatory commitment position it to play a decisive role in Eswatini's digital transformation.

Enactus UNESWA Luyengo showcased Nutri Plume, which converts poultry feather waste into organic fertilizer to improve soil fertility, reduce agricultural waste, and create green jobs.

Judges assessed the teams based on innovation, business strategy, scalability, and measurable social impact. The panel commended the Eswatini team for its practical approach to waste management and its potential contribution to sustainable agriculture.

Reaching the Top 16 is a major boost for Eswatini's visibility in the global entrepreneurship space. For the University of Eswatini's Luyengo campus, it highlights the institution's ability to foster world-class in-

For the country, it demonstrates the potential of young entrepreneurs to address development challenges with business-oriented solutions.

"This advancement restores credibility to Eswatini's innovation ecosystem," said Sabelo Dlamini, Country Director of Enactus

"It proves to local and international stakeholders that our youth are capable of creating solutions to critical challenges," he said in addition.

Nutri Plume focuses on turning poultry feathers, a common waste product in Eswatini's agricultural sector, into a useful product. The resulting organic fertilizer supports farmers, contributes to soil health, and reduces environmental waste.

The project is positioned to meet both local and international needs. Locally, it addresses waste management and supports the agricultural economy. Internationally, it aligns with global efforts to promote circular economies and sustainable farming practices.

Wiseman Masika, CEO of Enactus UNES-WA Luyengo, said preparation for the World Cup was intense.

"Last year, we were disappointed not to make it through. Competing against teams like Korea and the UK motivated us to refine our model and present it more effectively. This result feels like redemption and has inspired us to push Nutri Plume to the next

level," he said.

The challenge now for Enactus UNESWA Luyengo is to turn Nutri Plume into a sustainable business. Analysts say the project will need to demonstrate clear commercial viability, build strong partnerships, and carefully manage scaling. Areas to focus on include:

- 1. Proving the product's effectiveness and securing buyers.
- 2. Forming partnerships with government, NGOs, and private investors.
- 3. Establishing reliable production and distribution channels.
- 4. Managing quality control and regulatory compliance.

Without strong execution, there is a risk the project could remain only a competition success. However, the international recognition creates opportunities to attract support and investment.

Eswatini's success also has regional importance. It shows that smaller economies can produce competitive, scalable solutions that gain global attention.

The project may encourage collaboration with neighboring countries facing similar agricultural and waste management issues.

Globally, Nutri Plume contributes to ongoing conversations about circular agriculture. If scaled, it could be adapted in other countries with poultry industries, helping to reduce waste and supply affordable organic fortilizations.

For Eswatini, the Top 16 finish aligns with broader national goals of promoting youth employment, sustainable farming, and environmental management. It also provides international visibility that can help attract external support.

"We are immensely proud of Team Enactus UNESWA Luyengo. Reaching this stage for the first time in five years makes the achievement even more remarkable. We

thank our partners and sponsors for their support in showcasing Eswatini's talent on the global stage," said Masika.

Eswatini's return to the Enactus World Cup Top 16 is more than a symbolic victory. Nutri Plume represents a practical business solution to local problems, with potential for regional and global impact.

The team's next task is to move beyond

competition success and prove that the project can survive as a commercial enterprise.

At the time of reporting, the team had already presented in the Top 16 round and was awaiting results scheduled for Sunday, September 28. The group is expected to return home on Tuesday, carrying both recognition and responsibility to turn Nutri Plume into a long-term success story.

Investors look to jobs data to support rate-cut path, pricey stock market

NEW YORK — Next week's U.S. jobs data may need to tread a fine line for Wall Street, revealing a cooling labor market that supports further interest rate cuts without fueling fears about a recession

While stocks have edged lower this week, U.S. equity indexes remain near record highs after a relentless rally that has put the benchmark S&P 500 on pace for its best third-quarter performance since 2020.

Some investors say the market's ascent is making stocks vulnerable to any disappointments

Complicating the release of the jobs data is the potential for a U.S. government shutdown next week that, should it come to pass, could mean the employment report is not released as scheduled next Friday.

The jobs data will help show whether the labor market is "simply experiencing a soft patch," said Mark Luschini, chief investment strategist at Janney Montgomery Scott.

"Nobody is expecting to see a blockbuster number here," Luschini said. "At the same time, were it to come in negative, it would confirm suspicions that perhaps the labor market is deteriorating rather rapidly, which obviously begs the question could

we actually be at the throes of a potential recession."

The report is expected to show non-farm payrolls rose by 39,000 in September, according to a Reuters poll of economists, after an increase of 22,000 the prior month. The unemployment rate is estimated to be 4.3 per cent.

The Federal Reserve this month cut interest rates for the first time this year after signs of struggle in the labor market. The central bank is expected to enact another standard quarter-percentage point rate reduction at its next meeting at the end of October and perhaps one more at its last meeting of the year in December.

Expectations of such monetary easing, including more cuts in 2026, have helped drive the latest leg of a rally in which the S&P 500 has posted 25 record closing highs over the past three months.

With inflation still elevated, however, investors are wary that a strong employment report could lead the Fed to slow down

its pace of cuts. The Fed raised rates from March 2022 to July 2023 to get inflation under control.

Fed Chair Jerome Powell this week said near-term inflation risks were "tilted to the upside" as he noted a "challenging situation" facing the central bank.

"What people are looking for, is if jobs come in a lot more benign...are we looking at just maybe one cut or no cuts for the rest of the year?" said Marta Norton, chief investment strategist at retirement and wealth services provider Empower.

Ahead of the jobs data next week is a deadline for congressional Democrats and Republicans to come to an agreement to fund the government and avoid a partial shutdown.

While investors have tended to shrug off past shutdowns, such an event this time could cause more angst in markets.

One factor is elevated stock valuations, with the S&P 500 now on track for its third-straight year of double-digit percentage gains.

The index was last trading at 22.8 times expected 12-month earnings for its constituents, according to LSEG Datastream. That is around its highest level in five years and well above its 10-year average of 18.7.

"Valuations are at extremes," Norton said. "It means a low immune system for any sort of risk that's out there." (Reuters)

OPEC+ plans another oil output hike in November

MOSCOW/LONDON — OPEC+ will likely approve another oil production increase of at least 137,000 barrels per day at its meeting next Sunday, as rising oil prices encourage the group to try to further regain market share, three sources familiar with the talks said.

OPEC+ has reversed its strategy of output cuts from April and has already raised quotas by more than 2.5 million barrels per day, representing about 2.4 per cent of world demand, to boost market share and after coming under pressure from U.S. President Donald Trump to lower oil prices.

Eight OPEC+ countries will hold an online meeting on October 5 to decide on November output. OPEC+ pumps about half of the world's oil and includes the Organization of the Petroleum Exporting Countries plus Russia and other allies.

OPEC headquarters and authorities in Saudi Arabia did not immediately respond to requests for comment.

What have oil prices been doing?

Oil prices have fallen from over \$80 per barrel at the start of the year but have mostly traded in a narrow range of \$60-\$70 per barrel since OPEC began production increases in April.

On Friday, prices rose to their highest since August 1, hitting levels above \$70 per barrel, supported by Ukrainian drone attacks on Russia's energy infrastructure which

disrupted refining and shipments from one of the world's biggest oil exporters.

The group's total output reductions amounted at their peak to 5.85 million bpd, made up of three different elements - voluntary cuts of 2.2 million bpd, plus 1.65 million bpd by eight members, and another 2.0 million bpd by the whole group.

Further increase to be discussed

The eight producers plan to fully unwind one element of those cuts - 2.2 million bpd - by the end of September. For October, they started removing a second layer, of 1.65 million bpd, with an increase of 137,000 bpd.

OPEC+ also gave the United Arab Emirates approval to boost production by 300,000 bpd between April and September.

The November increase to be discussed on October 5 will amount to at least 137,000 bpd, equal to the October hike, the three sources said. A final decision has not been made, the sources said.

OPEC+ hikes have fallen short of the pledged amounts because most members are pumping at capacity, analysts have said.

OPEC+'s third group-wide layer of cuts of 2 million bpd is due to last until the end of 2026. (**Reuters**)

US agrees South Korea not a currency manipulator, Seoul says

THE United States has agreed that South Korea is not manipulating its currency for trade advantage, a spokesperson for President Lee Jae Myung said on Sunday.

The two allies agreed that Seoul does not fall under the manipulator designation that the U.S. Treasury Department announces in reports twice a year, Kang Yu-jung told a press conference.

Officials at the U.S. embassy in Seoul could not be reached for comment outside business hours. The administration of President Joe Biden added South Korea to a manipulation monitoring list in November due to its large current account surplus and its sizable trade surplus with the U.S. The government of Donald Trumpkept Seoul on the list in June.

Under a 2015 U.S. law, Washington can take "remedial action" against countries that do not "correct the undervaluation of their currency and trade surplus with the United

States".

The South Korea-U.S. deal is not related to talks on a currency swap as part of bilateral negotiations over Trump's tariffs on South Korean goods, South Korean officials said.

President Lee told Treasury Secretary Scott Bessent on Wednesday in New York that the Asian country needs a foreign exchange swap in order to make the \$350 billion investment it has pledged in the tariff talks, Finance Minister Koo Yun-cheol said on Saturday. Koo quoted Bessent as saying he would discuss the issue with other U.S. officials and get back to South Korea.

South Korean National Security Adviser Wi Sung-lac reiterated on Saturday that Seoul cannot pay the \$350 billion "upfront", as Trump has suggested in recent days. President Lee told Reuters this month that South Korea's economy could fall into crisis rivalling its 1997 meltdown if the government accepted the U.S. demands without safeguards.

Koo said he had not heard anything about a Wall Street Journal report that Commerce Secretary Howard Lutnick had discussed raising the \$350 billion investment. (Reuters)

How a South African vineyard is making better wine thanks to cattle and ducks

A historic wine estate near Stellenbosch is turning to cattle, sheep and ducks to improve the quality of its vineyards.

Hartenberg Wine Estate says it has become the first in South Africa to earn international certification for regenerative farming, practices that restore soil health and boost biodiversity.

It is not the typical winemaker who herds cattle between his vineyards. Viticulturalist Wilhelm Joubert oversees 80 hectares of vineyard production at Hartenberg Wine Estate, near Stellenbosch. Hartenberg says it became the first vineyard in South Africa to receive Ecological Outcome Verification from the Savory Institute in the US in 2025.

The certification recognizes the farm's regenerative viticulture practices, which aim to restore and enhance the ecosystem in and around the vineyard.

"The way we are farming, the focus is on soil: to improve soil, and soil is complex. But soil health is part of that. It is to farm in a way that we are actually regenerating our soil by using less input from outside," Joubert says.

Cattle and sheep for better soil health

One of the regenerative practices here is the cattle that graze cover crops between

Their saliva, dung and urine all aid in soil health. Dung beetles are proliferating, spreading the manure deeper into the soil. When cover crops are in full bloom during the wet months, wasps, butterflies, bees and

The farm has not used pesticides or herbicides for two years. Cover crops also help retain water, reducing the need for irrigation.

Sheep further enrich the soil, while runner

A research project at Hartenberg

To address the shortage of scientific data on regenerative viticulture, Stellen-

bosch University began a three-year study at Hartenberg in 2025. The Regenwine project involves 11 scientists and six students across disciplines including agronomy, animal science, viticulture, oenology, process engineering, agricultural economics and soil

One of the researchers, postgraduate student Kaiden Jacobs, is counting species of cover crops. "I think if I look at the project in a broader picture, from what we initially discussed, it's kind of to see how we can create climate-resilient farming," Jacobs says.

Viticulture master's student Dylan Endeacott is also participating in the study, funded by South Africa Wine. He carried out a preliminary study in 2024 at Hartenberg, comparing grape and wine output from cattle-grazed and non-cattle-grazed plots.

"With the study that we saw from last year on the Shiraz block, the control berries were larger than the grazed berries. Smaller berries normally lead to higher quality wines," Endeacott says. The positive results from grazed vineyards align with the estate's own data, which was analysed at an independent laboratory.

"We had a very interesting trial comparing a regenerative vineyard with a regenerative vineyard with livestock in it," says Reynie Oosthuizen, head winemaker at Hartenberg. "We found that the vineyard with livestock had almost 0.5% lower alcohol. The wine had higher anthocyanins and tannins, giving it more structure, but at the same time there was finesse." Guinea voters endorse post-coup constitution, partial results show

VOTERS in Guinea overwhelmingly backed constitution that could allow coup leader Mamady Doumbouya to run for president if he chooses to, according to partial results.

The constitution looked set to pass with 90.6 percent votes in favour and 9.4 percent against, the head of Guinea's General Directorate of Elections, Djenabou Toure, told reporters late on Monday. Those figures were based on 91 percent of the votes cast in Sunday's referendum.

An overall figure for voter turnout was not available, but officials had counted more than 4.8 million votes out of more than 6.6 million registered voters, meaning turnout had exceeded 70 percent.

Critics called the results a power grab, but the military government said the referendum paves the way for a return to civilian rule. The presidential election is currently expected to take place in December.

Reporting from the capital, Conakry, Al Jazeera's Ahmed Idris said members of the opposition were opposed to the referendum.

"The elections were held all across Guinea with no incidents at all - 45,000 security forces were deployed. ...

The opposition said this is a way of harassing the voters," he said.

Presidential election

Doumbouya, a 40-year-old former member of the French Foreign Legion, voted along with his wife at a health centre in Conakry, wearing sunglasses and a baseball cap with a drawing of a traditional mask symbolising fertility.

He seized power in Guinea, home to the world's largest reserves of bauxite, in 2021. It was part of a wave of eight coups that swept West and Central Africa from 2020 to 2023.

A charter adopted after the coup barred members of the transitional government

from seeking office. But that language was not included in the constitution put to voters on Sunday.

Doumbouya has not said yet whether he intends to run for office.

The country's two main opposition lead-

ers, Cellou Dalein Diallo and deposed former President Alpha Conde, are among those who called for a boycott of the referendum.

Their political parties are currently suspended, and Human Rights Watch has accused the government of disappearing political opponents and arbitrarily suspending media outlets.

The government has denied any role in disappearances but has promised to investigate such allegations.

THE Trump administration is considering imposing tariffs on foreign electronic devices based on the number of chips in each one, according to three people familiar with the matter, as it seeks to drive companies to shift manufacturing to the United States.

According to the plan, which has not previously been reported and could change, the Commerce Department would impose a tariff equal to a percentage of the estimated value of the product's chip content.

The Commerce Department did not immediately respond to requests for comment.

"America cannot be reliant on foreign imports for the semiconductor products that are essential for our national and economic security," White House spokesperson Kush Desai responded when asked about the details.


"The Trump administration is implementing a nuanced, multi-faceted approach to reshoring critical manufacturing back to the United States with tariffs, tax cuts, deregulation, and energy abundance."

If implemented, the plan would show the Trump administration is seeking to hit a wide range of consumer products, from toothbrushes to laptops, potentially driving up inflation as it seeks to ramp up U.S. manufacturing.

The plan could push up the cost of consumer goods "at a time when the U.S. has an inflationary problem, with inflation clearly above the Fed's target and accelerating," said Michael Strain, an economist with the conservative American Enterprise Institute. The Federal Reserve's target inflation rate is

Even domestically produced items would likely become more expensive, thanks to new tariffs on key inputs needed to make those goods, Strain added.

U.S. President Donald Trump has deployed an array of tariffs aimed at bolstering American manufacturing, announcing on Thursday sweeping new import tariffs, in-

cluding 100% duties on branded drugs and 25% levies on heavy-duty trucks, triggering fresh trade uncertainty after a period of relative calm.

In April, the Trump administration announced probes into imports of pharmaceuticals and semiconductors as part of a bid to impose tariffs on them, arguing that extensive reliance on their foreign production poses a national security threat.

But questions have swirled about the universe of products containing chips that would be hit by the tariffs, the tariff rates, and whether any countries, products, or companies would be exempt.

Trump said in August the United States would impose a tariff of about 100% on imports of semiconductors but exempted companies that are manufacturing in the U.S. or have committed to do so.

The biggest chipmakers outside the U.S. include Taiwan Semiconductor Manufacturing Co (2330.TW), opens new tab and South Korea's Samsung Electronics (005930.KS), opens new tab.

One of the sources consulted by Reuters said the Commerce Department was considering a 25% tariff rate for chip-related

content in imported devices, with 15% rates for electronics from Japan and the European Union, stressing the figures were preliminary.

The sources added that the Commerce Department has also eyed a dollar-for-dollar exemption based on investment in U.S.-based manufacturing only if a company moves half its production to the U.S., but it was unclear how it would work or whether it would move forward. The investment exemption was previously reported by the Wall Street Journal.

Telegram's Durov says France asked to remove some Moldovan channels from app

PAVEL Durov, the billionaire founder of the Telegram messaging app, accused French intelligence on Sunday of having asked him through an intermediary to censor some Moldovan voices in return for help with his court case in France.

Moldovans were voting in a parliamentary election on Sunday that could have a major impact on the government's quest to join the European Union, as a pro-Russian opposition group seeks to steer the nation away from closer ties with the bloc.

In a post in English on X, the French foreign ministry noted that Durov had made similar accusations about France trying to manipulate politics in Romania earlier this year, around the time of elections there: "After Romania, Moldova. @durov likes making accusations while elections are ongoing."

Durov was arrested in 2024 at a French airport and is under judicial supervision in France while being investigated for suspected organised crime on the app.

Durov denies guilt and has said the accusations by France are "legally and logically absurd".

DUROV SAYS HE WAS ASKED TO CENSOR CHANNELS

Durov said on Sunday that while he was stuck in Paris, French intelligence used an

intermediary, whom he did not identify, to ask him to "censor" some Telegram channels for the Moldovan government.

Durov said "a few that clearly violated our rules" were removed and that the intermediary told him that in exchange, French intelligence would "say good things" about him to the judge who ordered his arrest, which he said was "unacceptable".

"If the agency did in fact approach the judge — it constituted an attempt to interfere in the judicial process," Durov said. "If it did not, and merely claimed to have done so, then it was exploiting my legal situation in France to influence political developments in Eastern Europe...."

FRANCE DENIED PAST ACCUSATIONS

Durov said in May that the head of France's foreign intelligence agency asked him to ban Romanian conservative voices ahead of elections there. France's DGSE, the foreign intelligence service, denied that at the time.

Telegram was founded by Durov, who left Russia in 2014 after he refused to comply with demands to shut down opposition communities on his VK social media platform, which he has sold.

The encrypted application, with over 1 billion monthly active users,

UN arms embargo, other sanctions reimposed on Iran over nuclear programme

THE United Nations has reinstated an arms embargo and other sanctions on Iran over its nuclear programme following a process triggered by European powers that Tehran has warned will be met with a harsh response.

Britain, France and Germany initiated the return of sanctions on Iran at the U.N. Security Council over accusations it had violated a 2015 deal that aimed to stop it developing a nuclear bomb. Iran denies seeking nuclear weapons.

The end of the decade-long nuclear deal originally agreed by Iran, Britain, Germany, France, the United States, Russia and China is likely to exacerbate tensions in the Middle East, just months after Israel and the U.S. bombed Iranian nuclear sites.

U.N. sanctions imposed by the Security Council in resolutions adopted between 2006 and 2010 were reinstated at 8 p.m. EDT on Saturday (0000 GMT on Sunday). Attempts to delay the return of all sanctions on Iran failed on the sidelines of the annual gathering of world leaders at the U.N. this week

"We urge Iran and all states to abide fully by these resolutions," the foreign ministers of France, Britain and Germany said in a joint statement after the deadline passed.

European Union foreign policy chief Kaja Kallas confirmed in a statement on Sunday that the bloc would "now proceed to implement the re-imposition of all previously lifted UN and EU nuclear-related sanctions without delay".

Israel hailed the reimposition of sanctions on its arch foe as a "major development", citing what it called Tehran's ongoing violations over the nuclear programme.

"The goal is clear: prevent a nuclear-armed Iran. The world must use every tool to achieve this goal," the Israeli Foreign Ministry said in a post on X.

IRAN CALLS IN AMBASSADORS

Tehran has warned of a harsh response to the reimposition of sanctions. Iran said on Saturday it was recalling its ambassadors to Britain, France and Germany for consultations. But Iranian President Masoud Pezeshkian said on Friday Iran had no intention of leaving the nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty.

"It is unlawful, and it cannot be implemented," Russian Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov told reporters at the U.N. earlier on Saturday, adding that he had written to U.N. Secretary-General Antonio Guterres warning that it would be "a major mistake" for him to acknowledge a return of U.N. sanctions on Iran.

The European powers had offered to delay reinstating sanctions for up to six months to allow space for talks on a long-term deal if Iran restored access for U.N. nuclear inspectors, addressed concerns about its stock of enriched uranium, and engaged in talks with the United States.

"Our countries will continue to pursue diplomatic routes and negotiations. The reimposition of U.N. sanctions is not the end of diplomacy," the foreign ministers of Britain, France and Germany said, urging Iran to "return to compliance".

U.S. Secretary of State Marco Rubio said in a statement President Donald Trump has been clear that diplomacy is still an option for Iran and a deal remains the best outcome for the Iranian people and the world.

"For that to happen, Iran must accept direct talks, held in good faith, without stalling or obfuscation," Rubio said, adding that until there was a new deal it was important for countries to implement sanctions "immediately in order to pressure Iran's leaders".

Iran's economy is already struggling with crippling U.S. sanctions reimposed since 2018 after Trump ditched the pact during his first term.

Iran's rial currency continued to weaken over fears of new sanctions. The rial fell to 1,123,000 per U.S. dollar, a new record low, on Saturday, from about 1,085,000 on Friday, according to foreign exchange websites, including Bon-bast.com.

With the return of U.N. sanctions, Iran will again be subjected to an arms embargo and a ban on all uranium enrichment and reprocessing activities, as well as any activity related to ballistic missiles capable of delivering nuclear weapons.

Other sanctions to be reimposed include a travel ban on dozens of Iranian citizens, asset freezes on dozens of people and entities and a ban on the supply of anything that could be used in the nation's nuclear programme.

All countries are authorised to seize and dispose of any items banned under U.N. sanctions and Iran will be prohibited from acquiring an interest in any commercial activity in another country involving uranium mining, production or use of nuclear materials and technology.

Russia pounds Kyiv, other regions in mass drone and missile attack

RUSSIA launched hundreds of drones and missiles at Kyiv and other parts of Ukraine early on Sunday, killing at least four people and injuring dozens, in one of the most sustained attacks on the capital since the full-scale war began.

Neighbouring Poland closed its airspace near two southeastern cities and its air force scrambled jets in response until the danger had passed.

Ukraine's military said that Russia launched 595 drones and 48 missiles overnight and its air defences shot down 568 drones and 43 missiles. It noted that the main target of the strike was the capital Kyiv.

President Volodymyr Zelenskiy said the attack, which lasted more than 12 hours, damaged a cardiology clinic, factories and residential buildings.

Russia's defence ministry said on Sunday it had carried out a "massive" attack on Ukraine using long-range air and sea-based weapons and drones to target military infrastructure, including airfields.

Moscow has denied targeting civilians in its war against Ukraine, although thousands have been killed and residential areas extensively damaged by its attacks.

ZELENSKIY URGES INTERNATION-AL PARTNERS TO ACT

Zelenskiy again urged the international community to act decisively to cut off Russia's energy revenues that fund its invasion. Ukraine has so far failed to convince U.S. President Donald Trump to impose punitive sanctions on Moscow.

"The time for decisive action is long over-

due, and we count on a strong response from the United States, Europe, the G7, and the G20," he said on the Telegram messaging app.

Kyiv awoke to loud explosions, drones flying overhead and air defences booming. Smoke from one of the strike sites drifted across the morning sky as the air raid alert ended at 09:13 a.m. (0613 GMT), nearly sev-

en hours after it began.

Reuters journalists visited an area in the suburbs of Kyiv, where rows of newly built homes were almost totally destroyed, and parked cars flattened by falling debris.

Residents sifted through the wreckage of an apartment block after their windows were blown in by the force of a blast.

Some people hurried to metro stations un-

derground, from where they followed events on their mobile phones.

UKRAINE'S DEFENCES STRETCHED BY LARGE-SCALE ATTACKS

Attacks on such a scale have stretched Ukraine's limited air defences throughout 2025. Zelenskiy said on Saturday an additional, opens new tab Patriot missile system from Israel had been deployed and he expected two more to arrive this autumn.

He and other officials have asked international partners for more to protect Ukraine's skies, but air defence systems are limited in availability and other nations are keen to bolster their defences amid perceived threats from Russia.

Zelenskiy said Sunday's attack targeted several regions, including the southern city of Zaporizhzhia, where authorities said at least 16 people were injured.

Emergency services said at least four people were killed, while 67 people were reported wounded across the country by local authorities.

Among the fatalities was a 12-year-old girl, although that has not been officially confirmed, Tymur Tkachenko, head of Kyiv's military administration, said on Telegram.

Touching the Hem of His Garment!

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WHEN the lights dimmed at Jesus Calls Worship Centre International in Matsapha on Friday, September 26, 2025, anticipation filled the air like incense.

It was more than just another gospel gathering, more than another night of melodies and microphones. It was the longawaited live recording of Touching the Hem of His Garment, the brainchild of gospel minister Tanele Mnisi, and it proved to be a night where artistry, faith, and history wove together into something unforgettable.

The most striking element of the evening was the music itself. Far from being a recycling of gospel's familiar anthems, the setlist breathed with originality and freshness. Each song carried a deep, Spirit-filled message, yet was wrapped in arrangements that made the entire night feel like a carefully orchestrated journey.

"These were not the same old songs," one attendee remarked on social media, "they were alive, they were new, and they spoke directly to us." Indeed, from start to finish, the progression of the program felt intentional, like a pilgrimage rather than a performance. The congregation was not simply listening; they were participants in something that drew them deeper, step by step. Behind Tanele Mnisi was a band whose precision and passion elevated the night to even greater heights.

"What a gift she is to the body of Christ and Eswatini," remarked one of the attendees. If this were only the beginning, then the gospel landscape of Eswatini is set for a remarkable future. And perhaps, years from now, when people look back at the evolution of the nation's gospel sound, they will remember that on a Friday night in September 2025, in a worship centre in Matsapha, something shifted, and it all began when Tanele Mnisi invited the world to touch the hem of His garment.

A 2019 review identified a link between micronutrient deficiencies and cutaneous abnormalities in hair, skin, and nails.

Examples of cutaneous abnormalities include:

- acne
- psoriasis
- other skin conditions

In particular, researchers said low intake or low absorption of certain vitamins and minerals may be the culprit.

These vitamins and minerals include:

- **B** vitamins
- fat-soluble vitamins like A, E, and K

- copper
- selenium essential fatty acids

Similarly, a 2017 study concluded that multiple kinds of nutrient deficiencies can result in hair loss.

"Layers of the skin are connected to a huge vascular network, and our hair follicles and roots are also fed by a blood supply we want to be nutrient rich," explains Amir Sadri, M.D., a consultant plastic surgeon at Great Ormond Street Hospital.

These direct connections with the bloodstream mean the skin and hair are often the first place you can visibly see nutrient deficiencies. Sadri says any factors that affect the hair will also affect the nails.

"This is because they're both made from keratin," he explains.

What the diet can and can't do

A healthy diet can improve your skin, hair and nail health. However, the importance of diet shouldn't be overstated, as there will always be other factors at play.

These factors can include:

- genetics
- general health status


However, Rimmer believes there are several ways to support hair, skin, and nail health through your diet.

These include:

eat a varied diet with lots of colors and textures

- increase protein and iron intake
- limit alcohol consumption
- limit sugar consumption
- favor healthy fats over processed and

saturated fats

A balanced diet containing lots of colors and textures is best. She also says increasing your protein and iron intake is key.

"Protein helps with new cell generation and will benefit as an all rounder," she ex-

"Iron is another building block for the integumentary system and it's abundant in red meat. If you are vegetarian or vegan then max out your diet with pulses (beans and lentils) to ensure you're getting your recommended daily amount," Rimmer suggests.

However, it's important not to take an iron supplement without speaking with a healthcare professional first. Iron supplements can lead to constipation and, less commonly,

It is also best to limit certain foods and

"Drinking too much alcohol and eating highly processed, sugary, and fatty food is not good for your skin, hair, and nails," says Savas Altan, medical aesthetic at Vera Clinic."Over time, alcohol consumption can cause dry, brittle, breaking hair, and cause excessive hair loss."

Likewise. Altan says excess sugar in the diet can encourage the degradation of collagen and elastin in your skin.

This can prompt a loss of firmness and elasticity long term, causing sagging and wrinkles on the skin.

Does sleep affect your hair, skin, and nail health?

A 2019 study involving forty subjects suggests that there's a potential link between sleep quality and acne.

"While you're sleeping your body is busy recovering," says Rimmer. "Collagen production increases, peaking within the first few hours of sleep."

That said, a lack of sleep may affect your hair, skin, and nails even more.

"You could argue that the hair, skin, and nails are last in the queue to benefit from lifestyle factors," says Rimmer. "They'll also be the first to deteriorate with sleep deprivation."

Sleep and stress hormones

Sadri adds that a lack of sleep can cause a rise in stress hormone cortisol which interferes with our body's ability to mend itself

In turn, this can cause brittle nails, skin inflammation, and problems with hair growth.

The general advice is for adults to get at least 7 hours of sleep per night. However, Rimmer says sleep needs can vary from individual to individual, so you may feel you

At-home treatments to try

There are many at-home and in-salon solutions you can try to help boost the health of your skin, hair, and nails.

For hair

Rimmer recommends looking for products that contain ketoconazole.

"It's an ingredient in shampoo used to treat fungal infections, but it can also be useful for those with thinning hair," she says. It's "commonly prescribed as a first line supplement to help with thinning hair. There have been studies to demonstrate a thickening of the hair shaft and number of hairs" with its use.

Sadri also recommends looking for products with the following ingredients:

rosemary oil

- biotin
- vitamin A
- vitamin C

vitamin E They keep your scalp healthy and nourish your hair follicles, he says.

It is best to avoid sulfates. These are often found in shampoos and are used to create a lather. According to Rimmer, they can irritate the scalp and negatively impact hair growth.

For skin

"The 'go to' essentials for skin include a facial cleanser used morning and night for a full minute, rinsed away with tepid water, and patted dry with kitchen paper, keeping the skin oil and debris free," says Rimmer.

What products you use will mostly depend on your skin type. However, Rimmer says every skin care routine should include SPF. She says an oil-free SPF should be applied every day regardless of the weather forecast.

Lastly, Rimmer recommends retinol, a derivative of vitamin A, to refine skin texture and improve uneven skin tone.

It is best to avoid oil. Oil is a popular inredient in skin care products. However, Rimmer believes it may be best avoided if you have breakout-prone skin.

"I know there are lots of celebrities who endorse the use of oil, but for me it's a big no," she says. "In my opinion, it only serves to increase the likelihood of breakouts and problem pigmentation and doesn't serve the health of your skin."

For nails

"The constant exposure to weather and water (not to mention ingredients in soaps and alcohol rubs) leaves cuticles dry and brittle," says Rimmer.

Serotonin is found in many parts of the body, including the digestive system, blood platelets, and the central nervous system. It's also thought to regulate mood.

Serotonin is made from the essential amino acid tryptophan. This amino acid enters the body through the food you eat and is commonly found in meat, dairy products, eggs, and nuts.

What does serotonin do?

Serotonin affects every part of you — from your emotions to your motor skills. It helps with sleeping, healing, and digesting. Serotonin is also thought to be a natural mood stabilizer.

Serotonin helps your body to:

- balance your mood and experience pleasure
- heal wounds
- clot blood
- control movement
- More specifically, serotonin intervenes in these functions:

Bowel movements: About 90% of the serotonin in your body is produced in your intestines. It helps control bowel movements and function.

Mood: Serotonin in the brain is believed to regulate feelings, including happiness and anxiety. Selective serotonin reuptake inhibitors (SSRIs) are thought to help treat mood disorders by increasing serotonin activity in your brain.

Nausea: Serotonin in your stomach and intestines helps your body feel nausea and start vomiting in response to illness, foods, or other conditions.

Sleep and waking: Neurotransmitters, including serotonin, regulate your ability to stay awake. While you sleep, serotonin is involved in switching between REM and non-REM sleep.

Blood clotting: Platelets in your blood store serotonin. When your body needs to repair damage, platelets release serotonin to help stop bleeding and heal wounds.

Sex drive: Serotonin is involved in controlling the body's sexual functions. This may be why medications that affect serotonin levels are associated with sexual side effects.



Some medications used to manage mental health conditions work by changing how your brain uses serotonin. Early theories suggested that chronic low serotonin is the main cause of depression. However, recent research now suggests this process is likely more complicated.

Mood disorders like depression may be caused by a combination of factors, including brain changes, life experiences, and health conditions. Even so, antidepressant medications continue to be an important first-line treatment for mood disorders, along with psychotherapy.

municator found in the brain and many other parts of the body.

Both of these neurotransmitters are associated with your mental well-being, so it can be easy to confuse them. But there are also some key differences between the two.

How to increase serotonin

Only a healthcare professional can determine if you need to boost your serotonin levels. High levels of serotonin may lead to toxicity and unwanted side effects, so it's important to take your medications following a doctor's recommendations.

Medication, as well as natural options, can increase serotonin levels.

SSRIs

SSRIs are the most commonly prescribed type of antidepressant medication. They increase serotonin levels in the brain by blocking the reabsorption of serotonin, so more of it remains active.

There are several SSRIs, including fluoxetine (Prozac) and sertraline (Zoloft).

When you're taking medications that affect serotonin, you'll want to speak with a doctor before using other medications or supplements. Mixing medications may put you at risk of a serious condition called serotonin syndrome.

Supplements

Some supplements may have the ability to raise serotonin levels. However, they're not a replacement for medications prescribed by a doctor and should not be taken alongside medications that affect your serotonin levels.

Supplements that may affect serotonin

include:

St. John's wort: The herb St. John's wort increases serotonin in the body. Some believe it is effective for treating depression, but this has not always been supported by research.

SAMe: This supplement is promoted as a treatment for depression, but more research is needed to understand its effects on mood and serotonin levels.

Tryptophan: This substance can be converted into serotonin in your brain, potentially raising your serotonin levels. Some research suggests it could help improve mood and reduce anxiety.

All of these supplements can increase your risk for serotonin syndrome, as well as cause other side effects and interactions.

Speak with a healthcare professional before trying any new supplements or herbal remedies, especially if you're taking prescription drugs.

Natural serotonin boosters

The following strategies may help you balance your serotonin levels and improve your mood:

Exposure to bright light: Bright sunlight may help your mood, which is why light therapy is commonly recommended for treating seasonal depression. SAD lamps are an option for home therapy in winter or when access to bright sunlight is difficult.

Exercise: Regular exercise has many benefits for overall health. It can have mood-boosting effects and may trigger the release of serotonin.

Health-promoting diet: Following a balanced diet lowers the risk of many health conditions. Although research is limited, eating foods that may promote serotonin production could positively affect mood.

Meditation: Meditating can help relieve stress and promote a positive outlook on life. What is serotonin syndrome?

Medications, supplements, and other substances that increase serotonin levels in your body can lead to serotonin syndrome.

Serotonin syndrome can happen when you:

- start taking a new medication that boosts serotonin levels
- increase the dosage of an existing medication
- take more medication than the amount prescribed
- use an additional medication, supplement, or drug that also affects serotonin levels

The symptoms of serotonin syndrome include:

- tremors
- sweating
- nausea vomiting
- vointingrestlessness
- anxiety

Severe symptoms can include:

- headache
- flushed skin
- dilated pupils
- disorientation
- increased reflexes (hyperreflexia)
- muscle twitches or spasms
- high fever
- muscle stiffness
- rapid heart rate
- high blood pressure
- irregular heartbeat

To diagnose serotonin syndrome, a doctor will perform a detailed history and physical exam.

Dominant Europe on the brink of historic Ryder Cup triumph

EUROPE golfers were poised to complete a historic Ryder Cup victory over the United States as Sunday's concluding singles matches teed off at Bethpage Black.

The Europeans seized the largest lead in Ryder Cup history entering the singles at 11.5-4.5 by going 3-1 in both Saturday pairs sessions despite an over-the-top crowd and hecklers forcing extra police around Europe talisman Rory McIlroy.

And Norway's Viktor Hovland withdrew from singles on Sunday morning due to a neck injury, leaving his planned match against Harris English declared a draw and moving the team score to 12-5.

That means Europe need only two wins from the 11 remaining singles matches to retain the trophy and achieve the first road triumph in the biennial rivalry since their 2012 "Miracle at Medinah".

"It would be a massive victory for the European team," said England's Justin Rose, who teed off against Cameron Young in the singles open-

The Americans, however, need the greatest last-day comeback in Cup history to reclaim the trophy. It would take another nine wins and a draw and no team has managed more than 8.5 points from singles.

A European triumph would be their 11th in the past 15 Cup showdowns and their fourth on the road in that span.

Americans lead the all-time rivalry 27-15-2 but Europe lead 12-9-1 since



the roster was expanded beyond Britain and Ireland in 1979.

McIlroy, who made obscene remarks to hecklers as they yelled while he tried to putt, shook off ugly scenes to spark Europe.

Unbeaten world No 2 McIlroy, who completed a career Grand Slam by winning April's Masters, faces top-ranked but winless Scottie Scheffler in the feature fourth singles match.

Scheffler, whose six wins this year include the British Open and PGA Championship, is the first American to start 0-4 and has been a symbol for a US squad with 12 of the world's 23 top-ranked players that has been humbled by the visitors, who boast nine of the top 25 on their roster.

'IT FUELED US'

It was only four years ago that the US team inflicted the most lopsided rout in Cup history on Europe, winning 19-9 at Whistling Straits.

"It fueled a lot of us," Hovland said of the memories.

Europe captain Luke Donald, who guided Europe's 2023 win at Rome, could become the first captain to win back-to-back Cups since English countryman Tony Jacklin in 1987.

England's Tommy Fleetwood, 4-0 this week, faces Justin Thomas in the second match out.

Fleetwood, who also went 4-0 in pairs matches in 2018, is trying to become the first European to go 5-0 on the road, five Cup road wins only managed by American Tony Lima in 1965.

Marquez wins seventh MotoGP crown

WHEN Marc Marquez crossed the line at the Japanese Grand Prix on Sunday, there was no longer any doubt, not about the title that felt inevitable for weeks, but that he had achieved something deeper by completing one of MotoGP's greatest comebacks.

Six years had passed since he last stood proudly on the summit of motorcycle racing - years filled with doubts, crashes, broken bones and whispers of retirement when the most dominant rider on the grid often looked like a ghost of himself.

But aboard the red Ducati that had once been his nemesis, he was not just winning races but conquering the grid as he got his hands on the elusive seventh premier class crown to go level with long-time rival and MotoGP great Valentino Rossi.

"I'm at peace with myself... It was the most difficult challenge of my career. I arrived in MotoGP and straight away I was winning," Marquez said after the finish at Motegi.

"But then, from the glory, I was in the deepest (lowest) moment of my career with a lot of injuries ... But I never gave up!"

SIX TITLES WITH HON-DA

There had been a time when Marquez was untouchable, a whirlwind in Honda's red and orange when he was crowned champion as a 20-year-old rookie in 2013, before the new kid on the block became the man to beat when he lifted his sixth title in 2019.

But a crash in the season-opener in 2020 changed everything, his arm broken and his ambitions shattered.

Yamaha and Ducati also got their act together with superior bikes that gave Marquez a run for his money and as he desperately began riding the Honda beyond its limits, he inevitably suffered numerous crashes.

What followed was not just physical torment involving multiple surgeries, aborted comebacks and blurred vision, but also the erosion of confidence.

Even Marquez began to won-

der if it was all worth it as he pondered retirement before jumping ship to Gresini Racing.

A year with Gresini gave him a renewed sense of belief as he registered his first victory in 1 043 days and an impressive campaign on a year-old Ducati bike convinced the Italian manufacturer to give him the factory seat.

It was a match made in heaven as the best rider on the grid became one with the fastest machine and Marquez has not looked back since, claiming he was 'reborn' as he racked up wins – even when he started on the second row.

As other riders nervously looked over their shoulders while leading races, Marquez enjoyed the thrill of the hunt, waiting for the opportune moment to pounce before he became a red speck in the distance

MOTOGP'S SIBLING RI-Valry

Never before this season had two siblings finished first and second in any class of Grand Prix racing, but Marc and Alex Marquez did it so often in 2025, it became background noise.

Just like tennis' Williams sisters, they pushed each other to their limits and left the chasing pack far behind, a supporting act to a family drama unfolding on circuits around the world.

Twice champion Francesco Bagnaia's challenge faded away as he failed to come to grips with the new Ducati bike, and when Marc clinched seven straight sprint-race doubles, the fight was virtually over as the small gap to Alex became a gaping chasm.

Pedro Acosta had said it best when he predicted Marquez would complete "one of the greatest comebacks" in sport.

"We can compare this with Michael Jordan, when he went to play baseball and then came back to basketball" to win three more NBA titles, Acosta said.

Marc brought up match point in Misano - on Rossi territory where the Italian's fans cheered when the Spaniard crashed in the sprint before they were silenced when he exacted revenge by winning the race.

Arsenal were furious moments later when when Pope escaped conceding a penalty.

Referee Jarred Gillett initially pointed to the spot but was instructed by VAR to review the incident and overturned his original de-



cision for a touch on the ball by Pope before he wiped out Viktor Gyokeres.

Leandro Trossard then hit the post as Arsenal continued to press for the opening goal.

The world No 3 from Germany kept his calm to beat the Frenchman 7-5, 3-6, 6-3 to set up a 21st Tour meeting with his Russian rival.

"I'm looking forward to the quarterfinals and playing my good friend Daniil," Zverev said after the match.

Zverev held on in the first set to get the better of an angry Moutet, whose racket met its end against the 26-year-old's leg.

The world no. 37 triumphed in set two, littering the court with short shots to make Zverev run, but it was the German who cleaned up shop.

Earlier on Sunday, 29-year-old Medvedev put away Spaniard Alejandro Davidovich Fokina 6-3, 6-3 in an hour and a half without much fuss

And Lorenzo Musetti apologised on court for an outburst at coughing fans earlier in the tournament.

Fans booed when the 23-yearold Italian entered the court for his match and some were making loud guttural coughing noises.

"I totally understand your point and I... regret what I've said and what I've done, so sorry, thanks for understanding," he said in English after beating France's Adrian Mannarino 6-3, 6-3 to move into the quarterfinals.

The on-court interviewer, however, did not translate his apology into Chinese for the fans, only relaying Musetti's brief comments about the match.
