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PM hints at possible police recruitment, promotions

PRIME Minister Russell Dlamini has hinted that government may soon consider fresh recruitments and promotions within the Royal Eswatini Police Service (REPS) as part of efforts to strengthen the force's capacity and morale.

The PM made these remarks in response to questions from Sigwe Member of Parliament (MP) David Ngcamphalala. The MP had raised concerns about manpower shortages, delayed promotions, deteriorating police housing, and the lack of adequate transport in some police stations.

In his response, the PM acknowledged the challenges facing the police service but assured the House that the government was looking into measures to address them.

"Government will consider the issue of recruitment in the Police Service, as we are aware that there are existing vacancies that need to be filled for the organisation to be properly capacitated to discharge its man-

date. It must be acknowledged, though, that such things largely depend on budget availability," said Dlamini.

The response has been largely viewed to rekindle hope among many young Emaswati who have long awaited an opportunity to join the police service, as well as within the ranks of serving officers who have been anticipating promotions.

On the issue of promotions, the PM revealed that the process was already under consideration.

"Promotions in the police service will, in due course, be announced when all necessary processes have been undertaken. The Police leadership is consulting with the Ministry of Public Service on this issue and is positive that there will be a fruitful outcome," he assured.

Ngcamphalala also questioned the state of police accommodation, noting that many officers were housed in dilapidated structures unfit for habitation. In response, the PM conceded that the housing situation remains a concern but stated that government was taking steps to improve conditions.

"It is true that most housing structures for the Police Service are not in a good state. To address this problem, government provides a budget for the rehabilitation of old housing units for the Police Service on an annual basis," Dlamini said.

He further announced that government, through the Eswatini National Housing Board (ENHB), would roll out a programme to construct new housing units for police officers in various regions.

Turning to the issue of transport shortages, Ngcamphalala cited Matsapha police station as an example. He claimed that it only had one operational vehicle, which hindered effective policing.

In response, Dlamini said government was aware of the challenge and had begun addressing it during the current financial year.

"The persistent problem of shortage of transport for the police is being addressed by government. During the current financial year, new vehicles were allocated to the police service to alleviate the problem, and more will continue to be provided," he stated

The PM commended the National Commissioner, Manoma Masango, and the entire police service for their continued commitment despite operational constraints.

"We thank the MP for the plaudits and recognition of the National Commissioner's efforts in ensuring effectiveness of the Police Service in discharging its mandate," said Dlamini. The PM's remarks reaffirmed that while budgetary limitations remain a challenge, the government was intent on prioritising police welfare and operational capacity in the near future.

The recruitment and promotions, if approved, could mark a significant morale boost for the force and potentially enhance law enforcement visibility and effectiveness across the country, said one of the affected police officers who preferred anonymity.

Germany's engagement with Eswatini spans various sectors, with a strong focus on education, development, and the arts. Shakantu highlighted several initiatives funded by the German Embassy that have enriched Eswatini's cultural landscape:

- A 2-day dance industry workshop in 2024, which included DJ training, aimed at enhancing skills within the local creative sector.
- The Creative Mixer Series, organized in collaboration with the Antidote Culture Foundation, which offered a series of masterclasses to build creative skills throughout 2024.

 The National Museum Project, running from 2024 to 2025, which includes the San Bushmen exhibition, cultural heritage collection, and curator training.

Beyond the arts, German organizations have contributed significantly to Eswatini's cooperative development, water supply, and energy sectors. The German Cooperative and Raiffeisen Confederation (DGRV) has been instrumental in strengthening cooperatives since 2022, resulting in the establishment of a permanent office in Eswatini.

The Kreditanstalt für Wiederaufbau (KfW) is supporting a cross-border water supply project between Lomahasha and Namaacha, scheduled for completion in 2026.

The German organization for international development, GIZ, has led multiple projects, including initiatives in energy and the successful development of Eswatini's Industrial Policy for 2023-2033.

Additionally, the Goethe Institut continues to support cultural heritage preservation and training for young artists on grant applications

Shakantu described the renovated foyer as "a tangible symbol of our cooperation, showing how diplomacy can touch lives in real and lasting ways." She highlighted the growing vibrancy of Eswatini's creative sector, noting how artists are increasingly gaining international recognition and how the Eswatini Theatre Club has been pivotal in nurturing emerging talent in acting, directing, and playwriting.

'Dreaming of my late mother saved my life'

WHAT began as an ordinary night for KaGogo Mamane Simelane of Timbutini under Mafutseni Inkhundla turned into a moment of divine intervention and later, a story of restoration and hope.

The elderly woman, whose home was destroyed during the recent civil unrest, has received a brand-new house, a gesture that has brought comfort and dignity back to her life.

Recalling the chilling moments before the tragedy, Gogo Simelane said she owes her survival to a dream that felt like a warning from her late mother.

"I dreamt of my late mother," she said quietly, tears welling in her eyes. "She told me to take the children and leave the house immediately. I listened. The moment we stepped out, I heard a loud sound fire had started and within minutes, my house was gone."

The mysterious dream, which she believes was a spiritual rescue, saved her and her grandchildren from certain death. But in the aftermath, they were left homeless and heartbroken. Community leaders, moved by her plight, joined hands with government authorities under Mafutseni Inkhundla to rebuild her home. The successful completion and handover of the new house marks a turning point in Gogo Simelane's life restoring her sense of security after months of uncertainty.

The Indvuna yeLutsango for Timbutini praised the teamwork that made the project possible, describing it as a powerful example of community unity and compassion.

"We could not stand by while one of our own suffered," she said. "This house shows that when we come together, we can change lives. The new two-room house offers Gogo Simelane and her grandchildren a safe and comfortable place to live. Standing at the doorway of her freshly painted home, the elderly woman lifted her hands in gratitude.

"I thank God, my ancestors, the government, and everyone who remembered me," she said. "My mother warned me in that dream and today, I know she continues to watch over me."

The story of KaGogo Mamane Simelane is one of faith, survival, and renewal, a reminder that even in the darkest moments, light can return through the kindness of others and the strength of a community united in care.

JOY and gratitude filled Lozitha under Ludzeludze Inkhundla on Monday as the Deputy Prime Minister (DPM), Thulisile Dladla, officially handed over newly constructed houses worth E180,000 each to three vulnerable families.

DPM praised for E23.5 mln timely grants

THE Office of the Deputy Prime Minister (DPM), led by Thuli Dladla, has been widely commended by Members of Parliament (MPs) for its ongoing efforts to improve the welfare of vulnerable groups through comprehensive social protection programmes.

Presenting her second quarter (July-September) performance report before Parliament, Dladla revealed that her office disbursed a total of E23.5 million to benefit 17,100 persons with disabilities, widows, and the elderly under various social welfare schemes. These include the Elderly Funeral Cover, Disability Fund, and support for Orphaned and Vulnerable Children (OVC).

A total of 132 Ex-Service Men Widows benefited from E118,800, while the Old Age Grant reached 88,548 elderly persons, marking an increase of 687 beneficiaries from the previous quarter. The government

spent E162.4 million on the elderly grant during this period.

Dladla further announced that the Funeral Cover initiative facilitated dignified burials for 140 deceased elderly persons at a cost of E420,000. Meanwhile, the OVC Fund disbursed E155.9 million, covering school and examination fees for 67,438 learners for the current academic year.

"These initiatives demonstrate government's unwavering commitment to ensuring that no vulnerable citizen is left behind," she said.

Recommendations

Beyond financial support, the DPM's Office also intensified efforts to combat gender-based violence (GBV) through awareness campaigns across all four regions of Eswatini. These engagements, which brought together various stakeholders, led to key recommendations such as the establishment of a One Stop Centre for survivors, enhanced collaboration among service providers, and continuous public education.

The office also continued implementing

the Hlonipheka Programme, which reached 3,037 Emaswati with information on GBV prevention. Additionally, a gender mainstreaming toolkit was developed and training sessions were conducted for crossborder traders to promote gender equality in trade. The popular "Asibambaneni Sibe Ngumndeni" programme also continued to make a significant national impact through its broadcasts on Eswatini TV and EBIS Radio, promoting unity and family values.

MPs across the political divide heaped praise on Dladla for her leadership and efficiency in delivering social assistance. Ndzingeni MP Gcina Magagula, who chairs the DPM's Portfolio Committee, lauded the office for increasing grants for the elderly and persons with disabilities by 20 per cent, urging government to consider further increases over the next five years.

"We appreciate the increase and appeal for it to be sustained because these beneficiaries often care for impoverished children in rural areas," he said.

The MPs all echoed appreciation for Dladla's leadership, describing her as

humble, efficient, and a true embodiment of the Nkwe spirit espoused by His Majesty King Mswati III. Meanwhile, MPs also used the session to call for tougher penalties against Sexual Offences and Domestic Violence (SODV) offenders, and the fast-tracking of the sexual offenders register. Lushaba said this would help curb the growing number of cases involving children and ensure justice for victims.

Lomahasha MP Zanele Mashaba recently recommended the convening of a national women's conference to deliberate strategies to reduce SODV cases in the country.

The DPM's Office, which also oversees the National Disaster Management Agency (NDMA), was applauded for rehabilitating 96 homes, restoring damaged roads and bridges, and distributing food to 263,090 individuals affected by natural disasters, all achieved despite limited financial resources.

MPs concluded by reaffirming Parliament's support for the DPM's social protection agenda, describing it as a cornerstone in safeguarding Eswatini's most vulnerable citizens.

THE Eswatini Water Services Corporation (EWSC) has confirmed that the rollout of its E600 million prepaid water meter project continues to progress steadily across the country, marking a major step in the corporation's digital transformation strategy.

According to EWSC Public Relations and Communications Specialist Hlobile Jele, the initiative was aimed at enhancing customer experience, billing accuracy, and operational efficiency. The project forms part of the corporation's long-term plan to modernise service delivery and promote responsible water usage.

"To date, we have successfully implemented the prepaid pilot project at Mndoni Estate, and we are now rolling out installations in several key areas, including Piggs Peak, Glen Township, Moyeni, Siteki, Nkhanini, Nhlangano, Moneni, Manzini, and Goje Township and Mukela in Ezulwini," Jele said.

She further revealed that EWSC was extending the system to public prepaid standpipes to improve accessibility and ensure fair water distribution in communities.

"We have already introduced prepaid standpipes in

Mangwaneni, and we are currently planning further installations in Lobamba, Ezabeni, Nkhanini, and Nshakambili," Jele explained.

The prepaid meter system allows customers to manage their water consumption more effectively while helping the corporation reduce arrears and improve efficiency in revenue collection. Jele noted that this innovation also aligns with the government's digital transformation agenda to make public services more transparent and customer focused.

On the tariff adjustment implemented earlier this year, Jele clarified that the change was gazetted and approved by Parliament, and that customers were notified well in advance. "The tariff adjustment took effect on April 1, 2025, following public communication campaigns in November 2024 and February 2025 to ensure transparency and customer awareness," she said.

The new residential standard charge was E189.06, representing an increase of E7.27, or four per cent, from the previous rate of E181.79. The rate applies to water consumption ranging from 0–10

kilolitres, meaning customers will only pay more if they exceed this usage limit.

"This adjustment is a necessary measure to sustain and improve service delivery. It enables EWSC to continue maintaining, upgrading, and expanding the country's water infrastructure to meet rising demand," Jele emphasised.

In addition to the prepaid meter rollout, she said EWSC was implementing several major water access projects, including the ESWAP Project and the Manzini Integrated Water Supply Project.

The ESWAP Project focuses on extending water access to communities between Nhlangano and Siphambanweni, targeting a total of 11,880 beneficiaries, with about 2,000 individual connections upon completion.

Meanwhile, the Manzini Integrated Water Supply Project aims to meet the growing needs of the country's expanding urban population, extending services beyond the Manzini region. Upon completion, it is expected to benefit 120,000 people, with approximately 15,000 individual

Army hopeful wins gold medal at Imbube Marathon



AT just 24 years old, Manqoba Finose Sangweni has emerged as one of Eswatini's most talked-about young athletes celebrated for both his athletic excellence and his remarkable resilience.

The determined young man from Mtfongwaneni Inkhundla in the Manzini Region recently found himself caught in controversy during the Zombodze Emuva Army Recruitment Exercise, yet what could have been a career setback has instead become a story of perseverance and redemption.

Sangweni captured public attention after being suspended for participating in two separate army recruitment exercises first at his home constituency of Mtfongwaneni and later at Zombodze Emuva Inkhundla in the Shiselweni Region. In an astonishing turn of events, he clinched first place in both constituencies, showcasing his exceptional strength and discipline. While the incident drew mixed reactions, it also highlighted the depth of his ambition and drive.

Rather than letting the controversy define him, Sangweni turned the episode into motivation. Within days, he traded military drills for running shoes, stepping back into the limelight at the 7th Edition of

For Sangweni, victory at the Imbube Marathon was more than a sporting triumph it was a powerful declaration of endurance, discipline, and mental strength. It reminded the nation that true champions rise above criticism and adversity. His performance

and a net profit after tax of E30.4 million.

The company recorded E34.5 million in dividend income from its investee companies and an additional E11 million from fixedincome and money market instruments. Operating expenses stood at E2.6 million, while interest expenses amounted to E10.1

However, a non-cash fair value adjustment of E163 million on unlisted investments, largely driven by external market movements, resulted in a comprehensive loss of E132 million for the year.

"Importantly, this adjustment does not diminish the strength of our underlying portfolio. SEL remains confident in the longterm value of its holdings and expects this adjustment to reverse over time," Ginindza assured shareholders.

Looking ahead, Ginindza said SEL was poised to sustain value creation through a balanced mix of listed and unlisted

"Post year-end, we acquired a 49 percent equity stake in Usutu Forest School International, further diversifying our portfolio and enhancing growth prospects," he revealed.

He said SEL's strategy going forward will focus on value-driven investments, strengthening shareholder returns, and deepening the company's contribution to Eswatini's economic transformation.

Reaffirming the company's commitment, Ginindza said SEL invested in community focusing on education, health, and youth empowerment.

"We remain committed to supporting programmes that empower communities and drive sustainable development," he said.

THE call for Eswatini to strengthen its capacity for round-the-clock economic activity dominated part of the House of Assembly sitting with legislators linking 24-hour production to population growth and labour availability.

Mbabane East Member of Parliament Welcome Dlamini said the country's ambition to sustain full-time industrial and commercial operations would depend on a growing and productive population.

He made the remarks after the Ministry of Economic Planning and Development tabled its Second-Quarter Performance Report before Parliament.

Dlamini noted that while Eswatini to prioritise investment continues attraction and infrastructure expansion, the success of continuous operations in key sectors such as manufacturing, logistics, and services will ultimately rely on the strength and structure of its labour force.

He said the economy cannot expand on a 24-hour basis without sufficient human resources to support the demand for production, distribution, and essential services. Dlamini further cautioned that the country's current population growth rate, estimated at below 1.6 per cent, may not be adequate to sustain long-term industrial output.

"To sustain and grow a country's economy, a steady increase in population is essential. For a country to attain population growth, it needs to increase by at least 2.1 per cent.

Anything below that signals a declining population, which can strain economic activity and the labour supply. The shift toward 24-hour operations requires a healthy, educated, and employable population capable of meeting industrial demand," he said.

Support

He said the government, through the Central Statistical Office and the National Development Plan, is closely monitoring demographic and employment trends to ensure that population dynamics support economic goals.

"Our planning approach emphasises balanced and sustainable growth. The aim is not only to grow the population but to align that growth with the capacity of the economy to absorb and productively employ people. Expanding industrial operations to 24-hour schedules demands both numbers and capability within the labour market,"

Dr Gina said the ministry's demographic data feeds into sectoral planning for manufacturing, mining, transport, and healthcare, all of which require reliable workforce availability to operate beyond standard hours.

He added that population and labour forecasts are being used to guide investments in education, skills development, and health infrastructure.

Visible

Industry leaders say the move toward full-time production is already visible in sectors such as food processing, energy, and transport. However, they maintain that workforce readiness must be addressed for the economy to benefit fully.

He explained that a smaller or ageing workforce could make it difficult to sustain 24-hour operations without significant investments in automation and training.

He added that increased employment opportunities from expanded operations would, in turn, support consumer spending, trade, and overall economic resilience.

Development economist Themba Mavuso said Eswatini's demographic and labour patterns must be integrated into long-term industrial strategies.

He noted that while 24-hour production enhances competitiveness and output, it also increases demand for health services, urban infrastructure, and social protection for workers engaged in non-traditional

Brent crude futures were down \$1.06, or 1.7 per cent, at \$60.23 a barrel as of 1312 GMT, while U.S. West Texas Intermediate futures fell \$1.03, or 1.8 per cent, to \$56.51.

Greystone Partners Ltd takes biggest hit as share price down 13%

GREYSTONE Partners Limited recorded the largest annual share price drop on the Eswatini Stock Exchange (ESE), falling by 13.24 per cent between September 2024 and September 2025.

According to the ESE's Third Quarter Trading Statistics, Greystone's share price declined from E340 to E295, reducing its market capitalisation from E781.7 million to E678.2 million over the period.

The fall represents one of the most notable single-year losses among listed companies, pulling overall market performance into negative territory.

The ESE report attributes the overall 1.47 per cent decline in total market capitalisation largely to losses in Greystone Partners, Inala Capital Limited, and Swazi Empowerment Limited.

Together, these three counters erased earlier gains recorded by Nedbank Eswatini and SBC Limited.

While Greystone showed an annual loss, its stock registered a short-term rebound during the third quarter, rising by 13.46 per cent from E260 at the end of June 2025 to E295 by September.


This movement made it the strongest quarterly performer in the latest trading period, suggesting a limited recovery in investor activity.


Market observers note that Greystone Partners remains a key investment company listed on the ESE, with a diversified portfolio across several sectors. Its share price movement is often viewed as a general indicator of investor sentiment within the private equity and investment segment of the market.

In contrast, most other listed companies recorded minimal changes in share prices, with FNB Eswatini, RES Corporation, SWAPROP, and Nkonjeni Precast remaining unchanged over the year. SBC Limited gained 3.37 per cent, while Nedbank Eswatini rose 6.67 per cent year-on-year, offsetting part of the overall market contraction.

The quarterly data shows that the market

remains relatively stable despite limited trading activity. Greystone's rebound, alongside gains from SBC and Nedbank, helped prevent deeper losses. However, the absence of broadbased growth suggests that the ESE remains in a consolidation phase, with investors focusing on dividend stability and sectoral performance rather than short-term speculation.

THE Eswatini Stock Exchange (ESE) ended the financial year with a slight 1.47 per cent decline in total market capitalisation, despite gains from major banking counters that helped cushion overall losses.

ESE Trading Statistics for 2025 show that total market value dropped from E6.89 billion in September 2024 to E6.79 billion in September 2025.

The decline is attributed to weaker performance by investment and financial holding companies, including Greystone Partners Limited, Swazi Empowerment Limited, and Inala Capital Limited.

Nedbank Eswatini recorded the highest increase among all listed entities, rising 6.67 per cent from E1, 500 to E1, 600 per share. SBC Limited followed with a 3.37 per cent gain, while

most other counters remained unchanged. The resilience of banking shares helped stabilise the market amid a mixed trading environment.

"In contrast, Swazi Empowerment Limited's share price slipped 5.13 per cent, while Inala Capital fell 14.29 per cent, the second-largest drop after Greystone Partners' 13.24 per cent decline. These losses weighed on overall market performance, particularly in the investment sector, which represents a significant portion of the exchange's listed value," reads the report in full.

The latest data also indicates that the market has maintained relatively low volatility, with seven out of nine listed companies showing either positive or static share price performance.

Market analysts say this reflects limited trading volumes and cautious investor participation. The third-quarter comparison further shows modest improvement, led by Greystone Partners, which gained 13.46 per cent between June and September. SBC Limited rose 2.22 per cent, while other companies, including RES Corporation and FNB Eswatini, remained stable

Eswatini, Moz strengthen partnership for water project

A SIGNIFICANT step towards addressing water scarcity in the region has been taken by the Government.

HRH Prince Lonkhokhela, Minister of the Ministry of Natural Resources and Energy of Eswatini, and Fernando Rafael, Minister of Public Works, Housing, and Water Resources of Mozambique, signed a Declaration of Intent for a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) on the Lomahasha–Namaacha (LoNa) Transboundary Water Supply Project.

"The signing of this Declaration of Intent underscores the commitment of both Eswatini and Mozambique to ensure access to clean water for our communities," Prince Lonkhokhela said.

The LoNa project, a cross-border initiative, is designed to provide clean drinking water to an estimated 50,000 people in Eswatini and Mozambique.

It involves the construction of a water treatment plant, pumping stations, and reservoirs, with water sourced from the Mbuluzi River. The raw water will be conveyed from the treatment plant operated by the Eswatini Water Services Corporation.

During a site visit, the Ministers observed progress made since the project's inception in June 2024. Currently in Phase 1A, the project is expected to be completed by the end of this year. Two reservoirs are near completion, and pipelines have been laid to transport raw water from the river.

"Working together, we are able to leverage joint funding and technical expertise to ensure this project meets the needs of our citizens," Minister Rafael said.

The project is expected to make a lasting impact on water access in the border communities of Eswatini and Mozambique.

WALL Street advanced on Monday as investor concerns over the stability of regional banks eased, turning focus to a wave of corporate earnings and a closely watched inflation report.

Earnings season shifts into high gear this week, with Wall Street heavyweights, including Tesla, Ford, GM, Netflix, Procter & Gamble, Coca-Cola, IBM and Intel, set to report. Their results will offer a fresh stress test for equities trading near lofty valuations.

Upcoming U.S. regional bank results will also be monitored to get a read of the sector's health, after renewed fears of systemic credit stress triggered a flight to safety last week.


S&P 500 companies are expected to post a 9.3 per cent year-on-year growth in thirdquarter earnings, according to LSEG IBES data. But with expectations running high, investors will look for strong beats to justify the market's recent rally.

"Renewed credit concerns and concerns over trade policy are indicative of just how vulnerable the market conditions are," said Jordan Rizzuto, chief investment officer at GammaRoad Capital Partners.

U.S. President Donald Trump suggested easing tariffs on China if Beijing resumes key agricultural purchases such as soybeans. He, however, blamed the latest breakdown in talks on China's tightening control over rare earth exports.

Meanwhile, Trump vowed to keep "massive" duties on India unless it halts Russian oil imports, and considered raising levies on Colombia amid a feud over its role in illicit drug trade.

At 09:51 a.m., the Dow Jones Industrial Average rose 254.07 points, or 0.55 per cent, to 46,452.52. The S&P 500 gained 50.26 points, or 0.75 per cent, to 6,713.77, while the Nasdaq Composite advanced 234.19 points, or 1.03 per cent, to 22,914.16.

optimism continued to boost markets, with the Philadelphia Semiconductor Index (hitting an all-time high. It was last up 1.8 per cent.

Micron shares rose 3.2 per cent and hit a record high after Barclays raised its price target on the stock. ON Semiconductor and KLA added 4.4 per cent and 3.7 per cent, respectively. S&P Energy index gained 0.7 per cent, while industrials added almost 1 per cent.

Delayed CPI

A U.S. government shutdown, which began on October 1, has halted key economic data releases, leaving investors without crucial indicators. That places Friday's consumer price report, a pivotal inflation gauge, firmly in the spotlight ahead of the Federal Reserve's policy meeting on October 28-29.

While September's core inflation is expected to hold steady at 3.1 per cent, markets widely expect a quarter-point rate

cut this month, with another reduction likely in December.

"The reports that come out, not just this one, but also in the coming months, still will not answer how trade policy over the longer term is going to influence inflationary pressures," Rizzuto said.

Among other stocks, Applovin dropped 5.1 per cent after Fuzzy Panda disclosed a short position in the company. Boeing rose 1.3 per cent after the planemaker won approval from the U.S. Federal Aviation Administration to raise 737 MAX production to 42 planes per month. WeightWatchers climbed 11.2 per cent after the company partnered with Amazon for weight-loss drug delivery.

Advancing issues outnumbered decliners by a 6.13-to-1 ratio on the NYSE and by a 4.24-to-1 ratio on the Nasdaq.

The S&P 500 posted 10 new 52-week highs and three new lows, while the Nasdaq Composite recorded 43 new highs and 33 new lows. (**Reuters**)

Dollar wavers focus on politics, credit risks

THE dollar edged up against the yen but was flat versus the euro on Monday as investors shifted their focus to political developments in Japan and the euro area, while lingering concerns about U.S. credit risks kept weighing on sentiment.

The yen weakened as hardline conservative Sanae Takaichi is almost certain to become Japan's first female primefollowing a decisive parliamentary vote on Tuesday.

The dollar was up 0.1 per cent to 150.73 yen, after hitting 151.20 earlier in the session.

The euro edged higher against the dollar as political tensions in France eased, but investor caution lingered.

Markets have yet to fully price out French risk from the euro, with the government's decision to freeze pension reform offering only a temporary political breather while complicating already fragile budget talks.

The euro was flat at \$1.1653.

"This week the focus should stay on the U.S., and a further souring of credit sentiment could send the euro on a path to \$1.180," said Francesco Pesole, a foreign exchange strategist at ING.

The U.S. dollar index, a measure of its value relative to a basket of other major foreign currencies, rose 0.05 per cent to 98.58. It hit 98.025 on Friday, its lowest level since October 6.

Economists warned that the dollar's resilience will be tested on multiple fronts.

"One, the government shutdown is hurting economic activity, both directly and indirectly," said Klaus Baader, global chief economist at Societe Generale Corporate and Investment Banking (SGCIB), adding U.S.-China tensions were a second major concern.

"Three, the (import) tariffs that are already in effect continue to feed through, slowing real household income growth and weighing on corporate margins," he said.

Barclays flagged that, with no obvious catalyst to end the federal government shutdown in the next few weeks, the stoppage may extend well into November, when political and economic pressures should intensify.

The Australian dollar rose 0.1 per cent to \$0.6491 on Monday, cheered by data from top trade partner China showing its economy reasonably resilient to U.S. tariffs.

Official data on Monday showed China's economy grew 1.1 per cent in the third quarter, to top forecasts, while industrial output also beat with a rise of 6.5 per cent. Although the 4.8 per cent annual growth rate marked the weakest pace in a year, it kept the country on track to meet its official growth target of around 5 per cent. (Reuters)

Oil traders' concerns have shifted from under-supply to over-supply, the futures contract structure of the global benchmark Brent showed.

The six-month spread for Brent shows contracts for earlier loading are trading below those for later loading, a structure known as contango, which encourages traders to pay for storing oil so it can be sold at higher prices when supplies are expected to

The Brent contango, which emerged on Thursday for the first time since a brief appearance in May, has deepened to minus 56

cents, its biggest since late 2023.

Both benchmarks declined more than 2 per cent last week, marking their third consecutive weekly decline, partly due to the International Energy Agency's outlook for a growing supply glut in 2026.

Last week, the head of the World Trade Organization said she had urged the United States and China to de-escalate trade tensions, warning that a decoupling by the world's two largest economies could reduce global economic output by 7 per cent over the longer term.

The two top oil consumers have recently

renewed their trade war, imposing additional port fees on ships carrying cargo between them - tit-for-tat moves that could disrupt global freight flows.

Uncertainty remains over what may happen with Russian oil supply, with U.S. President Donald Trump warning again on Sunday that Washington would maintain "massive" tariffs on India unless it stopped buying Russian oil.

On the supply side, U.S. energy firms last week added rigs for the first time in three weeks, energy services firm Baker Hughes said. (Reuters)

Civilians in Sudan's al-Fashir cower from drones as siege worsens hunger

RESIDENTs of Sudan's besieged city of al-Fashir have been taking refuge in underground bunkers to try to protect themselves from drones and shells after intensifying attacks on displacement shelters, clinics and mosques.

Famine-stricken al-Fashir is the Sudanese army's last holdout in the vast, western region of Darfur as it battles the paramilitary Rapid Support Forces (RSF) in a civil war that has raged for two-and-a-half years.

The conflict, which erupted from an internal power struggle, has triggered ethnic killings, drawn in foreign powers and created a massive humanitarian crisis.

The army has been gaining ground elsewhere in Sudan, but Darfur is the RSF's stronghold where it aims to base a parallel government, potentially cementing a geographical splintering of the country.

More than one million have fled al-Fashir during an 18-month siege by the RSF, according to the U.N., but it has become dangerous and expensive to leave. An estimated quarter of a million civilians remain, and there are fears of mass reprisals if the city falls.

STRUGGLE TO AVOID DRONE STRIKES

Many of those still in the city have dug bunkers for protection after repeated strikes on civilians, according to more than a dozen residents reached by phone as well as footage obtained and verified by Reuters.

The residents described avoiding drones by limiting movements and large gatherings during daytime, and not using lights after dark.

"We can only bury people at night, or very early in the morning," said Mohyaldeen Abdallah, a local journalist. "It's become normal for us."

Five residents said drones have followed civilians into areas where they gather, such as clinics. "When you're walking around you stick to the wall like a gecko so the drone won't see you go inside," said Dr. Ezzeldin Asow, head of al-Fashir's now-abandoned Southern Hospital.

At one shelter in al-Fashir's Abu Taleb school at least 18 people were killed in the week from September 30 by bombardment, a drone attack and an RSF raid, said Abdallah, who visited the site before and after the

Footage verified by Reuters showed the school's shattered ceilings and scarred walls. On the school grounds, it showed a dead body lying outside a shipping container

buried in the ground to create a shelter, with sandbags around the entrance.

Neither the army nor the RSF responded to written requests or calls seeking comment on the incidents at Abu Taleb school and elsewhere in al-Fashir.

Residents captured in the footage blamed the RSF for attacks. Reuters could not independently verify who was responsible.

"They don't distinguish between civilians and soldiers, if you're human they fire at you," Khadiga Musa, head of the North Darfur health ministry, told Reuters by phone from al-Fashir.

The RSF and its allies have been blamed for waves of ethnically driven violence in Darfur during the war, with the U.S. determining last year that they had committed genocide. Its leadership denies ordering such attacks and says rogue soldiers will face justice.

In a statement on October 12, the RSF said al-Fashir was "devoid of civilians". The army and allied self-defence fighters and former rebels had "turned hospitals and mosques into military barracks and rocket launchers," the RSF said.

The Sudanese army, which has denied responsibility for civilian deaths, has also used drones in al-Fashir.

REPEATED ATTACKS ON SECOND SHELTER

On October 10-11 another displacement shelter, Dar al-Arqam, located on university grounds that also house a mosque, suffered repeated strikes. The centre's manager, Hashim Bosh, recorded 57 dead including 17 children, among them three babies.

"They were aiming at the mosque. They attacked right after Friday prayer," he said in a voice note to Reuters, describing the first strike. A second strike, he said, came from a drone that followed people running to another shipping container used as a shelter.

The next morning four more shells hit during dawn prayers, Bosh said. Residents interviewed in footage taken by local activists and verified by Reuters confirmed the attacks.

The footage also showed what appear to be 10 bodies covered in sheets at the site, a child-sized body covered by a small prayer rug, and several bodies, mangled and uncovered, inside the container.

JOHANNESBURG — The Democratic Alliance, the second-biggest party in South Africa's coalition government, wants to axe race-based laws aimed at boosting Black jobs in an economy still dominated by white people three decades after the end of apartheid.

How to address the legacy of white minority rule is a big debate between the DA and its larger coalition partner, the African National Congress, with the issue further amplified by criticism from U.S. President Donald Trump.

The DA's proposed "Economic Inclusion For All Bill" would amend the Public Procurement Act of 2024, which gives an advantage to companies that are Black-owned or run when bidding for government contracts. The DA says this system has encouraged corruption and failed to help most Black people.

The DA calls for the removal of references to Broad-Based Black Economic Empowerment - the ANC's flagship affirmative action programme - across legislation.

The ANC says that race-based legislation is necessary for redress and has accused the DA - whose party leader is white - of protecting white interests. The DA denies this.

The bill is unlikely to pass, but it highlights racial tensions that had drawn little attention from outside South Africa until Trump highlighted them by criticising the government's race-based policies, opens new tab during a testy White House meeting with

COPPER consumption in the United States and India is set to emerge from China's shadow over the next decade as demand growth in the world's largest consumer of the industrial metal slows. Beijing's industrial and infrastructure expansion has helped fuel a rally that has seen copper prices rise to above \$10,000 a metric ton from \$1,500 25 years ago.

But while China is forecast to remain the largest market for copper into the next decade and beyond, analysts expect other demand and price influences to increasingly come into play.

Changing regional policies, infrastructure cycles and geopolitical shifts are likely to mean producers, consumers, traders and investors need to adapt to a market that has many different drivers.

"China will reduce its rate of copper consumption and stockpiling. We are going back to old-fashioned drivers of copper, which is basically replacement cycles outside China," said Panmure Liberum analyst Tom Price.

The impact has yet to be seen, but moves by the U.S. and other countries to promote local manufacturing also mean China's export machine and manufacturing activity is expected to slow and weigh on its demand for refined copper, which is estimated at around 15 million tons this year.

Meanwhile, the data centres needed to support AI technology and upgrades to power grid infrastructure mean copper demand growth outside China will become the driving force for prices.

"China has built its infrastructure, including its power distribution grid. Its activity will drift to a lower level to match (its) requirement," said Price, who forecasts Chinese demand will be 6% lower in 2031 than in 2026

Price predicts China will account for 52% of global consumption of primary copper, at

COPPER consumption in the United around 27 million tons, in 2031 compared States and India is set to emerge from with 57% in 2026.

And he expects U.S. copper demand of 2.2 million tons in 2031, up nearly 50% from 2026, while for India, he forecasts copper demand to rise above 1 million tons, representing a rise of more than 30%.

'INCREASING PUSHBACK BY COUNTRIES IN THE WEST'

Analysts also expect U.S. President Donald Trump's imposition of 50% tariffs on copper pipes and wiring to help encourage local production.

For China, the likely outcome is the loss of a major market for its exports of copper pipe. Trade Data Monitor ranks the U.S. as China's fourth biggest market for the product.


Last year, it imported 14.4 million tons of copper tubes and pipes directly from China and in the first seven months of this year these totalled some eight million tons, TDM data shows, underlining the potential loss of a major market for Beijing.

"China's output of manufactured goods, particularly for export, is likely to slow down to some extent as a function of increasing pushback by countries in the West," said Duncan Hobbs, research director at Concord Resources.

Those exports will include copper wire used for power grid infrastructure. In its last network-infrastructure review a decade ago, the U.S. Department of Energy found 70% of U.S. transmission lines were more than 25 years old.

Meanwhile, India is expanding its transmission infrastructure to support its goal of 500 GW of non-fossil fuel-based capacity by 2030.

And in Asia, excluding China, consultancy Benchmark Mineral Intelligence expects copper demand to jump 25% to more than 9.2 million tons between 2025 and 2030.

For electric infrastructure which includes power grids and generation, data centres and telecoms, BMI expects demand to rise 35% to 2.2 million tons.

BMI's forecasts for China are 4% and 11% respectively.

MODERNISING INFRASTRUCTURE

Grid improvements in the West mainly mean modernising infrastructure. This will be slow and steady and not as copper intensive as building from scratch, as China has been doing

Robert Edwards, principal analyst at metals consultancy CRU has expected China's influence on the copper market to wane for some years. But this did not materialise because of Chinese investment in electric vehicles, renewables and its power grid.

CRU expects China's consumption of global mined and recycled copper consumption to fall to 57% of 31.36 million tons in 2030, from 59% of 27.62 million tons this year.

"Demand growth potential in China is limited. You should see more growth in the rest of the world," said Edwards.

"Instagram pushes 'eating-disorder adjacent' content to vulnerable teens"

META researchers found that teens who report that Instagram regularly made them feel bad about their bodies saw significantly more "eating disorder adjacent content" than those who did not, according to an internal document reviewed by Reuters.

The posts shown to those users featured "prominent display" of chest, buttocks, or thighs, "explicit judgement" about body types and "content related to disordered eating and/or negative body image."

While such material is not banned on Instagram, the researchers noted that parents, teens and outside experts have told Meta they believe it is potentially harmful to young users.

Meta surveyed 1,149 teens over the course of the 2023-2024 academic year about whether and how often they felt bad about their bodies after using Instagram. Then they manually sampled the content those users saw on the platform over a three-month period.

The study showed that for the 223 teens who often felt bad about their bodies after viewing Instagram, "eating disorder adjacent content" made up 10.5% of what they saw on the platform. Among the other teens in the study, such content accounted for only 3.3% of what they saw.

"Teens who reported frequent body dissatisfaction after viewing posts on Instagram... saw about three times more body-focused/

ED-adjacent content than other teens," the authors wrote, referring to eating disorders, according to a summary of the research reviewed exclusively by Reuters.

In addition to seeing more eating disorder-adjacent content, researchers found, the teens who reported the most negative feelings about themselves saw more provocative content more broadly, content Meta classifies as "mature themes," "Risky behavior," "Harm & Cruelty" and "Suffering." Cu-

mulatively, such content accounted for 27% of what those teens saw on the platform, compared with 13.6% among their peers who hadn't reported negative feelings.

META RESEARCHERS EXPRESSED CONCERN

The researchers stressed that their findings did not prove that Instagram was making users feel worse about their bodies. "It is not possible to establish the causal direction of these findings," they wrote, noting the possibility that teens who felt bad about themselves could be actively seeking out that material.

The Instagram research, a redacted replica of which is published here and has not been previously reported, demonstrated that Instagram exposed teens who "report frequently experiencing body dissatisfaction" to high doses of content that Meta's own advisors "have expressed support for limiting," the writeup said.

In a statement, Meta spokesperson Andy Stone said the document reviewed by Reuters demonstrates Meta's commitment to understanding and improving its products.

"This research is further proof we remain committed to understanding young people's experiences and using those insights to build safer, more supportive platforms for teens," Stone said, noting the company's recent announcement that it would attempt to show minors content in-line with PG-13 movie standards

In the study, Meta said that its existing screening tools - which were designed to catch violations of platform rules - were incapable of detecting 98.5% of the "sensitive" content that the company believes might not have been appropriate for teens.

The finding was "not necessarily surprising," the researchers wrote, because Meta had only recently begun work on building an algorithm to detect the potentially harmful content they were examining. (Reuters)

U.S. envoys met Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu on Monday aiming to corral Israel and Hamas to get the Gaza ceasefire plan back on track after an explosion of violence over the weekend that threatened to derail the week-old truce.

Israel and Hamas have both recommitted to the ceasefire plan pushed by U.S. President Donald Trump since Sunday's flare-up in which a Palestinian attack that killed two soldiers prompted an Israeli bombardment killing at least 28 people in Gaza.

However, with even the first stages of the truce shaken by repeated flashes of violence, including on Monday, it is far from clear whether the U.S. will be able to keep pressure on the two sides and maintain momentum to end the conflict.

TALKS ON NEXT PHASE OF CEASE-FIRE PLAN

The U.S. envoys, Steve Witkoff and Trump's son-in-law Jared Kushner, were expected to push to shore up the truce and then start talks on the next, more difficult, phase of the 20-step plan during their visit.

U.S. Vice President JD Vance was also due to visit Israel on Tuesday, with Netanyahu saying the pair would discuss regional challenges and opportunities.

High-level U.S. diplomacy in the region, with talks also due later on Monday with Hamas in Egypt, underscores the importance of cementing the ceasefire to Trump, who last week proclaimed "the historic dawn of a new Middle East".

Trump said the ceasefire he brokered was still in place. Hamas leadership, he said, may not be involved in the violations. "We think maybe the leadership isn't involved in that," he told reporters aboard Air Force One.

Israel is unlikely to publicise any progress in the talks until the remains of more hostages are returned, and it believes Hamas could hand over up to six more bodies immediately out of the 16 still in Gaza. Other bodies may be hard to recover because of destruction in the enclave.

Hamas said it would hand over the body of

another hostage later on Monday.

Egypt will host talks in Cairo on Monday with Khalil Al-Hayya, Hamas' exiled Gaza chief, over ways to follow up on implementing the ceasefire, the group said in a statement.

A Palestinian official close to the talks said the group's delegation would discuss ways to push forward the formation of a technocratic body to run Gaza without Hamas representation.

Hamas and other allied factions reject any

foreign administration of Gaza, as envisaged in the Trump plan and has so far resisted calls to lay down arms, which may complicate implementation of the deal.

RESIDENTS FEAR MORE OUT-BREAKS OF VIOLENCE

Both Israel and Hamas have said they remain committed to the ceasefire after Sunday's violence.

Israel said it launched strikes across the enclave in response to a Palestinian attack that killed two soldiers operating within the

agreed deployment line in Rafah in southern Gaza.

"Israel will not accept any violations of the ceasefire in the Gaza Strip," an Israeli government spokesman said on Monday, repeating that Hamas could have no future role inside Gaza and would be disarmed.

Hamas' armed wing, which has refused to commit to disarmament under the plan, said it was unaware of clashes in Rafah and had not been in contact with groups there since March.

Hamas has detailed what it calls a series of violations by Israel that it says killed 46 people and stopped essential supplies from reaching the enclave.

Israeli Defence Minister Israel Katz said any Hamas militants in areas of Gaza still under Israeli control must leave immediately and anyone remaining beyond the yellow line would be targeted without warning.

Despite an earlier threat to withhold supplies from Gaza over the brief truce breakdown, an Israeli security official said aid convoys would continue to enter the enclave.

With the truce still uncertain, Gaza residents fear more violence.

"I felt my heart dropping to the ground, I felt the ceasefire collapsed," said Abu Abdallah, a Gaza City businessman displaced in the central Gaza Strip.

"What happened yesterday made people go crazy to buy food, greedy merchants hiked the prices. The deal looks so fragile," he told Reuters via a chat app.

France scrambles to protect museums after Louvre heist

FRANCE will review the protection of cultural sites across the country and beef up security if needed, officials said on Monday as a manhunt was under way for the four people who staged an audacious daylight robbery at the Louvre museum.

The thieves broke into the Louvre using a crane to smash an upstairs window, then stole priceless objects from an area that houses the French crown jewels before escaping on motorbikes.

The theft, which several newspapers called "heist of the century", grabbed headlines globally. The museum, which shut after the robbery on Sunday morning, remained closed on Monday.

EMERGENCY MEETING OVER SECURITY

The break-in raised awkward questions about security at the museum, which is home to art works such as the Mona Lisa and which welcomed 8.7 million visitors in 2024.

Justice Minister Gerard Darmanin said the theft had cast France in a "deplorable" light. Opposition politicians criticised the government for what they branded a national humiliation at a time when the country is already hit by a deep political crisis.

"What is certain is that we failed," Darmanin told France Inter radio. "Someone was capable of putting in a crane truck in the open in the streets of Paris, to have people walk up for a couple of minutes and take priceless jewels and give France a deplorable image."

The Culture and Interior Ministers held an emergency meeting on Monday and agreed to ask senior officials across France "to immediately assess the existing security measures already in place around cultural institutions, and to strengthen them if necessary", the Interior Ministry said.

"For too long we have looked into the security of visitors but not the security of art works," Culture Minister Rachida Dati told M6TV, adding that she was hoping to put in place shortcuts to public procurement rules to speed up security enhancements in museums.

MANHUNT UNDER WAY

The robbery took between six and seven minutes and was carried out by four people who were unarmed but who threatened the guards with angle grinders, Paris prosecutor Laure Beccuau said on Sunday.

The probe has been entrusted to a specialist police unit that has a high success rate in cracking high-profile robberies, Interior Minister Laurent Nunez said on Sunday.

NATIONAL HUMILIATION?

Darmanin said the robbers, who are still on the run, would eventually be found. But that did not quell the dismay over the theft.

This heist "is an unbearable humiliation for our country. How far will the disintegration of the state go?", Jordan Bardella, leader of the far-right National Rally party, said on X

Francois-Xavier Bellamy, of the conservative Republicans party, called it "a symptom of a country that cannot protect its heritage".

The stolen jewellery included a tiara from the jewellery set of Queen Marie-Amélie and Queen Hortense, from the early 19th century, as well as an earring, part of a pair from the sapphire jewellery set of the same queens.

The crown of Empress Eugenie was found outside the museum. The thieves apparently dropped the piece, made of gold, emeralds and diamonds, as they made their getaway.

LOUVRE CLOSED TO VISITORS

Meanwhile the museum, which had been expected to reopen on Monday, remained closed

"I bought my entries (tickets) more than

one month ago, so it's, like, kind of sad," said Samuel Joya, a 28-year-old tourist from Colombia.

Maryanne Day, a U.S. visitor, said she was shocked by the heist, saying "it feels like a museum like this would have the security that would stop something like that".

Christopher Marinello, founder of Art Recovery International, an organisation specialising in the recovery of stolen art, said most museums complained they did not have enough funding for security.

"The Louvre is one of the most well funded museums in the world.

DJ Maphorisa waxes court lyrics against Sars over tax bill

A legal battle has broken out between DJ Maphorisa and the South African Revenue Service (Sars) over a R3.3-million tax bill, which the award-winning musician is disputing.

Sunday World can exclusively reveal that Maphorisa, born Themba Sunnyboy Sekowe, has dragged Sars to the South African Tax Court at Megawatt Park, Johannesburg to appeal against the bill after the two -parties failed to reach a settlement of their -imbroglio.

According to the court papers, which Sunday World has seen, Sars informed Maphorisa on July 13, 2018, that it intended to conduct an income tax audit of his books because he had not submitted his

It asked him to provide it with his IRP5/IT3 certificates, investment income certificate and statements.

The papers stated Maphorisa explained at the pre-trial conference that the tax returns were submitted on time after the audit commenced.

The papers also state that Maphorisa further alleged that he provided reasons why the returns were not submitted timeously, ostensibly, due to his mental ill-

After the assessment, the taxman questioned whether the funds, which were paid into his FNB account, were part of his gross income.

Maphorisa disputed assessment and contended that he had provided the receiver of revenue with his Standard Bank account details, bank statements and invoices relevant for the determination of his gross income.

Using the information extracted from Maphorisa's FNB bank statements, Sars issued an audit finding in respect of the tax years on November 14, 2018.

Sars concluded after its assessment that Maphorisa intentionally evaded tax and imposed 200% penalties on his debts.

"The respondent has proven the facts relied upon to impose the USP (underestimated penalties) at the rate of 200% on the basis that the appellant's conduct is correctly classified as intentional tax evasion," read the papers.

"Due to the appellant's failure to respond to the audit findings, the respondent used and applied the information that was readily available to issue the letter of finalisation of audit on 20 December 2018", read the papers.

Sars said it raised estimated assessments, which in total amount to more than R3.3-million

Afterwards, Maphorisa lodged his objections on May 23, 2022, in respect of the 2017 tax year and on July 11, 2022, regarding the 2015 to 2016 tax years.

He then informed Sars of his intention to object to the assessment, but Sars disallowed the objections on July 1, 2022, and on September 1, 2022,

respectively.

Maphorisa lodged his notice of appeal on September 6, 2022, in response to the disallowance of the objections. (Sunday World)

Kardashian subtly reacted to the post by liking it, which sent fans into immediate speculation about the nature of their relationship.

The pair got engaged in 2016, the same year they welcomed their daughter Dream. Their relationship ended in 2017 after a public split that included cheating allegations, leaked nude pictures and legal battles.

According to reports, the "Keeping Up with the Kardashians" star leaked explicit nude pictures of the "Can't See Me" rapper after their breakup and accused her of cheating on him with multiple men.

White also obtained a restraining order against Kardashian and accused him of being physically abusive.

SOME ingredients gain popularity for treating certain skin issues because they often work.

However, they may not be for everyone.

When you're working on your skin, chances are you're following the popular suggestions for solving your particular skin issue, like a salicylic acid treatment for acne or a vitamin C serum for dullness.

After all, what works for hundreds must work for you... right? If only skin transformations were that simple.

When you're faced with a skin care solution that just isn't solving your problem or is actually making your skin worse, it can be not only frustrating but also confusing. There's never only one answer. No one-size-fits-all skin care solution.

Let's look at some of the most popular reasons your skin care routine might not be working, plus alternatives you can try to get your skin issues back under control.

Your routine is inconsistent

Skin care products work best when used daily as part of a routine. Some research shows that stopping a long-term moisturizer can cause excessive dryness, although the skin does bounce back within a month.

The American Academy of Dermatology Association (AAD) also recommends applying products in a certain order. For example, you can try applying moisturizer or sunscreen after any prescription skin medications or treatments.

For the best results, start by cleansing, then medicate, moisturize, and leave makeup for last.

Your product could be expired

If a product has been sitting on the shelf too long, it can definitely make it less effective and less likely to deliver the results you're looking for.

According to the Food and Drug Administration (FDA), cosmetics can degrade over time due to several reasons. For example, products like emulsions can break down as the water and oil separate.

"Consumer skin products should undergo stability and efficacy tests," says Dr. Brundha Balaraman, board certified dermatologist and founder of the SkinTRUST Society.

"Since these tests aren't mandatory, and nonprescription cosmetics aren't approved by the FDA, there's really no way for American consumers to know how long a product will last," Dr. Balaraman says.

The FDA notes that expiration dates for cosmetics are "rules of thumb," and some products should be thrown out within weeks of opening. Mascara, for instance, can easily become exposed to microbes and bacteria, so you should replace it every 3 months.

In general, "all natural" skin care products may contain plant-based ingredients that make bacterial growth more likely, so it's best not to leave them sitting on your shelf for too long.

You're storing your products in the sun or a humid area


According to Dr. Debra Jaliman, a dermatologist based in New York City, where you're keeping your products matters.

"Storing your products in your bathroom where the temperature can get very high due to hot showers may change the effectiveness of some ingredients," Dr. Jaliman explains.

"Extreme ambient temperatures may







significantly affect product stability and efficacy," Dr. Balaraman says. This means it can make your product react, look, feel, and even work differently.

"For example, sunscreen products that are overheated in cars may no longer be effective against ultraviolet radiation, or may cause skin irritation," Dr. Balaraman says.

The FDA notes that exposure to sunlight might cause cosmetics to change color and texture, and moisture can increase the risk of bacterial contamination.

You might want to store your products the way you store food: in a mini beauty fridge.

Humidity, cold, and sun can throw off your routine

When the weather changes, so does your skin care routine. This can lead to less consistent use of products.

For example, in the hot summer months, the FDA suggests reapplying sunscreen every 2 hours. This can make it harder to layer other products or keep makeup in place.

During colder months, on the other hand, dry winter air can leave your skin parched. This can lead you to reach for heavier moisturizers, shifting the balance of products you typically apply.

Weather can be unpredictable, but a temporary change in your skin care regimen probably won't stop you from getting back on track later.

The product is of low quality

"Low quality ingredients can cause a product not to work as well," says Dr. Tsippora Shainhouse, a board certified dermatologist in Los Angeles. Not all skin care products are created equal, and sometimes we see that reflected in prices.

Dr. Shainhouse refers to inferior ingredients, subpar formulations, unstable molecules, or packaging as potential areas for quality checks. For example, open-jar packaging can let a lot of oxygen in, causing destabilization in active ingredients.

If you've eliminated any potential issues with the product, then chances are it's the ingredients.

Your product doesn't have enough active ingredients

"It may be the proper ingredient, but the concentration is so low that by the time some of it reaches the target area in the skin, there's not enough to have a qualifiable or quantifiable effect on the skin," says Dr. Shainhouse.

Before you chalk up an ingredient as ineffective for your skin, search for the ingredient list of your product. If the active ingredient isn't in the top five, there's probably not a high enough concentration to see results.

You have too many (or too few) products

So, how much is too much? Or too few? This depends largely on the products and how you're using them.

HEALTK / leny

According to the AAD, using too many products can irritate your skin. That's especially true for pro-aging remedies, which can actually make your skin look older if you use too many.

Some skin care products are quite powerful, and using too much can have negative effects. If niacinamide, for example, is pilling on your skin, use less and give it a few minutes to absorb after application. But if it's causing changes in skin color or irritation, consider something else entirely.

The same is true with some prescription retinoids for acne. If you're living with skin color changes or irritation, check in with your dermatologist. They might recommend using less of this product.

But sometimes it's a good idea to use products in combination. Hyaluronic acid, which is usually touted as a product that helps retain moisture, can, in some cases, dry out the skin. So, it may work better when combined with a moisturizer.

You're not getting the right information

If your skin care routine falls short of your expectations, it might not be your fault. It could be the information you're relying on.

There are several skin care sources online, many published by people who lack the training or credentials to give sound advice.

Consider speaking with a dermatologist, especially if you have a skin condition like rosacea that requires special care.

Alternative products to try

If retinol is too intense for your skin, try bakuchiol, a natural alternative. Bakuchiol "imitates retinol to a degree because of its pro-aging properties, but it's all-natural, unlike retinol," Dr. Jaliman says.

Bakuchiol extract is also a good alternative to niacinamide. You can also try rosehip seed oil or a face acid. Since niacinamide can treat many conditions, your replacement depends on your goals.

Salicylic acid is a common acne treatment, but not everyone sees results. Many alternative ingredients may work for acne, such as:

- ► face acids
- ▶ retinol
- ▶ zinc
- ▶ sulfur ▶ tea tree oil

You may even want to try at-home blue light therapy. However, if your acne is chronic and cystic, Dr. Jaliman recommends consulting a dermatologist. They can prescribe a stronger treatment, such as a prescription topical or antibiotic,

to get your acne under control. If you have a prescription for your skin and it's not working, consider speaking with a doctor about making changes.

Takeaway

If your skin care routine is falling short, don't worry. Making some small tweaks, like replacing products with alternatives and storing them properly, can help get things back on track.

If you continue to have skin issues, consider consulting a dermatologist for more personalized advice.

Why brushing your tongue is important

YOU brush and floss twice a day, but you could be doing your mouth a disservice if you aren't also attacking the bacteria living on your tongue.

Whether it's to fight bad breath or just for good dental health, cleaning your tongue is important, dentists say.

Your tongue is covered with bacteria

Coffee turns it brown, red wine turns it red. The truth is, your tongue is just as much of a target for bacteria as your teeth are, even if it is not at risk for developing cavities itself.

"Bacteria will accumulate greatly in the areas of the tongue between the taste buds and other tongue structures," says John D. Kling, DDS, of Alexandria, Virginia. "It's not smooth. There are crevices and elevations all over the tongue, and the bacteria will hide in these areas unless it is removed."

Rinsing won't work

So, what is this buildup? It's not just harmless saliva, says Kling. It's a biofilm, or a group of microorganisms, that stick together on the surface of the tongue. And unfortunately, getting rid of it isn't as simple as drinking water or using mouthwash.

"It's difficult to kill the bacteria in the biofilm because, for example, when mouth rinses are used, only the outer cells of the biofilm are destroyed," says Kling. "The cells beneath the surface still thrive."

These bacteria can lead to bad breath and even tooth damage. Because of this, it's necessary to physically remove the bacteria



by brushing or cleaning.

How to clean your tongue

Kling says you should brush your tongue every time you brush your teeth. It's pretty simple:

- ▶ brush back and forth
- ▶ brush side to side
- ▶ rinse your mouth with water
- ▶ Be careful not to over brush, though. You don't want to break the skin!

Some people prefer to use a tongue scraper. These are available in most drugstores. The American Dental Association says there is no evidence that tongue scrapers work to prevent halitosis (bad breath).

Bad breath still a problem?


Cleaning your tongue usually makes bad breath go away, but if it's still a problem, you may want to consult with a dentist or your doctor. Your problem could be more serious. Bad breath can be caused by tooth decay; infections in your mouth, nose, sinuses, or throat; medications; and even cancer or diabetes. Tongue brushing is an easy addition to your daily dental routine. Experts recommend making it a regular

Slot seeks solutions as Liverpool crisis deepens

LIVERPOOL'S blip is becoming a full-blown crisis as manager Arne Slot urgently seeks answers after the Premier League champions suffered a fourth straight defeat for the first time in more than a decade.

The Reds lost 2-1 to Manchester United on Sunday – the first time their bitter rivals have won at Anfield since January 2016.

Liverpool rode their luck in a seven-game winning run at the start of the season, boosted by a flurry of late goals, but an expected improvement in performances has failed to materialise.

They have now lost four consecutive games in all competitions for the first time since November 2014 when Brendan Rodgers was manager.

AFP Sport looks at the serious issues that Slot must address to save Liverpool's season.

SALAH SLUMP

Mohamed Salah looks a pale shadow of the man who terrorised defences last season on his way to winning the Premier League's Golden Boot award.

The "Egyptian King", so often the fulcrum of Liverpool's attack, has scored just one goal from open play in the Premier League this season, on the opening weekend.

On Sunday he was guilty of missing two big chances against United.

The forward was left out of the starting line-up in the recent Champions League defeat at Galatasaray and, starkly, was hauled off on Sunday even as Liverpool chased an

equaliser

Slot will hope it is just a temporary loss for form for a player who signed a new two-year contract in April but there must be concerns that, at 33, his best days are behind him.

Former Liverpool defender Jamie Carragher, now a Sky Sports pundit, says Salah should no longer have a guaranteed spot every week.

"I don't think Salah should be starting every game right now, certainly away from home, with the form he's in," he said on Sky.

"Would he be OK with that? Probably not.

But when you get to a certain age you have to understand that, especially when you're not playing well, where's your argument?"

STRUGGLING SIGNINGS

Slot chose to go big in the summer transfer window, splashing out more than \$450 million (\$604 million) on new signings.

The club twice broke their own transfer record to bring in playmaker Florian Wirtz from Bayer Leverkusen and forward Alexander Isak from Newcastle.

But neither player is yet to register a Premier League goal.

Hugo Ekitike, another big-money arrival, has made a splash but the Frenchman now appears to be behind the misfiring Isak in the pecking order.

Liverpool's substantial spending on forwards was partly driven by the death of Diogo Jota in a car crash in July.

His absence is the elephant in the room at a club still coming to terms with the absence of the 28-year-old Portugal international.

At the other end of the pitch, new arrival Milos Kerkez has struggled to settle at left-back, where he has been preferred to veteran Andy Robertson, and Jeremie Frimpong has failed to nail down his spot on the other flank.

DEFENSIVE CRISIS

Could Liverpool's failure to sign central defender Marc Guehi from Crystal Palace on transfer deadline day cost them the Premier League title?

Since the beginning of May, Liverpool have conceded two more goals in more Premier League games than any other side, doing so in eight of their 12 league matches.

Slot's men have let in 11 goals in their eight league games, in stark contrast to just three by Premier League leaders Arsenal.

Kerkez and Frimpong have struggled to fill the shoes of Robertson and the departed Trent Alexander-Arnold in the full-back positions.

Centre-back Ibrahima Konate has come under sustained fire for his poor performances and even the usually imperious captain Virgil van Dijk was caught out in the build-up to Bryan Mbeumo's opening goal on Sunday.

Guehi has told Crystal Palace he will not sign a new deal at the club, meaning he could leave in January or at the end of the season.

But even if the England defender chooses Liverpool over other potential suitors, it could be too little, too late.

Maguire urges Man Utd to build on Liverpool triumph

HARRY Maguire said Manchester United must build on their momentum after a long-awaited win at Liverpool gave manager Ruben Amorim back-to-back Premier League victories for the first time.

The centre-back headed an 84th-minute winner to seal a 2-1 win against the champions on Sunday, meaning United have now won four of their past six matches.

The club, who slumped to a 15th-place finish in the Premier League last season, are up to ninth following their win at Anfield – just two points behind third-placed Bournemouth and Liverpool, in fourth.

But former United captain Maguire says the team need to use the result – their first win at Anfield in nearly a decade – as a springboard.

"This club will probably get a few plaudits this week – resilience, fighting spirit," he said.

"But if we don't perform next weekend against Brighton, it will be exactly the same the following week so we need to build on it, we need to build momentum, we need to build positive performances – that's the most important thing.

"Performances breed results in the end. Take the positives, take the confidence but at Old Trafford next week against Brighton, we have to make sure we perform and get the win."

In last season's fixture at Liverpool, Maguire squandered a glorious chance to score a last-gasp winner in a match that ended 2-2 so he was delighted to find the target this time.

The England international may have played for United for the final time at Anfield as his contract expires at the end of the season.

"I've been here seven years now

and it's been tough not getting that win, it's been on my mind a little bit to be honest," said the 32-year-old.

"I'm in my last year now so this could be the last time I play at Anfield for this club so it's really important I came here and ticked that one off because it has been playing on my mind."

Verstappen to the max: watching history in the making

MAX Verstappen dominated the weekend, winning both the sprint and the main race, reigniting his title hopes.

This was his 68th career victory and cut his deficit to championship leader Oscar Piastri to 40 points. This weekend alone he clawed back 23 points.

Lando Norris finished P2 after an intense battle with Charles Leclerc, who secured P3 for Ferrari. Lewis Hamilton came home in P4, while Piastri managed only P5 after a tough race

Verstappen led from lights to flag, with strong pace and strategy making the difference in the first stint.

SPRINT DRAMA

The Sprint was chaotic: both McLarens (Norris and Piastri) retired on Lap 1 after a Turn 1 collision triggered by Nico Hülkenberg tagging Piastri. Verstappen won the sprint ahead of George Russell and Carlos Sainz.

CHAMPIONSHIP IM-PACT

Verstappen's double win means he has scored as many points as both McLaren drivers combined over the last five races, putting him firmly back in contention. Norris is now just 14 points behind Piastri in the drivers' championship.

BATTLE FOR P2

The battle between Norris and Leclerc was one of the highlights of the race, and it lasted almost the entire 56 laps.

With about five laps to go, Norris launched his last charge. He first tried a move into Turn 1 on lap 51, but Leclerc countered brilliantly.

Later on the same lap, Norris attacked down the back straight and finally secured P2 for good.

ARSENAL manager Mikel Arteta said he was pleased with his players' commitment, but warned that they cannot get ahead of themselves as they fight for silverware on multiple fronts

Arsenal, unbeaten since August, are three points clear at the top of the Premier League and have won both their Champions League matches so far, but Arteta was not keen to accept the "favourites" tag in the English top-flight.

"The only thing I embrace is when I see the team, the energy, the temperature, the commitment and quality that they can deliver. That gives me the conviction that we can go all the way," Arteta told reporters on Monday, a day before hosting Atletico Madrid in the Champions League.

"But that's just a feeling, then the next day you have to prove it and you can't be busy thinking about those topics.

"Every game in (the Premier League) is must-win. We are very appreciative of that, so we don't get carried away with anything."

Asked about a video shared on social media that showed Arsenal defender William Saliba watching Atletico Madrid on the coach after Saturday's 1-0 win at Fulham, Arteta praised the France international's eagerness to prepare for future opponents.

"Very pleased because I didn't encourage it, that came from them. We know this will be a tough one, so the earlier we think about it the better. I love that initiative from the players," Arteta said.

ARTETA PRAISES 'IN-CREDIBLE' SIMEONE

Arteta said he looked up to Atletico manager Diego Simeone, who has led the Spanish club to two Europa League and two LaLiga titles since taking charge in 2011.

"What he has done since he got to Atletico has been out-

standing, not only what has achieved but the way he has done it. The identity he has created, they are simple and clear to identify because the manager is very much them," Arteta said. "Every game in (the Premier League) is mustwin. We are very appreciative of that, so we don't get carried away with anything."

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
