ESWATINI has confirmed receiving the anticipated Southern African Customs Union (SACU) revenue payment.

Through the Ministry of Finance, the Government said the funds have already been allocated towards settling supplier invoices, financing capital projects, and meeting pension obligations.

In an interview, the Minister for Finance Neal Rijkenberg, said the sum received was approximately E2.65 billion, rather than exactly that figure, and that the funds were already expended.

"The funding has landed and we have already spent all of it. We repaid the Central Bank for the advance, PSPF for the pension deductions, some capital projects, and some suppliers," explained the Minister.

When pressed on whether the figure was precisely E2.65 billion, he said, it was approximately, and the names of the suppliers the Minister revealed they prioritised

"We paid the suppliers that had waited the longest," said the Minister.

Worth noting is that, SACU is the customs union comprising Botswana, Eswatini, Lesotho, Namibia and South Africa.

Its revenue-sharing arrangement places duties collected at union external borders into a Common Revenue Pool (CRP), which is then distributed among members based on a formula.

For Eswatini, SACU receipts have historically formed a significant portion of total government revenue. According to an IMF report, SACU receipts accounted for an estimated 13.6 % of GDP in 2023, and remain a major fiscal pillar.

Earlier research noted that the kingdom was particularly vulnerable to fluctuations in SACU transfers.

Meanwhile independent reporting

supports that the government had cleared verified supplier invoices submitted to Treasury by 2 July 2025.

Invoices

Nevertheless, other supplier groups say that many invoices remain outstanding. A letter by health-sector suppliers to the ministry of health stated that more than E100 million in claims remain unpaid despite the public assurances.

A national supplier organisation, Business Eswatini, confirmed that invoices verified and submitted by the July cut-off date appear to have been paid.

However, many smaller contractors insist that they still await payment and cite delays in line-ministries forwarding invoices as the main obstruction.

One supplier told the press that having to wait months for payment has forced firms

to absorb interest costs, delay wages, or face closure.

Economists highlight that while high SACU transfers provide short-term relief for Eswatini's budget, reliance on them leaves the country exposed to external shocks.

"While public debt remained moderate at 39.2 % of GDP in FY24/25, Eswatini faces higher borrowing costs than neighbouring countries. Directors emphasised the importance of fiscal discipline given volatile SACU revenues," reads an article from IMF.

Economist Mkhosi Thwala has warned of the direct impact of government non-payment on businesses and public service delivery. "If a supplier who cooks for patients at a government hospital or the police service has not been paid the service delivery will be poor and government will be left to deal with angry patients and an agitated police service," he said.

Business Eswatini Chief Executive Officer E Nathi Dlamini said while the SACU inflows had eased pressure on the Treasury, delayed payments remained a serious concern for many members.

"We appreciate the progress, but full clearance of arrears is critical to restoring confidence in government procurement," he said. A Mbabane-based contractor who supplies medical equipment said monthslong payment delays had nearly forced him to close his business.

"We had to take out loans just to pay salaries. Getting paid now gives us breathing space, but it's come too late for some," said the supplier.

Eswatini earns first mainland Africa Bonsucro Certification

ESWATINI has become the first mainland African country to be awarded the Bonsucro certification.

This is an international standard that recognises sustainable and responsible sugar production. The certification covers the Tambankulu Estate (the grower), Royal Eswatini Sugar Corporation's Simunye mill (the miller), and Eswatini Sugar (the marketer).

The landmark event took place on Thursday at Simunye club, the joint accreditation marks a new chapter for the local sugar industry, positioning Eswatini among the global leaders in ethical and sustainable sugarcane farming.

Worth mentioning is that, Bonsucro certification is a global standard for proving the sustainability of sugarcane production and its derivatives.

It is a multi-stakeholder program that requires companies to comply with strict standards, be assessed by third-party auditors, and verify their environmental and social responsibility, including fair labour practices and the protection of ecosystems.

There are two main types of certification: the Production Standard for farmers and millers, and the Chain of Custody (CoC) Standard for the trading side of the supply chain. Eswatini Sugar Chief Executive Officer, Banele Nyamane, said the certification would allow the country's sugar producers to compete at a higher level.

"This new accreditation will allow us to sell top-notch sugar that meets the highest global standards. It also opens the door to premium markets and could generate multi-million-emalangeni returns for the industry," he said.

Sustainability

He further mentioned that Bonsucro is a global sustainability platform for the sugarcane industry. Its certification system measures environmental, social, and economic performance across sugarcane farms and mills. It promotes responsible farming, fair labour practices, efficient water

and energy use, and improved productivity.

"Under the Bonsucro Production
Standard (Version 5.2), mills and growers
are required to show measurable progress
in reducing their environmental impact,
improving working conditions, and ensuring
traceability from field to final product," said

According to the CEO meeting these standards, Eswatini's sugar producers now join a select group of certified players worldwide whose products are recognised as responsibly and sustainably produced.

The Royal Eswatini Sugar Corporation's Simunye mill is the first in the country to be certified, with sugarcane supplied by the Tambankulu Estate. Eswatini Sugar, which markets the country's sugar, played a coordinating role in aligning all stakeholders with the Bonsucro requirements.

"This achievement shows what collaboration can. Growers, millers, and marketers worked side by side with a shared goal to make Eswatini's sugar industry more competitive and sustainable," he said.

The certification is expected to improve Eswatini's access to global markets that increasingly demand sustainably sourced commodities. It also strengthens the country's reputation among international buyers and investors who prioritise environmental and social responsibility.

Industry experts say Bonsucro-certified sugar often attracts better contract terms and improved buyer confidence. Certified mills and estates benefit from operational efficiencies, higher yields, and compliance with international trade and sustainability regulations.

For Eswatini, this milestone could unlock funding opportunities and long-term partnerships in global markets, ensuring growth that balances profitability with environmental stewardship.

Maintaining the certification will require ongoing audits and continued compliance with Bonsucro's standards. Eswatini's sugar industry players are expected to use this momentum to enhance production systems, safeguard labour standards, and meet sustainability targets.

GOVERNMENT has announced that the long-awaited salary review for the country's security forces will now be implemented in November 2025.

This follows delays linked to the ongoing remuneration alignment process and system constraints in the national payroll.

This was disclosed by Acting Government Spokesperson Thabile Mdluli, who said the decision was unavoidable due to overlapping financial adjustments and the need to finalise consultations on the salary review for the Umbutfo Eswatini Defence Force (UEDF), Royal Eswatini Police Service (REPS), and His Majesty's Correctional Services (HMCS).

"Government wishes to update the nation on the unfortunate delay in the implementation of the salary review exercise for the country's uniformed forces. This regrettable development has been necessitated by several factors, among which is the implementation of the Phase II salary adjustment for uniformed forces in September 2025," Mdluli said.

She explained that the rollout of Phase II meant that comprehensive consultations on the new salary review outcomes could not be completed in time for the planned October implementation.

"Consultants have assured government that the salary review component for the uniformed forces is being finalised in consultation with all relevant stakeholders to ensure a satisfactory outcome. This process is expected to be completed on time to enable implementation by the normal pay dates in November 2025," Mdluli added.

The government also confirmed that the Treasury Department was unable to process the October salaries for the security forces alongside other public servants due to technical limitations in the payroll system.

Mdluli explained that the payroll system could only process salaries for all permanent employees simultaneously, which meant that the uniformed forces were automatically af-

fected by the broader delay in October salaries for public servants.

"Government regrets this unforeseen development and acknowledges the inconvenience it has caused. Members of the uniformed forces are assured that His Majesty's Government values their contribution to national safety and security and remains committed to ensuring that their remuneration is reviewed reasonably, just like all other public servants," she said.

The announcement follows recent adjustments under the Phase II remuneration alignments, which were finalised after lengthy negotiations between government and the staff associations of REPS and HMCS.

Earlier this year, Prime Minister Russell Dlamini confirmed implementation of the Phase II package, which benefitted both professional and functional ranks within the security services.

"The outcome of negotiations between government and the staff associations of the security forces has finally yielded positive results,"

said the PM when announcing the conclusion of talks.

Under the professional adjustment levels, officers holding the ranks of inspector/chief officer, assistant superintendent, and superintendent received a once-off, retrospective back-pay calculated at an 8 per cent net present value (NPV) rate for up to 24 months, costing government E₅₇ million annually for 952 officers.

For the functional adjustment levels, which included assistant inspector/assistant chief officer, sergeant, warder instructor, constable, and wardress, a three per cent basic salary increment was implemented, also backdated for up to two years. This category covered 13,119 officers, costing the government E171 million annually.

Meanwhile, the government has also announced new pay dates for civil servants in October. According to a memorandum issued by Accountant General Nomsa Simelane on October 18, permanent employees would be

paid on October 27, while non-permanent employees were due to receive their salaries on October 31.

Simelane said the adjustment was necessary to allow for the proper input and testing of the new salary review scales.

"Government understands the importance of timely salary disbursement and appreciates the understanding and cooperation of all employees," she said, urging civil servants to plan ahead and ensure all stop orders and statutory deductions were adjusted accordingly to avoid penalties.

Principal Secretary (PS) in the Ministry of Public Service, Mthunzi Shabangu, confirmed that the delays were communicated to Public Sector Unions (PSUs) during ongoing discussions about the new pay structure.

Government recently committed to a 100 per cent implementation of the civil servants' salary adjustments recommended under Scenario No. 3 of the Salary Review Report, with effect from October 2025 payday and backdated to April 2025.

It was detailed that 15 per cent of the six months' back pay (April–September 2025) would be paid in October 2025, while the remaining 85 per cent would be disbursed in July 2026, the first month of the second quarter of the 2026/2027 financial year.

For employees in salary bands without an upward adjustment or whose grades were downgraded, he said government had approved a once-off five percent payment of their annual basic salary, to be paid in October 2025.

It was further announced that the revised housing and bus fare allowances would be implemented beginning October 2025, while the full housing allowance adjustments for salary Bands C–F and other consequential allowances would take effect in July 2026.

SINCEPHETELO Motor Vehicle Accident Fund (SMVAF) Chairman Zithulele Gina has revealed that the Fund has paid out over E775 million in claims over the past four years, underscoring the financial weight of road crashes on the organisation and the economy.

He said while the Fund continues to honour its mandate, the growing cost of care and rehabilitation calls for tougher enforcement of traffic laws and stiffer penalties for reckless drivers.

"Reckless behaviour on the roads leads to accidents that are incredibly costly not only in human terms but financially, directly impacting the resources of the Fund," Gina said.

In addition, he said, prevention is the most sustainable form of care, and that begins with making traffic fines a true deterrent.

Addressing more than 100 delegates from Eswatini, South Africa, Botswana, and Namibia, Gina said stricter fines and stronger law enforcement are essential to curb fatalities and reduce claims that burden the Fund.

"We must strengthen law enforcement and ensure traffic fines reflect the seriousness of the offence," he added.

The Chairman noted that while Eswatini's compensation structure has served its purpose, it must evolve with the times to

ensure fair support for victims.

Currently, payouts include E10,000 for funeral expenses, E350,000 for loss of earnings, E350,000 for loss of support, and E150,000 for general damages (pain and suffering).

Meanwhile, Minister for Finance Neal Rijkenberg praised the Fund's shift from a compensation-only model to one focused on integrated, patient-centred care.

He said this approach ensures that financial compensation goes hand-in-hand with physical rehabilitation, mental health support, and long-term reintegration.

"Tougher fines are not just about punishment they're about protecting lives and preserving public resources," the Minister said.

The Fund's new Case Management Model, unveiled at the conference, seeks to:

Coordinate care across medical providers and disciplines

Support rehabilitation and mental health Digitise claims and patient records for transparency and efficiency.

Acting Chief Executive Officer Sam Mzileni described the conference as a reaffirmation of regional unity in building responsive systems of care.

"This is more than a professional convening it's a shared mission to restore lives and uphold dignity," he said.

Mzileni said collaboration among SADC member states was essential in addressing

common challenges.

"The rotational nature of this conference shows our shared commitment to continuous improvement," he said.

Conference speaker Dr Thando Ncube highlighted a critical challenge in accident recovery legal delays in compensation. He said lengthy litigation often stalls rehabilitation, leaving survivors frustrated and financially strained.

"The disconnect between legal timelines and physical recovery can delay healing and impact well-being. We need a more patient-centred legal process that ensures survivors get the care and compensation they need, when they need it," he added.

UNDER the blistering Somntongo sun, 24-year-old Mfanfikile Gumbi sprinted past dozens of hopefuls, his worn-out shoes pounding the dusty ground as if chasing destiny itself.

What made his victory sweeter wasn't just the finish line it was the journey that led him there

Mfanfikile, a humble cattle herder from the rolling hills of Somntongo, has spent most of his days watching over livestock, dreaming of wearing a uniform that represents more than survival one that symbolizes purpose. After dropping out of Qomintaba High School in Form 2 back in 2021 due to financial challenges, life pushed him toward the fields. But even as he tended cattle, his spirit remained unbroken.

"I've been training since 2023," he said, his voice carrying both exhaustion and pride. "Every morning, I would run before going to the cattle post. I knew that one day, this would matter."

And matter it did. During the army recruitment fitness race at Somntongo Inkhundla, Mfanfikile outpaced everyone, his determination cutting through the

scorching heat like a blade through grass. For him, the victory was more than a win it was proof that dreams born in the dust can still shine bright.

"I didn't have fancy running shoes or training equipment," he added with a shy smile. "But I had faith, and I told myself I must make this count."

Following closely behind was 23-yearold Banele Masilela, who finished second in the men's category. A recent graduate from Florence Christian Academy, Banele is currently unemployed and lives with his mother. For him, this opportunity represents hope a chance to rewrite his story.

"I'm proud of how I performed today," Banele said, catching his breath. "Things have been tough at home, and I'm praying this will open doors for me and my family."

On the women's side, 20-year-old Luyanda

Msibi proved that resilience has no gender. After a week of intense training, she emerged the fastest among female competitors, earning her ticket to the next phase of the recruitment process.

"I've been preparing every day, and I'm so happy it paid off," she said, grinning from ear to ear. "I want to make my family proud and serve my country."

For many young people in rural Eswatini, the army recruitment race is more than just a fitness test it's a lifeline. It's a chance to step out of poverty, to trade herding sticks and household chores for boots and discipline.

As Mfanifikile caught his breath, the crowd cheered his name the herd boy who outran the odds. And for a brief, powerful moment, Somntongo wasn't just a place of dust and cattle it was a place where dreams took flight.

MPs accused of flouting Parly procedures

CONCERNS have emerged within the corridors of Parliament over the growing trend of motions that directly call for the appointment of select commit-

The practice has been condemned by some legislators and parliamentary staff who pointed out that it undermines procedure and weakens accountability.

During a consultation session held at Happy Valley Hotel on Thursday, several MPs and the Principal Committee Clerk voiced displeasure with what they viewed as a procedural drift in how select committees were being established.

The workshop brought together members of the Climate Change Sessional Committee, the Gender and Development Sessional Committee, and the Environmental Affairs Portfolio Committee, along with stakeholders from the UNDP, SADC Parliamentary Forum, and the Ministry of Tourism and Environmental Affairs.

Parliament Principal Committee Clerk Mpendulo Ngcamphalala cautioned against duplication of roles among committees, calling for strengthened collaboration rather

"The joint committee will assist in avoiding duplication and work overlaps, which tend to impact negatively on efficiency. Stronger collaboration would also aid in ensuring joint community dialogues that can strengthen parliamentary outreach," he said.

His remarks came as the discussions touched on the proliferation of select committees and the confusion surrounding their mandates and formation. Ngcamphalala noted that traditionally, select committees were established after a motion had been debated and a resolution reached, not as a predetermined clause within a motion itself.

"There is a trend we see in Parliament

now. Motions increasingly stipulate the appointment of select committees instead of allowing the debate to determine whether such a committee is necessary. This is procedurally questionable and should be corrected," observed Deputy Speaker Madala

The clerks also raised concerns about a breakdown in adherence to standing orders and parliamentary norms. Mhlanga lamented that a lot happening in the committees was unparliamentary. He warned that procedures had been strictly followed, none of the recent committee reports would have been adopted because there were no proper deliberations.

He said some chairpersons had reduced committee processes to mere formalities.

"The chairpersons just end up being given only one page to sign before tabling reports. Even the two hours we were allocated for debating ministerial reports was too little. The process is being rushed," he said.

A tense relationship between committee clerks and MPs also came to light. Ngcamphalala revealed that clerks often feel intimidated or sidelined when offering procedural advice.

"Committee clerks are afraid to advise MPs because they might go against their instructions. When we advise, we are seen as difficult. Many clerks have been shut out by chairpersons and end up being bullied," he

However, Lobamba MP Michael Masilela countered that some clerks overstep their

"In some committees, clerks advise, but in others, they issue instructions, which should not happen. MPs must remain independent and make their own decisions, even as they take advice from clerks," he argued.

Ngcamphalala responded that measures would be taken to train clerks on how to

handle themselves more appropriately during committee sessions to maintain professionalism and balance.

The discussions also extended to climate financing, with LaMgabhi MP Sicelo Jele questioning Parliament's role in climate budgeting and whether it relied solely on grants or government allocations.

Ngcamphalala clarified that Eswatini benefits from both climate change loans and grants, while the government also appropriates funds for related initiatives.

He further emphasised the need for a joint committee work plan between climate-related committees to streamline oversight and policymaking.

Meanwhile, Clerk to Parliament Benedict Xaba revealed that Eswatini envisages to establish an Institute of Parliamentary Studies,

which could serve as a regional hub for legislative capacity building.

"Eswatini has been a champion in HIV/ AIDS governance, and we look forward to hosting the SADC Institute of Parliamentary Studies. We must showcase our story and continue being a champion in SRHR and HIV/AIDS governance commitments," said

However, as these ambitions grew, several voices within Parliament called for internal reforms first, starting with stricter adherence to procedure and clarity in the roles of select committees.

The growing sentiment among MPs and clerks alike was that the credibility of Parliament depends on strengthened governance, transparent committee work, and respect for institutional processes.

Murder, baby theft suspect arrested

IN a spine-chilling turn of events, Matsapha Police have cracked what appeared at first to be a simple death into a gruesome murder and baby theft plot that has left the Logoba communitv reeling.

A 25-year-old woman from Mahhoshe, Ngudzeni, has been arrested and charged with the murder of a 26-year-old woman from Moti, kaPhunga, as well as contravening Section 77(1)(B) of the Children Protection and Welfare Act of 2012 taking a child without appropriate consent.

According to a statement issued by Deputy Police Information and Communications Officer (PICO) Nosipho Mnguni, the suspect's arrest follows weeks of intensive investigation by the Matsapha Police, who uncovered shocking details of deceit, poisoning, and a desperate attempt to cover up

False report and suspicious circumstances

It all began on October 5, 2025, when the suspect reported to police that she had



actim lying dead on her bed inside ed flat at Logoba, Ndzevane area.

Police initially treated the case as a sudden death and opened an inquiry file. However, inconsistencies in the suspect's statement quickly raised suspicion.

Further investigation revealed that the name and home area of the deceased, as provided by the suspect, were false. Forensic tests later indicated that the victim had likely been poisoned, prompting investigators to reclassify the matter as a murder case.

The most disturbing discovery came shortly afterward. Upon establishing the true identity of the deceased, investigators

found her "friend" later confirmed as the learned that she had left her home in Moti, Karnunga, with ner 18-month-old baby but when her body was found, the child was nowhere to be seen.

The suspect is expected to appear in court today (Thursday) to face charges of murder and child abduction.

Deputy PICO Mnguni commended the swift action and thorough work of the investigating officers, emphasizing the importance of persistence in uncovering the truth.

"This case is a reminder that our detec tives will continue to follow every lead until justice is served," she said.

Residents of Logoba and Moti, KaPhunga, have expressed horror over the incident, describing the suspect as "quiet but cunning." Many have urged women to remain cautious when visiting acquaintances or accepting invitations from people they do not fully trust.

As investigations continue, the nation watches closely, shocked by the chilling combination of murder, deceit, and the attempted theft of a child a case that has exposed the darkest corners of betrayal and desperation.

A 20-year-old army hopeful has captured the country's attention.

Until a few weeks ago, Lindokuhle Zwane was just another young man trying to make ends meet in one of Eswatini's poorest rural areas.

Today, he is being celebrated as the first male recruit to qualify for the next phase of the army recruitment exercise after outrunning hundreds of competitors during the Shiselweni II Inkhundla race.

He has captured the hearts of many, through social media platform facebook Zwane has received help from members of the public who are rooting for him to make it through the next stage of the army recruitment.

Zwane is the first of nine children. His father, once employed at Montigny, lost his job years ago, and his mother has never worked.

With no stable income, the family survives through subsistence farming and the kindness of neighbours.

"When my father stopped working, everything fell apart. We had to rely on what little we could plant. There were days when we had only one meal," Zwane said in an interview. The pressure of survival forced him to abandon school in Form 1.

"I wanted to stay in school, but there was no money for fees or uniforms. It was painful watching my friends go to class while I stayed behind. But I had to accept it," said Zwane.

At home, Zwane helped his father with fieldwork and often took small jobs to earn a few emalangeni for the household. Even so, he kept dreaming of a way out not for himself alone, but for the family that depended on him

When the army announced the recruitment drive earlier this year, Zwane saw a glimmer of opportunity.

"I told myself this was my only chance. I didn't have fancy shoes or training clothes,

but I was ready to try," he explained.

On the morning of the Shiselweni II race, he joined a crowd of young men gathered under the rising sun. Some wore running gear, others ordinary sneakers. Zwane arrived in worn-out shoes and a faded T-shirt.

The course was demanding steep hills, rocky paths, and stretches of open road under the heat.

However, Zwane never slowed down. Step by step, he pulled ahead until the cheers grew louder and the finish line came into sight.

That moment marked a quiet victory for a young man who had almost given up hope.

A Facebook user who witnessed the event posted Zwane's story online, describing how the Form 1 dropout from Madulini had outrun everyone despite his difficult

background.

Within hours, the post went viral. Messages poured in. People wanted to know who he was, where he lived, and how they could help.


For a family that had never imagined strangers would care, the response was overwhelming.

"People started send-

ing help. They bought me a cell phone and gave me E₃ 000. Some people sent words of encouragement. Others said they would pray for me. I never thought something like this could happen to me," Zwane said.

The support has given the family a much-needed boost. His father, visibly emotional when speaking about the attention, said the kindness of strangers has given them hope after years of hardship.

"Lindokuhle has always been determined. When I lost my job, I felt I had failed my

children. But now I see that my son's hard work is opening doors for all of us," he said.

Neighbours say the story has lifted spirits across Madulini.

"Everyone here talks about him. He has shown that even if you come from a poor background, you can still do something that makes people notice you," said a neighbour to the family.

The young man's daily routine has changed little. He wakes before sunrise, runs along the gravel paths near his home, and helps with chores before resting in the afternoon.

He says the training keeps him focused as he waits for the next stage of recruitment.

"I'm not relaxing because I know what is coming. I want to be strong enough to make it through. My dream is to join the army, take care of my parents, and make sure my brothers and sisters finish school. I don't want them to stop where I stopped," he said.

Meanwhile, a labour analyst who spoke on condition of anonymity said Zwane's story reflects the struggles faced by many young people in Eswatini, where unemployment remains high.

"The army recruitment exercise has drawn thousands of applicants because it represents one of the few opportunities for stable employment," the analyst said.

"Many of these young men and women are not just chasing a career they are trying to escape poverty and support their families. Zwane's case is one of many that show how desperation for work has pushed youth to compete in large numbers for limited spaces," added the analyst.

Minister of Labour and Social Security Phila Buthelezi said Zwane's story highlights the reality faced by many young people in

Eswatini who continue to battle unemployment and limited opportunities.

"What we are seeing through the army recruitment exercise is a clear reflection of the levels of joblessness among our youth," he said.

Buthelezi further said thousands are turning up for the army because they see this as one of the few chances to secure a stable income and a better future.

"As government, we recognise this challenge and are working to create more sustainable employment pathways, especially for young people in rural areas," he said.

Eswatini embarks on journey to establish Cooperative Bank

ESWATINI has taken a significant step toward strengthening its cooperative sector with the launch of the first roundtable engagement for the establishment of the Eswatini Cooperative Bank.

The initiative aims to create a financial institution owned and controlled by the nation's cooperative movement, providing a central hub for financial services, professional capacity building, and digital infrastructure.

The roundtable, hosted by the Ministry of Commerce, Industry and Trade, brought together senior government officials, cooperative leaders, regulators, and international partners, including representatives from Germany's Cooperative and Raiffeisen Confederation (DGVR) and Moshi Cooperative University. The gathering marks what officials describe as a strategic milestone in the modern history of Eswatini's cooperative movement, which dates back to 1931.

Speaking at the event, Permanent Secretary Melusi Masuku highlighted the sector's enduring values of solidarity, self-help, and community progress.

"Our cooperatives have long provided accessible financial services to communities where commercial banks could not reach. The cooperative spirit has mobilised savings, extended credit, and built trust across generations," he said.

Masuku described the proposed cooperative bank as a central financial engine that will empower cooperatives to be more competitive and resilient in a rapidly changing economic landscape.

The institution is expected to provide liquidity support, wholesale banking services, and access to sophisticated financial instruments,

including sustainable and development finance.

"This is not simply a financial initiative. It is an intentional strategy for empowerment, inclusion, and national development," Masuku said.

The Commissioner of Cooperative Development, Russell Nxumalo, confirmed that the initiative is at its inception stage.

"We are currently conducting stakeholder mapping and assessments and will be holding workshops with relevant stakeholders this month," Nxumalo said.

He emphasised that the bank's establishment would comply fully with national regulations and the oversight of the Central Bank of Eswatini

Eswatini's cooperative movement is currently thriving, boasting over 1,430 registered cooperatives with collective assets exceeding E3.5 billion.

Savings and Credit Co-operative Societies (SACCOS) alone provide access to over E2.6 billion in savings solutions and have issued over E3 billion in loans, supporting education, housing, entrepreneurship, and financial inclusion.

International partners are playing a pivotal role in shaping the project. DGVR the German Cooperative and Raiffeisen Confederation

reiterated their commitment to sharing global best practices and expertise from Germany's cooperative banking systems, which encompass more than 700 local banks.

"Our role is to accompany, share, and adapt international best practices to Eswatini's unique context. The goal is a cooperative bank that is professionally managed, digitally enabled, and governed by the institutions it serves," said Fernando Espinosa during his presentation.

The government plans follow-up engagements with additional international partners in early November to further refine the strategic framework for the bank.

Officials emphasise that the success of the initiative will require collaboration across government, the cooperative sector, regulators, and development partners.

With the cooperative bank envisioned as a three-year project, stakeholders see it as a transformative step toward enhancing financial inclusion, supporting micro, small, and medium enterprises (MSMEs), and contributing to national economic development.

Financial Cooperatives issue over E1.35bln in loans

FINANCIAL cooperatives in Eswatini have steadily increased their lending activity over the past eight years, with issued loans surpassing E1.35 billion in 2021.

This is according to a survey shared by Deputy Commissioner for Cooperative Development, Bongani Maziya.

The survey, which tracked lending activity from 2014 to 2021, shows a dramatic rise in issued loans, reflecting the growing role of cooperatives in supporting Swazi communities and businesses.

In 2014, financial cooperatives issued E609 million in loans. Lending activity accelerated significantly over the next few years, peaking in 2017 at E1.27 billion, marking a remarkable increase as cooperatives expanded their reach across the country.

However, 2018 saw a sharp dip in lending, with issued loans falling to E879 million, and remaining relatively steady in the following two years E878 million in 2019 and E845 million in 2020. The sector rebounded strongly in 2021, with issued loans surging to E1.35 billion, the

highest level recorded in the eight-year period.

Maziya emphasised that this lending activity reflects not only the financial capacity of cooperatives but also their commitment to fostering economic inclusion, entrepreneurship, and community development.

"Financial cooperatives continue to be a vital part of Eswatini's economic landscape, mobilising resources and providing loans that empower members to improve their livelihoods," he said.

With the cooperative sector thriving, the government and development partners remain committed to supporting initiatives that enhance the capacity, governance, and sustainability of these institutions, ensuring that their impact continues to grow in the years

Quarterly earnings reveal businesses adapting to tariffs

SOME of the world's biggest producers of food, consumer goods and cars delivered stronger-than-expected quarterly results on Thursday, easing investor concerns over the toll of U.S. President Donald Trump's import tariffs.

Ahead of the third-quarter earnings season, global companies had warned of more than \$35 billion in tariff-related costs as U.S. duties reach their highest since the 1930s. They're also contending with disrupted supply chains, weaker consumer confidence and higher input costs.

As Trump continues to wield trade policy as a negotiating tool, executives still face regular threats of further tariffs and worries that tariffs will lead to higher inflation and hurt household budgets.

On Thursday, the busiest day for results so far this earnings season, some results suggested businesses are finding ways to pass on higher costs to customers or cut them helping fuel stock market rallies.

Take Sweden's Volvo Cars the company's third-quarter earnings smashed analysts' expectations, sending its shares up as much as 40%, as a sweeping cost-cutting programme launched by CEO Hakan Samuelsson began to pay off. The company is among the European carmakers most exposed to Trump's tariffs as most of its U.S.-bound cars are exported from Europe.

"What we're now seeing is really, wow okay, this is delivering faster than we thought and faster than we planned," Samuelson said of the cost reductions.

Gross profit margin rose to 24.4% from the previous quarter's 17.7%. To further counter tariffs, it plans to move production of some hybrid models to America in the coming years. Britain's Unilever another multi-national with a new CEO at the helm, also reported quarterly sales growth that topped expectations, driven by demand for beauty products across North America despite cautious consumer sentiment.

Like its peers, the maker of Dove soap and Hellmann's mayonnaise has been streamlining operations to reduce costs and CEO Fernando Fernandez is focusing on premium products to lift margins.

Earlier this week, German sportswear giant Adidas raised its full year operating profit guidance, saying it had managed to mitigate some extra costs from higher U.S. tariffs. Hasbro on Thursday raised its full-year forecasts, betting on holiday season sales and demand for its digital gaming segment, even as macroeconomic uncertainties cast a gloom on spending among American shoppers. World Diamond Council head says lab-grown gems losing sparkle

LAB-GROWN diamonds are losing their appeal due to oversupply and consumer preferences are starting to shift back to natural stones, World Diamond Council President Feriel Zerouki has said.

The natural diamond industry has seen a price slump since mid-2022 after peaking earlier that year, mainly due to the rising popularity of lab-grown gems especially among younger jewellery buyers.

But a collapse in lab-grown diamond prices on the back of increased production in China and India, has started to undermine confidence in the synthetic gems, Zerouki told Reuters in an interview at a mining conference in Luanda on Wednesday.

"If you look at the latest trends, lab-grown diamond prices are crashing. This is impacting consumer confidence in lab-growns," Zerouki said.


Diamond industry analyst Edahn Golan says the average wholesale price of one-carat and two-carat lab-grown diamonds has fallen by as much as 96% since 2018.

Accessories

Experts have warned that the price of labgrown diamonds could drop so low that they become fashion accessories that no longer compete with diamonds, especially in the key bridal market.

"I believe that the lab-grown bubble has burst. And actually, there is a movement in the trade, even at retail level, to come back to natural diamonds," she added.

Zerouki, who is also Vice President of Trading and Industry at global diamond gi-

ant De Beers, said a rebound in demand for natural stones would not happen by itself, but requires initiatives such as the Luanda Accord.

That is an agreement by diamond-producing countries and firms to create a collective marketing fund for natural diamonds.

Under the agreement, countries such as Angola, Botswana, the Democratic Republic of Congo, Namibia and South Africa have committed to allocate 1% of their annual diamond sales revenue to a campaign to promote natural diamonds.

Italy's Industry Minister Adolfo Urso said it supported the growth of European champions to compete globally.

VENTURE FACES GLOBAL COMPETITION

Code-named "Project Bromo", talks between the three groups started last year.

Europe's top satellite makers have long competed to build complex spacecraft in geostationary orbit but have been hit by the arrival of cheap, tiny satellites in low Earth orbit, notably the Starlink network built by Musk's SpaceX.

Thales CFO Pascal Bouchiat, announcing quarterly sales that

included an initial contract for IRIS², Europe's planned secure satellite network, hailed the new venture but warned on the competition ahead.

"This first development contract for IRIS² doesn't take away the challenges that the European industry, in particular, is facing," he told reporters.

The new combination will employ 25,000 people with revenue of 6.5 billion euros (\$7.58 billion), based on 2024 figures.

It is expected to generate "mid-triple digit" millions of euros of synergies starting after five years, the companies said.

Shares in Leonardo rose almost 2% while Airbus and Thales were up less than 1% in afternoon trading.

"The initiative is certainly positive, as it creates a European leader capable of competing globally and improves the profitability of a business ... that has struggled in recent years," analysts at Italian investment bank Equita said in a note.

Shareholders now face up to two years of talks with governments, unions and the European Commission over the deal, which has implications for activities in Britain and Germany as well as Italy and France.

Italian unions requested more information and said the deal should help the country's sector compete internationally.

Airbus and Thales have cut a combined 3,000 jobs following space losses. The three

new partners made no mention of further cuts, but executives said the focus would now turn towards potential growth.

BALANCING PAYMENTS

The deal will combine activities of Thales Alenia Space and Telespazio - two joint ventures between Leonardo and Thales - as well as various Airbus space and digital businesses, the remaining space activities owned by Leonardo and Thales SESO.

Airbus will hold 35%, and Thales and Leonardo 32.5% each, the companies said.

Sources familiar with the deal said there would be balancing payments to reflect the value of the assets being contributed, with Airbus receiving some compensation, depending on how well the various activities are doing when the deal closes in 2027.

Previous attempts to combine have hit an-

ti-trust hurdles.

"We expect, and will be vigilant, that the synergies created from efficiencies benefit us as a key customer of the new company," said French satellite operator Eutelsat (ETL. PA), opens new tab.

The deal could face objections from smaller German satellite maker OHB (OHBG.DE), opens new tab, which a French parliamentary committee has said could end up acquiring some of the newly combined assets.

OHB did not reply to a request for com-

Agreement between the three companies - each of which has had periods of prickly relations in the past - was salvaged after sources familiar with the matter said the talks had hit obstacles over governance and valuation during the summer. (**Reuters**)

Nexperia's China unit resumes chip sales to domestic distributors

DUTCH chipmaker Nexperia's Chinese unit has resumed supplying semiconductors to local distributors, according to two people briefed on the matter, having previously halted all shipments when Beijing banned exports following an ownership dispute.

But as part of the resumption, which is confined to domestic trade, all sales to distributors must now be settled in Chinese yuan, the people said, whereas transactions had previously only used foreign currencies such as the U.S. dollar.

The Chinese unit also instructed distributors to transact with their customers only in yuan, in an apparent bid to stabilise supply in China and operate more independently from its Dutch parent, one of the people said.

Nexperia, now under Dutch government control, produces large volumes of chips in the Netherlands widely used in the automotive industry and consumer electronics. The majority are packaged in China and sold mostly to distributors.

Nexperia is now seeking alternative packaging partners outside China as the dispute with its Chinese subsidiary shows little sign of a quick resolution, the people said.

Nexperia has also warned customers in China that it does not guarantee the quality of products sourced from its Chinese subsidiary, the second person said.

They spoke on condition of anonymity because of the sensitivity of the matter. The temporary sales halt and the resumption with settlements in yuan had not been reported previously.

A Nexperia spokesperson declined to

comment on the actions of its Chinese unit and said its efforts to seek packaging partners outside China predated the dispute and were not part of a move away from its Chinese factory.

On quality, the spokesperson said it had to inform customers of potential risks, but it had stopped short of saying they should not buy from its Chinese unit.

Nexperia's Chinese unit did not respond to a request for comment. After the Reuters story about it resuming sales was published on Thursday, it issued a statement on its WeChat account that said it was operating independently and its "manufacturing and business activities are proceeding in an orderly manner".

The unit also accused its Dutch parent of raising "groundless doubt" on product compliance and said it would pursue legal options.

DUTCH GOVERNMENT SEIZES CONTROL

The Dutch government took control of

Nexperia on September 30 and removed its Chinese CEO, Zhang Xuezheng, citing concerns its technology might be appropriated by Nexperia's Chinese parent, Wingtech Technology (600745.SS), opens new tab.

Court filings showed that the seizure came after rising U.S. pressure on Nexperia after Wingtech was placed on a restricted export list, though Dutch authorities say governance shortcomings were the trigger.

On October 4, China's commerce ministry blocked Nexperia from exporting chips from China.

Following the order, Nexperia's Chinese unit suspended shipments from its main Dongguan factory to all distributors, the first person said.

The dispute has fuelled concerns about supply chain disruptions across the global auto industry. Nexperia is one of the largest makers globally of basic chips that are not technically sophisticated but are needed in large volumes.

On Thursday, the Japan Automobile Manufacturers Association said Japanese automobile component makers had been notified by a Dutch semiconductor manufacturer that it may not be able to guarantee chip deliveries, which could seriously impact global production.

The German economy ministry said on Wednesday it would have a call with automakers and suppliers to discuss developments related to Nexperia. On Tuesday, the Dutch economy minister said he had spoken with his Chinese counterpart but failed to reach a solution.

King Charles and Pope Leo pray together in a 500-year first

BRITAIN'S King Charles and Pope Leo prayed together in the Vatican's Sistine Chapel on Thursday, in the first joint worship including an English monarch and a Catholic pontiff since King Henry VIII broke away from Rome in 1534.

Latin chants and English prayers echoed through the chapel, where Leo was elected the first U.S. pope by the world's Catholic cardinals six months ago in front of frescoes by Michelangelo depicting Christ delivering the Last Judgment.

Charles, supreme governor of the Church of England, was seated at the pope's left near the altar of the chapel as Leo and Anglican Archbishop Stephen Cottrell led a service that featured the Sistine Chapel Choir and two royal choirs.

Although Charles has met the last three popes, and Popes John Paul II and Benedict XVI travelled to Britain, their previous encounters never included joint prayers.

VISIT TO THE VATICAN IS 'A HEAL-ING' OF TURBULENT HISTORY

The King and Queen Camilla are on a state visit to the Vatican marking the closening ties between the Catholic Church and Anglican Communion, five centuries after their turbulent separation.

"There is a strong sense that this moment in the extraordinary setting of the Sistine Chapel offers a kind of healing of history," Anglican Rev. James Hawkey, canon theologian of Westminster Abbey, told Reuters.

"This would have been impossible just a generation ago," he said. "It represents how far our churches have come over the last 60 years of dialogue."

Cottrell, the Anglican Archbishop of York, stood in at the Sistine Chapel service for Sa-

rah Mullally. She was recently announced as the first woman to serve as Archbishop of Canterbury, the spiritual head of the Anglican Communion, but will not take the role until next year.

The split between the Catholic Church and the Church of England was formalized in 1534, after Pope Clement VII refused to annul King Henry VIII's marriage to Catherine of Aragon.

Henry's desire for a male heir -- and a new wife who might provide one -- was the immediate catalyst, but other factors were also at play, involving the English crown's seizure of church assets and the growth of Protestant ideas in England.

As England swung between Catholicism and Protestantism during the reigns of Henry's daughters Mary I and Elizabeth I, hundreds of Catholics and Protestants were executed for their faith, often burned at the

Charles and Camilla, who visited the Vatican earlier this year to see Pope Francis, also had a private meeting with Leo on Thursday morning. At home in Britain, Charles' disgraced brother Prince Andrew is engulfed in a deepening crisis over abuse allegations and his ties with sex offender Jeffrey Epstein.

The King will travel in the afternoon to

Rome's Basilica of St. Paul Outside the Walls, one of Catholicism's four most venerated churches, where Leo has approved giving him a new title of "Royal Confrater", or brother, at the connected abbey.

Charles will also be gifted a special seat in the apse of the basilica. The wooden chair, reserved in the future for use only by British monarchs, is decorated with the king's coat of arms and the ecumenical motto "Ut unum sint" (That they may be one).

Bishop Anthony Ball, the official Anglican representative to the Vatican, said the honours "show the commitment that both of our Churches have to working for a shared

Buckingham Palace announced on Thursday that Charles had also approved two British honours for Leo: making him the "Papal Confrater" of St. George's Chapel, Windsor Castle and conferring on him the Knight Grand Cross of the Order of the Bath.

The Church of England is one of 46 autonomous churches across some 165 countries that together form the Anglican Commun-

The Catholic Church, which has 1.4 billion members, and the Anglican Communion, with 85 million members, have been improving their ties since the 1960s.

The teachings of the two traditions align on many major issues, but the Catholic Church does not ordain women and generally does not allow priests to marry.

How plastic whistles are becoming an anti-ICE resistance tool in Chicago

AS the shrill sound of whistles echoed through a parking garage in Chicago's North Side on Tuesday, two people flung their car doors open, ducked inside and shrank down into their seats. Outside, a convoy of federal immigration enforcement vehicles that had arrived in the

area just minutes prior sped off. "We just saw a bunch of guys with whistles that chased them out," said Luke, a landscaper who was working nearby and de-

clined to share his full name. The Trump administration in early September launched a deportation crackdown in the Chicago area, targeting what it said were hardened criminals among immigrants in the U.S. without legal status, though many noncriminals have been swept up in raids.

Since then, the piercing blow of a whistle has become a Chicago-wide means of signaling that U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement or U.S. Customs and Border Protection agents are present. It warns undocumented people to flee and invites U.S. citizens to come to the scene to record arrests, give detainees legal information and discourage agents from lingering.

The aggressive immigration enforcement effort - which has no end date - has sparked widespread protests and resentment among residents. Hundreds of federal agents have fanned across the third-largest city in the U.S. and its suburbs, often carrying assault rifles and wearing military fatigues. Agents have teargassed crowds, rappeled from a Black Hawk helicopter to raid an apartment building, dragged immigrants from cars,

held people at gunpoint and shot two people, including one fatally.

Against this heavily militarized force, whistles have become a modest but effective tool to fight back.

"It grew like wildfire," said Baltazar Enriquez, president of Little Village Community Council, a community group in one of Chicago's largest Latino enclaves. "If we have to patrol our neighborhood for the next three years, we're willing to do that just to keep our community safe."

Volunteers from whistle-making parties, opens new tab and local activist groups have passed out the whistles at local festivals and parades and dropped them off at Little Free Libraries. Some residents have picked up whistles from community groups that advertised them on social media - others have simply bought them from dollar stores and

"Our officers are highly trained," said Tricia McLaughlin, assistant secretary for public affairs at the Department of Homeland Security, and "they are not afraid of loud noises and whistles."

Their ease of use and low cost have contributed to their soaring popularity on the streets and on social media. But the impact of a whistle against squads of armed, fast-moving immigration officers is limited.

On a quiet residential street in another North Side neighborhood, residents ran out of their apartments to confront ICE officers as they detained a group of landscapers. Their whistles and shouts managed to draw a crowd and elicit names of detainees to be

passed on to immigration rights groups, but the streets. officers still drove away with two people.

"I'm sure I'll cry again later," said Joanne Willer, a resident of Albany Park who used her whistle to sound the alarm about the detention. "It's just really upsetting."

Afterward, other residents of Albany Park, a Chicago neighborhood known for its diversity that was teargassed by federal immigration agents earlier this month, carried different kinds of noisemakers as they patrolled

Jordan, who declined to share her last name out of fear of retribution, carried her son's toy train whistle.

"I'm Jewish, and I feel very personally tied to what's going on here because of our history as a Jewish people," Jordan said. "I feel like if we're not out here supporting our neighbors, nobody else is going to be doing





ATP chairman Andrea Gaudenzi defended men's tennis's crowded calendar on Thursday, saying scheduling remains the players' choice and that the tour is working to set clearer incentives so the right number of matches are played across the

Speaking after the ATP announced a new Masters 1000 event in Saudi Arabia from 2028, Gaudenzi pushed back on criticism from leading players over a year-round grind. "Tennis is quite unique in that a player can play one match or seven matches in two weeks," Gaudenzi told reporters on Thursday.

"We operate in an environment where players are independent contractors and they choose their own schedules. Some who go deep at big events play fewer tournaments; others need more because they lose earlier and need matches."

REVAMP AIMS TO OPTIMISE THE **CALENDAR**

Gaudenzi said the ATP's ongoing "Vision 28" revamp aims to optimise the calendar and strengthen the tour's "premium product" - the Grand Slams, Masters 1000s and season-ending Finals - while improving rules and incentives so players build schedules "in a waterfall system" starting from the biggest events.

"Philosophically speaking, the direction in which we're going, because we're doing a revision of our rules with the goal of creating a new product, Vision 28, is that players should play in a sort of a waterfall system where if you're a top player, your schedule should start with slams, Masters and the Finals," he said.

"When you don't perform well or need matches, you can play down at the 500s."

ATP boss Gaudenzi defends schedule amid player workload scrutiny

He said the ATP could "help create better rules" and that "the off-season should be longer - for players and for fans."

But, he added, "protecting players from themselves would require a completely different structure where they're employees and the tour controls when they play."

His comments come amid renewed scrutiny of the workload.

Women's world No 2 Iga Swiatek has called the calendar "relentless" and warned she may skip mandatory events to prioritise health.

INJURIES AND LIMITED RECOV-**ERY TIME**

Men's players including Jack Draper, Holger Rune, Alexander Zverev and Daniil Medvedev have also highlighted injuries and limited recovery time as Masters tournaments expand to 12 days.

Gaudenzi acknowledged those concerns but argued that the open system - in which players decide when and where to compete - inevitably creates uneven workloads, with elite performers playing 80 matches in strong seasons and others chasing games and points lower down the ladder.

"If the goal is a fair range - say 70 to 85 matches a year - then some players will naturally need more tournaments than others," he said.

Gaudenzi said the new Saudi partnership would be used to boost the Masters bonus pool to encourage top-player participation.

While some players have been criticised for entering exhibition tournaments amid a heavy workload, world No 1 Carlos Alcaraz

last week defended playing in the lucrative Six Kings Slam in Riyadh as less taxing than regular tour events – another sign of the competing incentives players navigate.

Gaudenzi said the ATP would keep refining incentives, rules and the off-season, but the basic balance between player freedom and tour control was unlikely to change.

"If you want a long, successful career, you say 'no' more often than 'yes' and build around the biggest events," he said.

"That's the reality at the top of the game and ultimately, it's the players who choose." (Supersport)

Ryan relishing Gary Player CC history and Blu Label Unlimited Challenge format

TYRONE Ryan embraced the modified stableford format of the Blu Label Unlimited Challenge and claimed the lead on 22 points after Wednesday's first round at both the Gary Player Country Club and Lost City Golf Club courses. Ryan played the challenging Gary Player Country Club in the first round and teed off the 10th hole as he worked his way into a nine-point lead.

But it was the format and how it translated to his strategy on the golf course that most excited Ryan.

"It's just such an amazing place with so much history behind it. The greats of the game have walked these fairways. The format is nice in the sense that

you need to be making birdies and eagles, so you need to be aggressive without shooting yourself in the foot. I'm always having birdie in the back of my mind in some shape or form," Ryan said.

"The round was good. I had a lovely hole-out for eagle on my ninth hole - funny enough with the same club that I got a hole-in-one with last week," he said, referring to his ace in last week's Fortress Invitational where he finished tied fourth to give him good momentum coming into this week.

"I also had a chip-in eagle on my 10th hole and carried the momentum through with birdies on my 13th, 15th, 16th and 17th holes."

Verstappen chasing glory as McLaren duo bid to bounce back

MAX Verstappen chases a fourth win in five starts this weekend as he bids to heap more pressure on McLaren duo Oscar Piastri and Lando Norris at the Mexico City Grand Prix, one of his most rewarding tracks.

Bull's four-time world champion, who has won five times in seven years at the high-altitude Autodromo Hermanos Rodriguez, has cut Piastri's lead ahead of him, in third place, from 104 points to 40 since August with a scintillating burst of form.

Piastri still leads teammate Norris by 14 points, but he has lost his metronomic consistency and, as McLaren appear to be floundering to match Red Bull for pace, he appears also, like Norris, to be weighed down by the pressure of the title battle.

After finishing on the podium in every race bar one since the season-opener in Australia, his last three results have been a retirement, fourth and fifth.

His qualifying form has deteriorated at a similar rate.

Norris has also struggled for consistency, but appeared in Texas last weekend to have regained some confidence and pace as he finished second behind Verstappen, who had started from pole and also won the sprint.

He remains, however, without a win since the Hungarian race in August.

"They are weighed down with this

looming battle," said former Indycar run-in knowing what to expect and ariver and prominent analyst James Hinchcliffe, speaking on the F1 Nation podcast.

"Even Red Bull in 2024, started the season strong, but once McLaren caught up... you started seeing their pit stops falter a little bit...

"Pressure is an interesting thing. You always want to be the hunted because it means you've got the points lead, but passing is tough in F1 – on track and in a championship."

'WITH MAX IT CAN HAPPEN'

With the experience of four title triumphs, Verstappen heads into the season's

enjoying himself.

"If it comes down to the last race and they are tight on points, maybe in that moment Max is the man to follow," said two-time world champion Fernando Alonso.

"The McLarens have enough car advantage to fight between them, but with Max it can happen as in 2021."

While Red Bull bid to snatch glory from McLaren in Mexico's thin air and the final races, Ferrari travel in hope of an unlikely repeat of their last victory, (Supersport)

"Official: Leo Messi will continue to be an MLS player with Inter Miami," the league's Spanish language account on X said.

Inter Miami's X feed posted a video of Messi signing a contract sitting at a table in the middle of the club's new stadium, which is under construction, with the simple caption: "He's Home."

The Argentine superstar's new contract will see him remain with Inter through the end of the 2028 season, sources with knowledge of the deal confirmed to AFP.


The 38-year-old World Cup-winner's current contract expires at the end of the 2025 MLS season.

A new deal had been viewed as a formality after club sources told AFP last month that the franchise had reached an agreement on an extension

He has scored 114 international goals and also won the Copa America twice with Argentina, in 2021 and 2024.

MLS GOALS HISTORY

Messi could play at a sixth World Cup next year, which would set a new all-time record, although he

could be matched by long-time rival Cristiano Ronaldo of Portugal.

The eight-time Ballon d'Or winner is also just three goals short of Miroslav Klose's record of 16 career World Cup goals.

Argentina comfortably booked a spot at next year's finals, finishing nine points clear at the top of the South American qualifying table.

Messi finished as the top scorer with eight goals, including a brace in what may have been his last competitive match on home soil against Venezuela two weeks ago.

He was named the MLS Most Valuable Player in the 2024 season even though Inter Miami were eliminated in the playoffs.

Augusta chairman on Masters criteria change: 'Golf is a global game'

AUGUSTA National chairman Fred Ridley said the recent change in invitation criteria announced by the Masters was driven by the increased international representation at the tournament.

Augusta National Golf Club and The R&A jointly announced on August 26 a change in qualification criteria to ensure "strong international pathways into both major championships." That included removing automatic Masters qualification for winners of FedEx Cup Fall events, while awarding invitations to the winners of six national opens beginning in 2026.

Speaking ahead of this week's Asia-Pacific Amateur Championship in Dubai, which also grants a place in the Masters and Open Championship fields to the winner, Ridley said the Masters tournament committee was compelled to reward "historic" national opens.

"International competition has always been a big part of the Masters Tournament. That representation internationally has grown over the years to where it's pretty much 50/50, and maybe even a few more, international players," Ridley said Thursday at the Emirates Golf Club, per Golf Digest. "So, we thought it was appropriate to sort of carry on that tradition and the culture that we've established at the Masters."

Masters invites are now extended to the winners of the Australian Open, Scottish Open, South African Open,

Spanish Open, Japan Open and Hong Kong Open. England's Marco Penge earned a spot in the 2026 Masters by winning the Spanish Open while last week's Japan Open was won by Naoyuki Kataoka, who entered the tournament ranked 500th in the world.

"Golf is a global game, and I think we always want to recognise that," Ridley said. "We felt that not only were we living true to our values, but we also were hopefully maybe just as this championship has inspired young amateurs around the Asia-Pacific region, we hope that that incentive of awarding the winners an invitation, a spot in the Masters Tournament as well as The Open Championship, would also generate additional interest in those countries.

"I know that in Japan recently that was the case. I think it will be the case in all these countries. So we are very excited about that change in our qualifications."

The R&A qualifies golfers for The Open Championship through the R&A's Open Qualifying Series, which consists of 15 tournaments across 13 countries.

"We (also) believe golf is a global game and we want the strongest international fields at our respective tournament and championship," R&A CEO Mark Darbon said.

The 90th edition of the Masters is scheduled for April 9-12, 2026. The 154th Open will be played July 16-19 at Royal Birkdale in England.


"It's one of my favourite events and venues for the year and I always look forward to coming back to play this event," said Premlall.



The courses can vary significantly, often including hills, flat ground, and obstacles like logs or ditches. Races typically range from 3km to 12km, with 5km being common for high school events and 8km or 10km for collegiate competitions.

THE COACH'S ROLE



He encouraged the schools, particularly the sports teachers, to stick to the vision of the Foundation and KFC to unearth legendary talent through the right and structured environment.

He emphasised training, saying he did not just become who he is but trained on his own and without soccer boots, always practising how to score goals.
