ESWATINI's relentless fight against HIV and AIDS has achieved remarkable success, with the latest UNAIDS report revealing that the country has surpassed global treatment targets and drastically reduced new infections.

According to the report, new HIV infections have fallen sharply from a staggering 21,000 per year in 2000 to approximately 4,000 in 2023, marking one of the most significant national turnarounds in the global HIV response. These results place Eswatini among the world's leading examples of effective HIV management, reflecting years of sustained political will, strong community involvement, and an unwavering commitment to universal access to treatment.

A model for the world

The report further confirmed that Eswatini has surpassed the UNAIDS 95-95-95 treatment targets, an ambitious global goal aimed at ending AIDS as a public health threat

This means that 94% of people living with HIV know their status, 97% are receiving antiretroviral treatment, and 96% of those on treatment have achieved viral suppression meaning their viral load is so low that they can live healthy lives and cannot transmit the virus sexually.

UNAIDS praised Eswatini for its coordinated national response, which has been supported by government policies, civil society organizations, and international partners such as PEPFAR and the Global Fund.

"Eswatini has demonstrated that ending AIDS is possible," read part of the UNAIDS statement.

"Through strong leadership, community engagement, and health system investment, the country has transformed what was once

a story of hope and resilience."

Life expectancy on the rise

The impact of these health gains is being felt across society.

The country's life expectancy has increased from 45 years in 2009 to 57 years in 2021, reflecting a significant improvement in public health outcomes.

This progress has been largely attributed to expanded access to HIV treatment and improved healthcare delivery.

Health experts note that as more people access life-saving antiretroviral therapy and

routine viral load monitoring, HIV is now managed as a chronic condition rather than a fatal disease.

Prevention and Innovation

The success is also linked to widespread access to HIV testing services, the introduction of Pre-Exposure Prophylaxis (PrEP) for those at higher risk, and the decentralization of viral load testing laboratories to regional health facilities.

These innovations have brought services closer to communities, improved patient monitoring, and helped identify treatment gaps quickly.

A united front against HIV

Minister of Health Mduduzi Matsebula recently commended all stakeholders for their role in achieving these milestones, noting that the journey toward ending AIDS continues

"These achievements are the result of collective effort from our healthcare workers to the people living with HIV who have shown courage and commitment," he said. "Eswatini is proof that with determination, we can overcome even the toughest challenges."

Civil society groups also welcomed the report, emphasizing the importance of maintaining momentum through continued education, stigma reduction, and youth-focused prevention programs.

While celebrating the success, experts warn against complacency, urging sustained investment in prevention, treatment, and education particularly among young people and key populations who remain vulnerable.

Nonetheless, Eswatini's progress serves as a powerful reminder that the fight against HIV/AIDS can be won through unity, compassion, and science-driven policies.

As the Kingdom continues to strengthen its healthcare systems, Eswatini stands tall as a global beacon of hope in the quest to end AIDS by 2030.

"This milestone means we are not only maintaining progress but moving towards more modern, patient-friendly treatment options," said the Ministry of Health spokesperson Nsindiso Tsabedze. "Injectable ART will help reduce stigma and improve quality of life for thousands of emaSwati." Tsabedze explained.

99 army hopefuls already through stage 1 in the army recruitment

THE Umbutfo Eswatini Defence Force (UEDF) has successfully completed the Shiselweni leg of its national army recruitment race, marking yet another milestone in the ongoing nationwide exercise.

The recruitment drive, which took place on Monday, concluded at KuMethula the 33rd constituency to host the event with three hopefuls, two males and one female, emerging victorious in the first stage of the rigorous selection process.

After the first stage the army hopefuls will be called in for medicals.

According to UEDF spokesperson Brigadier Sotja Dlamini, the exercise in the Shiselweni region proceeded smoothly, with strong turnout and high levels of discipline among the participants.

"We are thankful to God Almighty and to His Majesty King Mswati III for guiding us throughout this process and for ensuring the continued success of the recruitment race,"

The Brigadier added that the army remains committed to fairness, transparency, and national representation in the recruitment

process, which seeks to identify the most capable and committed young Emaswati to serve in the force.

"The enthusiasm we have seen across constituencies has been remarkable. Our youth have demonstrated determination, strength, and patriotism qualities that are essential for service in the Defence Force," he said.

With the completion of the Shiselweni leg, the total number of successful army hopefuls from both the Manzini and Shiselweni regions has now reached 99.

The recruitment team will now move to the Lubombo region, before concluding the national tour in Hhohho, where the final group of candidates will compete for selection

The recruitment race, which began earlier this month, has been met with great anticipation and excitement across the country.

Communities have turned out in large numbers to cheer on local youth as they take part in the physically demanding selection stages, which test endurance, discipline, and mental strength.

The exercise forms part of the army's broader effort to strengthen its human resource base, ensure regional balance in recruitment, and offer employment opportunities to young Emaswati.

As the race moves eastward to Lubombo, Brigadier Dlamini expressed optimism that

the spirit of discipline and unity displayed so far would continue to define the process.

The next recruitment event is expected to take place later this week in the Lubombo region, before the final selection stage in Hhohho brings the 2025 national army recruitment drive to a close.

THE Minister of Finance, Neal Rijkenberg, has assured the nation that government is not cheating anyone when it comes to tax deductions, saying all tax processes are done in full transparency and in accordance with the law.

Speaking to Eswatini Daily News, Minister Rijkenberg explained that deductions are guided strictly by the Eswatini Revenue Service (ERS) regulations and that neither government nor employers manipulate the figures. "Government doesn't cheat anyone when it comes to tax," said Rijkenberg. "PAYE is calculated based on the income an employee earns, and the deductions go straight to the Eswatini Revenue Service. There are clear brackets and procedures that are followed." The minister added that citizens should take time to understand how the PAYE system works so that they can verify deductions on their payslips. He noted that tax transparency is a cornerstone of good governance and that all public servants and private employees are encouraged to familiarize themselves with the tax tables published annually by ERS.

Rijkenberg also reaffirmed government's commitment to maintaining fiscal discipline and fairness in all financial dealings, stating that taxes collected are reinvested into essential national services such as health, education, and infrastructure.

The finance minister concluded by urging all taxpayers to comply with the country's tax laws, adding that doing so strengthens the nation's ability to deliver on its development goals.

... Minister clarifies PAYE structure A amid civil servants' Dvuladvula

THE Minister of Finance, Neal Rijkenberg, has clarified how the Pay As You Earn (PAYE) system works in the country following widespread concerns among civil servants over higher-than-expected deductions from their recently reviewed salaries and backpays.

Speaking to Eswatini Daily News Minister Rijkenberg said the seeming spike in PAYE deductions observed this month is a result of backpay and salary adjustments that temporarily push most civil servants into higher tax brackets.

"When backpays or increments are effected, most civil servants' salaries enter the 33 per cent PAYE bracket," he explained. "This is because the tax calculation considers the total earnings within a given period, and when you receive several months' worth of pay at once, it appears as though your monthly income has significantly increased."

The Minister said it was important for public servants to understand that this does not mean they are being overtaxed, but rather that the tax system is automatically adjusting to the increased total earnings for the period in question.

He noted that the PAYE system in Eswatini is progressive, meaning individuals pay a higher rate as their income rises, while those earning below a certain threshold remain exempt.

"Government doesn't tax or collect PAYE on those earning E3,500 and below, because they fall under the non-taxable income threshold," he said. "There are varying brackets in as far as PAYE is concerned, with each range taxed differently. The system is designed to ensure fairness, so that lower

earners are protected while higher earners contribute proportionally more."

The Minister further explained that once salary structures normalize in subsequent months without the one-off effect of backpay the majority of workers' PAYE deductions will automatically return to their normal levels.

He urged civil servants to remain calm, assuring them that no new tax policy or rate change had been introduced alongside the salary review.

"We have not increased PAYE rates. The system remains exactly the same as before. What happened this month is a technical reflection of arrears being processed together with regular earnings," he said.

Minister Rijkenberg also encouraged employees to verify their PAYE statements and payslips to understand the calculation process. He advised that any queries could be directed to the Eswatini Revenue Service (ERS), which is mandated to assist workers in understanding how their income tax is computed.

Economists have backed the Minister's explanation, noting that backpay adjustments are known to trigger temporary changes in tax deductions in most countries that use progressive tax systems.

Meanwhile, some civil servants expressed relief after the clarification, saying it helps them understand why their net pay appeared smaller than anticipated.

"We thought government had increased taxes without informing us," said a primary school teacher from the Shiselweni region. "It's good that the Ministry has come out to explain this."

The Ministry of Finance is expected to issue a formal advisory circular to all

government ministries and departments to help employees better interpret their payslips following the salary review implementation.

Brigadier warns army hopefuls: "avoid pregnancy and trouble with the law"

THE ongoing national army recruitment exercise took a serious tone this week as Brigadier General Sotja Dlamini issued a stern warning to successful army hopefuls, urging them to avoid getting pregnant or being arrested before the training phase begins.

Speaking during the recruitment process in the Lubombo region, Brigadier Dlamini cautioned candidates that discipline and personal conduct remain central pillars of military life even before they officially commence training.

He warned that those who engage in behavior that compromises their readiness or tarnishes

the image of the Eswatini National Army could lose their hard-earned opportunity.

"We are proud of those who have successfully made it this far, but the journey is not yet over," Dlamini said. "You must protect this opportunity with your life. Avoid trouble, stay disciplined, and most importantly, do not get pregnant. Once you are caught in such situations, you automatically disqualify yourself."

The Brigadier emphasized that the army values physical fitness, emotional stability, and discipline, and any candidate who engages in criminal activities or irresponsible behavior before official enlistment will be dropped without hesitation

He further implored all hopefuls to avoid public misconduct, stay away from illegal gatherings, and always keep their identification documents ready, as the recruitment team continues to verify the eligibility of candidates across the region.

"We want soldiers who are ready to serve the nation with pride, not those who will bring embarrassment to the uniform," he added.

Dlamini also appealed to local councils (Bandlancane) in the various constituencies to assist in monitoring the behavior and conduct of successful candidates, ensuring that only those

of good standing proceed to the next stage.

The recruitment exercise in the Lubombo region continues to attract hundreds of young men and women, many of whom see the opportunity as a gateway to employment and national service. Meanwhile, reports indicate that some candidates from other regions had already been disqualified due to issues such as falsified documents and failure to meet the physical requirements, prompting the Brigadier's strong warning to the remaining hopefuls.

"This is not just a job it's a lifetime commitment to the protection of our Kingdom," Dlamini concluded.

Knife-wielding man forces pupils to perform lewd acts

TWO pupils from one of the schools in Mbikwakhe, Matsapha, are recovering from a terrifying ordeal after they were allegedly threatened by a man who forced them to perform lewd acts at knifepoint before robbing them.

The incident occurred shortly after 9 p.m. on Monday when the two teenagers, said to be in a relationship, were spotted by the man while they were sharing a kiss along a quiet stretch near the community.

According to community police member Sikhumbuzo Ngwenya, the man confronted the pupils and asked them what they were doing outside at that hour.

When the pupils explained that they were heading home, the man allegedly ordered them to continue kissing and went as far as demanding that they perform improper activities while he watched.

Ngwenya said when the teenagers refused, the man pulled out a bush knife and threatened them with violence if they

"He ordered them to continue kissing while pointing the bush knife at them. The frightened pupils complied because they feared for their lives," Ngwenya said.

After a few moments, the man reportedly ordered the teenagers to hand over all their belongings, including mobile phones and money.

"He then took their cellphones and a small amount of cash before running away. The children later told us they preferred to be robbed rather than obey his sexual demands," said Ngwenya.

Community police, who were patrolling nearby, were alerted by a passerby who had seen the pupils crying. They managed to trace and detain the suspect later that night. Ngwenya said when questioned, the man denied the allegations, claiming he had only confronted the teenagers because he was shocked to find them engaging in immoral behaviour.

"He told us he was trying to stop them from doing wrong things and that he was surprised when we accused him of pulling a knife," Ngwenya said.

The suspect was handed over to the Royal Eswatini Police Service (REPS) for further investigation. Police Deputy Spokesperson and Communications Officer Inspector Nosipho Mnguni confirmed the incident and said the suspect was in custody.

"We can confirm that a man has been handed over to the police by community members following allegations of assault, threats of violence, and robbery involving two school pupils. Investigations are ongoing," Mnguni said.

She commended the quick response by community police, saying such cooperation between residents and law enforcement often helps prevent tragedies.

Meanwhile, the mother of the girl involved said she was deeply shaken by the incident and saddened that her daughter was in such a situation.

"I was disheartened when I heard what happened. I am also disappointed that my

daughter is dating at such a young age

However what hurts most is that a grown man could threaten and humiliate children like that," she said.

The mother said her daughter was too traumatised to speak further and refused to be interviewed.

"She just cries when we talk about it. I am grateful she was not physically harmed, but she is not the same. I am worried about her mental state," she said.

The boy's parents also expressed outrage, saying they could not believe a man from their own community could act with such cruelty.

"We raised our children to respect adults. For a man to turn around and threaten them like that it's painful. We are just thankful they are alive," the father said. Meanwhile, Eswatini Action Group Against Abuse (SWAGAA) Director Nonhlanhla Dlamini strongly condemned the incident, saying the man's actions were not only criminal but also psychologically damaging to the children.

"Even if he Abelieved the pupils were misbehaving, no adult has the right to humiliate, threaten, or assault children. He should have reprimanded them or reported them to their parents or the police," Dlamini said. She added that both pupils would need psychological support.

"These children are going to carry trauma from that night. The threat of sexual violence leaves lasting scars. They need counselling, follow-up, and close monitoring both at home and school," Dlamini said.

Police have not yet revealed the suspect's age or whether he is known to the victims. However, sources close to the investigation said he is believed to be in his thirties and resides within the Mbikwakhe

REPS spokesperson Mnguni said investigators are still gathering evidence,

including statements from the victims and community members who responded to the incident.

"At this stage, we cannot confirm whether the suspect will face charges of attempted rape, assault, or robbery, as investigations are ongoing," she said.

Mngun urged parents and community members to protect children from potential predators by ensuring they are home before dark.

"We continue to appeal to parents to be vigilant. Children, especially teenagers, should not be walking around at night. Adults should also act responsibly and report any concerning behaviour to the police rather than taking matters into their own hands," she said.

Residents in Mbikwakhe have described

the incident as one of the most disturbing acts they have heard of in recent months. Some said they were shocked that a man could use the pretext of moral correction to commit such an offence

One resident, who asked not named, said, "We are always telling our children not to be out late, but we also expect adults to protect not prey on them. What this man did is unforgivable,"

Community police have called for greater cooperation between schools, parents, and the community to prevent similar incidents.

"We cannot be everywhere at once. Parents must know where their children are. At the same time, we must all be responsible enough not to exploit or harm them," said Ngwenya.

THE Eswatini Water and Agricultural Development Enterprise (EWADE) has announced a major employment milestone under the E2.6 billion Mpakeni Dam Project, with 900 Emaswati now directly employed in various phases of the project.

EWADE Chief Executive Officer, Dr. Samson Sithole, described this achievement as a landmark moment in the country's economic and infrastructural development.

"The employment of 900 Emaswati is a huge milestone in the history of the country," said Dr. Sithole during a media briefing this week. "This is not just about constructing a dam, it's about creating opportunities, empowering our people, and shaping a sustainable future."

The Mpakeni Dam project, located in the Lubombo region, forms part of Eswatini's broader effort to ensure water security, agricultural growth, and rural development. The construction has absorbed local labour in multiple areas, including civil engineering, masonry, transport, administration, catering, and environmental monitoring.

Dr. Sithole said that employment creation has been one of the project's central goals from the outset, ensuring that communities around the project site benefit directly from its progress.

"We made a commitment that Emaswati should be the primary beneficiaries not only when the dam is complete but throughout its construction. Today, 900 of our citizens are earning a living from this project, supporting their families and communities," he added. The EWADE CEO also revealed that over E600 million from the total E2.6 billion budget has already circulated within Eswatini's economy through local procurement and contracts.

"This project is pumping money directly into the national economy. Local contractors, transporters, and suppliers are gaining new business opportunities, while small enterprises in nearby areas are thriving because of the increased activity," Dr. Sithole noted.

Beyond job creation, EWADE has

prioritized skills development and capacity building among local workers. Many of the 900 employees are receiving on-thejob technical training in construction, water management, and environmental conservation skills that will remain useful long after the project's completion.

"We are not only employing people; we are building a skilled workforce for future national projects. These Emaswati will carry forward the knowledge gained here into other areas of infrastructure and development," Dr. Sithole explained.

The Mpakeni Dam project is a cornerstone of Eswatini's long-term development vision, supporting food security, irrigation expansion, and resilience against climate change.

Employment

Once operational, the dam is expected to supply water for thousands of hectares of farmland, enabling communities to engage in commercial and smallholder agriculture.

Economists have hailed the employment and local spending figures as signs of a productive public investment, with ripple effects expected across the construction, retail, and service sectors.

Dr. Sithole emphasized that the success of the project so far reflects the power of collaboration between government, local communities, and international development partners. "The Mpakeni Dam stands as a symbol of national progress. It shows what Eswatini can achieve when we unite behind a shared vision. These 900 jobs are not just numbers, they represent dignity, livelihoods, and hope for a better tomorrow," he concluded.

Two nabbed for possession of protected wildlife parts

IN a continued crackdown on illegal possession of wildlife products, police in Siteki have arrested two men for being found in possession of a grey duiker skin and a bushbuck horn without a licence or permit.

According to a statement issued by the Deputy Police Information and Communications Officer, Assistant Superintendent Nosipho Mnguni, the suspects, aged 27 and 29, were arrested in the early hours of Monday, 27 October 2025, at around 04:30 a.m., in the Nsulutane area under the Lubombo Region.

The police said the two men were charged under the Game Act, which prohibits the possession, trading, or transportation of game products without proper documentation.

"On 27/10/2025 at about 0430 hours, Siteki Police arrested and charged two men aged 27 and 29 of Nsulutane for being found in possession of a grey duiker skin and a bushbuck horn without a licence or permit while at Nsulutane area," read part of the police statement.



The suspects are currently in police custody and are expected to appear before the Siteki Magistrates Court to face charges related to the unlawful possession of protected wildlife specimens.

Police sources revealed that the arrests followed a routine patrol operation

conducted in the early hours of the morning as part of the ongoing efforts to curb wildlife crime in the region. The operation aims to address the increasing cases of poaching and illegal wildlife trade, which threaten the country's biodiversity and conservation initiatives

The grey duiker and bushbuck are among Eswatini's protected species, commonly found in forested and rural areas. Possessing or trading their body parts without authorization violates national wildlife protection laws and carries severe penalties, including imprisonment or heavy fines.

The Deputy PICO urged members of the public to refrain from engaging in illegal hunting or wildlife trade and to report any suspicious activity to the nearest police station. "We continue to remind the public that wildlife belongs to all of us, and protecting it is a shared responsibility. Anyone found in unlawful possession of game products will face the full might of the law," the Deputy PICO emphasized.

Environmental and conservation groups have commended the police for their vigilance, saying such arrests send a strong message to those involved in wildlife crimes.

"This is an important step in deterring poaching and protecting Eswatini's natural heritage," said a representative from a local conservation organization.

The public has been encouraged to assist law enforcement by reporting cases of poaching, illegal trade, or suspicious possession of wildlife parts through the Eswatini Police Service toll-free crime stop lines.



Eswatini strengthens PPP framework

ESWATINI, through the Ministry of Finance, has begun a series of high-level capacity-building sessions under the African Legal Support Facility (ALSF) to enhance the country's readiness for Public-Private Partnerships (PPPs).

The training, taking place at the Hilton Garden Inn in Mbabane, will run until November 5, 2025 and forms part of the broader Eswatini PPP Advisory Project aimed at equipping government officials and key stakeholders with the tools to manage PPP processes effectively.

The Principal Secretary in the Ministry of Finance, Vusi Dlamini, opened the session, underscoring the government's intention to deepen collaboration with the private sector while upholding transparency and accountability in public investment.

"Our goal is to ensure that Eswatini's PPP framework aligns with international standards and provides value for money for the public while attracting credible private investment," said Dlamini.

The ALSF, a pan-African institution hosted by the African Development Bank, provides legal and technical assistance to African governments in complex commercial transactions including PPPs, infrastructure development, and natural resource management.

In Eswatini's case, the facility's focus is to help the government strengthen its PPP policy environment, standardise project documentation, and manage fiscal risks associated with long-term concessions.

Representing the ALSF Cynthia Kankindi whose role at ALSF Legal Counsel within the Operations Division, emphasised the importance of building a sustainable and transparent framework that encourages both domestic and international investors to participate confidently in Eswatini's development agenda.

"Public-Private Partnerships are not just about private financing; they are about aligning interests, allocating risk appropriately, and ensuring accountability," said Kankindi.

The capacity-building programme is implemented in collaboration with DLA Piper and Delta Consulting Group, global advisors with expertise in PPP structuring, negotiation, and risk management.

Over the coming weeks, participants from government ministries, parastatals, and oversight institutions will undergo intensive modules covering PPP project identification, legal frameworks, financial modelling, procurement, and contract monitoring.

Eswatini has long recognised the potential of PPPs to close its infrastructure financing gap. However, limited technical capacity and inconsistent project preparation have previously constrained implementation.

The country adopted a formal PPP Policy and established a PPP Unit under the Ministry of Finance, but experts say the success of future projects will depend on strengthening institutional readiness.

According to economic analysts, the ALSF programme comes at a critical time. The country faces fiscal constraints, with public debt

nearing its upper limit and limited room for traditional borrowing.

Mobilising private capital through well-structured partnerships could enable Eswatini to deliver strategic projects in energy, transport, health and water sectors without over-stretching the national budget.

Regional economist Thabo Vilakati, speaking on the sidelines of the training, said capacity-building efforts like this one are essential to ensuring Eswatini's PPPs meet international due diligence standards.

"Many countries in the region have struggled with PPPs because they went to market before they had the right legal or financial structures in place," he said.

"This training ensures Eswatini avoids that pitfall. Investors want clarity they want to know the rules are clear, the contracts are fair, and the state understands its obligations," he said in addition.

Worth noting is that, across Africa, the ALSF has been instrumental in improving governments' negotiation positions and reducing exposure to poorly structured deals.

Countries such as Rwanda, Kenya and Ghana have previously benefited from similar advisory projects that helped them streamline PPP frameworks and attract billions in infrastructure investment.

For Eswatini, aligning with these standards could significantly boost investor confidence.

Analysts note that with a relatively small domestic market and limited fiscal space, the kingdom must rely on legal precision and institutional integrity to draw in credible partners. This makes the ALSF's involvement particularly strategic.

Participants at the Hilton training emphasised that transparency is not just a moral requirement but an economic one. PPP contracts often span decades and involve complex performance metrics.

Without strong oversight and contract management, such agreements can expose governments to fiscal risks and long-term liabilities.

Kankindi reminded attendees that robust procurement and monitoring frameworks are central to protecting the public interest.

"Transparency builds trust. Investors are more willing to engage when they know the process is fair, and citizens gain confidence when they see accountability mechanisms in action," she said.

Meanwhile, the Ministry of Finance's PPP Unit is expected to use insights from this training to develop a more consistent pipeline of bankable projects.

While several proposals have been discussed in sectors such as renewable energy, industrial development and transport, few have reached financial close due to technical and legal bottlenecks.

By building internal capacity, the government aims to move from concept to implementation more effectively. One senior official from the Ministry noted that Eswatini's goal is to ensure every PPP proposal undergoes rigorous feasibility assessment before reaching the procurement stage a key principle of the toolkit being taught.

Ultimately, the PPP Advisory Project reflects Eswatini's intent to move toward a model of shared growth, where the private sector plays a central role in national development. If executed well, experts believe it could usher in a new era of infrastructure expansion and job creation.

"This training is not a one-off event, it's part of an ongoing journey to institutionalise best practices in how we partner, procure, and deliver for our people," said Dlamini.

The ALSF-supported programme will continue through early November, culminating in a technical review session expected to outline a roadmap for Eswatini's next generation of PPP projects ones designed to be transparent, viable and transformative.

Development Insurance, and Arab Bank for Economic Development in Africa (BADEA) as key players.

sovereign and private-sector lending in coming years, the report said.

BADEA also lifted its exposure to \$3.8 billion and aims to disburse roughly \$18 billion between 2025 and 2029.

S&P cited hybrid capital issuance and exposure-exchange agreements - where

lenders swap parts of their loan portfolios to spread risk - as tools that bolster resilience amid higher global rates.

"What we're seeing is a very natural and, dare I say, welcome correction. The market needs to cool off and proceed at a more natural pace," he added.

Stocks pause after records

Several global share markets that have recently surged to all-time highs took a breather on Tuesday.

Europe's STOXX 600 was down 0.2 per cent after hitting a lifetime high on Monday. Major bourses in Frankfurt and Paris were close to unchanged on the day, while Britain's FTSE 100 edged up to a new peak.

Spain's IBEX also inched up to touch a new record, surpassing its previous peak at the onset of the financial crisis in 2007.

S&P 500 futures and Nasdaq futures were a touch higher heading towards the Wall Street open.

"Investors are moving with a little more caution on Tuesday as there are significant

There are lofty expectations for the "Magnificent Seven" tech heavyweights reporting this week, with Microsoft, Alphabet, Apple, Amazon and Meta Platforms all needing strong results to justify stretched valuations

Japan's Nikkei eased 0.6 per cent, having surged 2.5 per cent on Monday as a rally in all things tech lifted it to gains of almost 27 per cent so far this year.

Japan's new Prime Minister Sanae Takaichi met U.S. President Donald Trump in Tokyo to discuss defence ties, trade and a package of investments in the U.S. under a \$550 billion deal struck earlier this year.

MSCI's broadest index of Asia-Pacific shares outside Japan edged down 0.6 per cent, while Chinese blue chips tab slipped 0.2 per cent. The Shanghai Composite Index cracked the 4,000 level for the first time since mid-2015, although it closed below. (Reuters)

Oil falls nearly 2% as investors assess Russia sanctions, OPEC+ output plans

LONDON — Oil prices fell by nearly 2 per cent on Tuesday in a third day of declines as investors assess the effect of U.S. sanctions on Russia's two biggest oil companies along with a potential OPEC+ plan to raise output.

Brent crude futures were down \$1.09, or 1.7 per cent, to \$64.53 a barrel at 1253 GMT. U.S. West Texas Intermediate crude futures were down \$1.07, or 1.8 per cent, at \$60.24.

"Traders weighed up progress in U.S.-China trade talks and the broader outlook for supply," ANZ said in a morning note.

Brent and WTI last week registered their biggest weekly gain since June, reacting to U.S. President Donald Trump's decision to impose Ukraine-related sanctions on Russia for the first time in his second term, targeting oil companies Lukoil and Rosneft.

Investors continue to chew over how effective those sanctions on Russia might be.

"The oil market is still debating whether the latest sanctions will impact Russian oil exports or not, with market players reducing somewhat the supply risk premium built in last week," said UBS analyst Giovanni Staunovo.

The effect of sanctions on oil-exporting countries will be limited because of surplus capacity, International Energy Agency Executive Director Fatih Birol said on Tuesday.

Following the U.S. sanctions, Russia's second-largest oil producer, Lukoil, said on Monday it would sell its international assets.

This is the most consequential action so far by a Russian company in the wake of Western sanctions over Russia's war in Ukraine, which started in February 2022.

Meanwhile, Indian refiners have not placed new orders for Russian oil purchases since sanctions were imposed, as they await clarity from the government and suppliers, sources told Reuters on Tuesday.

OPEC+, which groups the Organization of the Petroleum Exporting Countries and allies including Russia, is leaning toward another modest output boost in December, four sources familiar with the talks told

Having curbed production for several years in a bid to support the oil market, the group started reversing those cuts in April.

Investors will watch the prospect of a trade deal between the U.S. and China, the world's two biggest oil consumers, with Trump and President Xi Jinping due to meet on Thursday in South Korea.

Beijing hopes Washington can meet it halfway to "prepare for high-level interactions" between the two countries, Foreign Minister Wang Yi told U.S. Secretary of State Marco Rubio in a phone call on Monday. (**Reuters**)

A Sudanese paramilitary force is battling the last pockets of resistance in a Darfur city that has endured a brutal 18-month siege and where a full takeover would entrench a geographical division of the country between rival military factions.

The advance by the Rapid Support Forces (RSF) has also raised fears of reprisals against the estimated 250,000 people remaining in al-Fashir, the final holdout of the Sudanese army in the western Darfur region, and of an escalation of fighting elsewhere in Sudan.

Since Sunday, when the RSF said it had captured the army's head-quarters in al-Fashir, RSF fighters have been detaining fleeing civilians in nearby towns and villages, witnesses as well as humanitarian and military sources said. Some 26,000 people had been displaced by the fighting, the International Organization for Migration said.

Army chief Abdel Fattah al-Burhan confirmed in a broadcast speech his forces had decided to retreat from the city "given the destruction and intentional kill-

ings of civilians."

Two Sudanese military sources said on Monday that thousands of soldiers from the army and allied former rebel groups were surrounded by RSF fighters after retreating into neighbourhoods in western al-Fashir.

RISK OF PARTITION

Darfur, the RSF's stronghold, is home to a parallel government it created, and RSF sources say it is also the current base for top RSF leaders including General Mohamed Hamdan Dagalo, widely known as Hemedti.

"The RSF's full control of the Darfur region could have dangerous and worrying consequences in the future in terms of partition," Massad Boulos, U.S. senior adviser for Arab and African affairs, told Al Jazeera Mubasher.

He compared that prospect to Libya, where competing governments linked to military factions

based in the east and west created a de facto geographical split.

The RSF, which has been locked in a civil war with the army for more than two-and-a-half years, could also use the momentum to try to regain ground elsewhere in Sudan, analysts said.

Unless the latest push for U.S.-brokered peace talks makes progress where past attempts have stalled, that could worsen a conflict which has already caused famine, triggered waves of ethnically driven violence and displaced millions of people.

The army was able to oust the RSF from the capital Khartoum earlier this year, but the paramilitaries have amassed advanced weaponry including long-range drones that could allow them to attempt a comeback, one military and one RSF source said.

POSSIBILITY OF FURTHER ADVANCES

U.N. chief Antonio Guterres said foreign provision of weapons and increasing external interference in the war were undermining the chances of a political solution. The army accuses the United Arab Emirates of providing military support to the RSF, which the UAE denies.

"We haven't seen a sign that RSF leadership is content with just western Sudan," said Alan Boswell, Horn of Africa director for Crisis Group. "So as long as they are receiving enough supplies to continue a war effort, they still look like they are continuing to escalate this war."

The RSF made gains over the weekend in the strategic city of Bara, North Kordofan, which puts it within hours of Khartoum.

"Our liberation of al-Fashir is the liberation of Sudan, all

the way to Port Sudan We are coming and we are coming heavy," said RSF second-in-command Abdelrahim Dagalo speaking in a video dated Sunday released by the force from the army's al-Fashir

"The new Sudan goes forward, the old Sudan gets destroyed," one soldier can be heard chanting, a key slogan for the RSF-led authority.

In a statement on Monday, the RSF said it would protect civilians in al-Fashir and that humanitarian preparations were being made.

CIVILIANS ROUNDED UP

Two military sources and two humanitarian sources said the RSF appeared to be directing fleeing civilians to towns around al-Fashir where it aimed to set up displacement camps.

Eyewitnesses who arrived in Tawila - a town to the east controlled by a neutral force that has absorbed hundreds of thousands of fleeing civilians - told Reuters they had been directed to the nearby town of Garney on foot, and that hundreds of people including women and children remained in RSF custody there.

Adults and children who had left al-Fashir via unsafe roads were "dehydrated, malnourished, some injured and all traumatized," said Denise Brown, the top U.N. official in Sudan.

Activists have long warned of revenge attacks on civilians from the Zaghawa tribe after the intense fight for the city, as happened in the Zamzam displacement camp to the south.

RSF officials released videos on Sunday saying they were providing safe passage for former fighters, though other videos posted by activists but not verified by Reuters appeared to show RSF fighters shooting unarmed men and cheering around dead bodies.

Microsoft, OpenAI reach new deal valuing OpenAI at \$500 billion

MICROSOFT and OpenAI reached a deal to allow the ChatGPT maker to restructure itself into a public benefit corporation, valuing OpenAI at \$500 billion and giving it more freedom in its business operations.

The deal removes a major constraint on raising capital for OpenAI that has existed since 2019, when it signed a deal with Microsoft that gave the tech giant rights

over much of OpenAI's work in exchange for costly cloud computing services needed to carry it out.

As its ChatGPT service exploded in popularity, those limitations became a notable source of tension between the two companies.

CEO Sam Altman will not get equity in the restructured company, an OpenAI spokesperson said, in a reversal from discussions

last year that he would receive equity. The company has no plans to focus on a potential public offering, the spokesperson said.

MICROSOFT TO KEEP 27% STAKE

Microsoft will still hold a stake of about \$135 billion, or 27%, in OpenAI Group PBC, which will be controlled by the OpenAI Foundation, a nonprofit, the companies said. The Redmond, Washington-based firm has invested \$13.8 billion in OpenAI, with Tuesday's deal implying that Microsoft had generated a return of nearly 10 times its investment.

Microsoft shares rose 2.5%, sending its market value above \$4 trillion again.

The deal keeps the two firms intertwined until at least 2032, with a massive cloud computing contract and with Microsoft retaining some rights to OpenAI products and AI models until then, even if OpenAI reaches artificial general intelligence (AGI), the point at which AI systems can match a well-educated human adult.

With more than 700 million weekly users as of September, ChatGPT has exploded in popularity to become the face of AI for many consumers after OpenAI's founding as a nonprofit AI safety group. As the company grew, the Microsoft deal constrained OpenAI's ability to raise funds from outside investors and secure computing contracts as the crush of ChatGPT users and its research into new models caused its computing needs to skyrocket.

"OpenAI has completed its recapitalization, simplifying its corporate structure," Bret Taylor, the OpenAI Foundation's board chair, said in a blog post. "The nonprofit remains in control of the for-profit, and now

has a direct path to major resources before AGI arrives."

Microsoft's previous 2019 agreement had many provisions that rested on when OpenAI reached that point, and the new deal requires an independent panel to verify OpenAI's claims it has reached AGI.

"OpenAI still faces ongoing scrutiny around transparency, data usage, and safety oversight. But overall, this structure should provide a clearer path forward for innovation and accountability," said Adam Sarhan, CEO of 50 Park Investments.

Gil Luria, head of technology research at investment firm DA Davidson, said the deal "resolves the longstanding issue of OpenAI being organized as a not-for-profit (organization) and settles the ownership rights of the technology vis-à-vis Microsoft. The new structure should provide more clarity on OpenAI's investment path, thus facilitating further fundraising."

Microsoft also said that it has secured a deal with OpenAI where the ChatGPT maker will purchase \$250 billion of Azure cloud computing services. In exchange, Microsoft will no longer have the right of first refusal to provide computing services to OpenAI.

Microsoft also said that it will not have any rights to hardware produced by OpenAI. In March, OpenAI bought longtime Apple design chief Jony Ive's startup io Products in a \$6.5 billion deal.

PayPal unveils partnership with OpenAI for payments on ChatGPT

PAYPAL, opens new tab said on Tuesday it entered into a deal with OpenAI that will allow ChatGPT users to buy products using the payment firm's platform, sending its shares up 10%.

The company also raised its profit forecast for the year again, banking on resilient consumer spending, and announced its first dividend in its 27-year history.

PayPal said the OpenAI partnership will connect its global merchant network to ChatGPT, enabling businesses to sell products and services within the wildly popular generative AI app that has more than 800 million weekly active users.

AI shopping tools are emerging as the next big shift in online retail, as they can autonomously research, compare and purchase products for consumers.


These tools act as digital assistants by understanding user preferences, setting budgets, evaluating reviews and tracking prices over time.

"Agentic commerce is seen by some as a potential 'silver bullet' to leverage PayPal's large and global user base and reignite growth on what could be (to be proven as it's still very early days) a next-gen commerce platform," analysts at Evercore ISI said.

Wall Street is in the middle of an AI gold rush, as banks, investors and tech firms race to harness AI to reshape how money is made, managed and moved.

PayPal said the integration of its platform with OpenAI will make millions of products discoverable and purchasable through ChatGPT.

"We want PayPal to be available anywhere

and everywhere that consumers want to pay and we want merchants to be able to sell to consumers anywhere and everywhere," CEO Alex Chriss said in a call with analysts.

RAISES FORECAST, SETS FIRST-EVER DIVIDEND

PayPal said it now expects full-year adjusted EPS between \$5.35 and \$5.39 versus \$5.15 to \$5.30 earlier. Analysts had projected \$5.24, according to estimates compiled by LSEG.

Its board approved a quarterly dividend of 14 cents per share, representing a targeted payout ratio of 10% of adjusted profit.

"We've moved this business from defense to offence and from stabilization to acceleration," Chriss said.

The company has overhauled its business

under Chriss in recent years by prioritizing profitability over aggressive revenue growth.

Once a pandemic-era favorite, PayP-al experienced a downturn as consumers returned to physical stores and spending patterns stabilized, prompting the company to focus on high-margin businesses and cost-cutting measures. Apple shares had struggled earlier this year on concerns over tough competition in China and uncertainties around how the company would navigate high U.S. tariffs on Asian economies such as China and India, its major manufacturing hubs.

The latest smartphones, including the iPhone 17 line-up and the iPhone Air, wooed

back customers from Beijing to Moscow within the first few weeks of launch, while the company has swallowed the high costs from the tariffs.

Analysts said the iPhone Air's slim design could help fend off rivals such as Samsung Electronics (005930.KS), opens new tab, while early sales of the iPhone 17 outperformed its predecessor by 14% in the U.S. and China, data from research firm Counterpoint showed.

Brokerage Evercore ISI expects the strong demand for Apple's latest iPhones to help it surpass market expectations for the threemonth period ending in September and issue upbeat forecasts for the quarter ending in December.

Apple is the third company to hit the \$4 trillion mark after Nvidia (NVDA.O), opens new tab and Microsoft (MSFT.O), opens new tab. Nvidia currently tops the table with a market value of more than \$4.5 trillion.

Microsoft reclaimed its membership of the exclusive club after shares rose 2.2% following a deal with OpenAI to allow the ChatGPT maker to restructure itself into a public benefit corporation.

Apple's cautious approach to AI had fueled concerns it could lose out on what could be the industry's biggest growth catalyst in decades. Recent reports also indicate that the company is losing a number of its senior artificial intelligence executives to Meta (META.O), opens new tab.

The company was slow to roll out its Apple Intelligence suite, including a ChatGPT integration, while an AI upgrade to its voice assistant Siri has been delayed until next year. (Reuters)

U.S. President Donald Trump lavished praise on Japan's first female leader Sanae Takaichi in Tokyo on Tuesday, welcoming the new prime minister's pledge to accelerate a military buildup, while also signing deals on trade and rare earths.

Takaichi, who took office a week ago, is a protegee of Trump's ally and golfing buddy Prime Minister Shinzo Abe who was assassinated in 2022. She repeatedly invoked that legacy with gifts and references to the warm ties between the two men, and applauded Trump's push to resolve global

Trump's spokeswoman Karoline Leavitt said the Japanese leader also promised to nominate Trump for the Nobel Peace Prize.

Both governments released a list of projects, opens new tab in the areas of energy, artificial intelligence and critical minerals in which Japanese companies are eyeing investments of up to \$400 billion in the U.S.

Tokyo pledged to provide \$550 billion of strategic U.S. investments, loans and guarantees earlier this year as part of a deal to win a reprieve from Trump's punishing im-

Those gestures may temper any Trump demands for Tokyo to spend more towards its security in the face of an increasingly assertive China, calls Takaichi sought to head off by promising to fast-track plans to increase defence spending to 2% of GDP.

"Everything I know from Shinzo and others, you will be one of the great prime ministers," Trump told Takaichi as they sat down to discussions accompanied by aides at Tokyo's Akasaka Palace. Becoming Japan's first female prime minister was "a big deal", Trump added.

TAKAICHI INVOKES ABE LEGACY

Takaichi repeatedly referred to Abe's affection for Trump and gave him the former prime minister's putter encased in glass, a golf bag signed by Japanese major winner Hideki Matsuyama and a gold-leaf golf ball.



who gifted him a painting with the words PEACE written in large gold lettering.

Abe was the first foreign leader to meet Trump after his 2016 election victory and the two went on to forge a close bond over several rounds of golf in the United States and Japan.

Over a lunch of U.S. rice and beef, and vegetables from Takaichi's hometown of Nara, she presented Trump with a map of major investments Japanese firms have made in the United States since his last visit in 2019.

Japanese companies on the list of possible future investors included Mitsubishi Heavy Industries (7011.T), opens new tab, SoftBank (9434.T), opens new tab, Hitachi (6501.T), opens new tab, Murata Manufacic (6752.T), opens new tab, among others.

Japanese carmaker Toyota would also open auto plants in the United States to the tune of \$10 billion, Trump said.

Toyota did not immediately respond to a request for comment.

Trump said Japan also plans to purchase Ford's (F.N), opens new tab burly F-150 pickup truck, now rarely seen on the country's narrow roads, a symbol of how far Tokyo is willing to go to win his favour.

Trump praised Japan's efforts to buy more U.S. defence equipment, while Takaichi said his role in securing ceasefires between Cambodia and Thailand, and Israel and Palestinian militants, was an "unprecedented" achievement.

Venezuela's Nobel winner backs Trump as Maduro pressure builds

ON January 6, 2025, four members of Venezuelan opposition leader Maria Corina Machado's team piled onto a couch in a Capitol Hill office, across from Mike Waltz, who was soon to become Donald Trump's national security adviser. Machado made a cameo via video call from her hideout in Venezuela.

During the meeting, David Smolansky, who runs Machado's office in Washington, explained how Venezuelan gang Tren de Aragua was controlled by Venezuelan President Nicolas Maduro, according to two people present who described the meeting. Waltz scribbled notes the whole time, they

The meeting, details of which have not been previously reported, was part of a highstakes gamble by Nobel Peace Prize-winner Machado to align with hawks in the Trump team who argue that Maduro - through links to criminal gangs - represents a direct threat to U.S. national security, despite U.S. intelligence reports casting doubt on that view.

Reuters conversations with more than 50 sources, including former and current U.S. officials, members of the Venezuelan opposition and informants to U.S. security agencies, provide new details about efforts by members of Machado's team to help the Trump administration build the case for an aggressive stance against the Venezuelan government, despite worries about blowback from Trump's policies on Venezuelan immigrants living in the United States.

Opposition leaders held multiple meetings with the Trump team before and after his inauguration, seeking increased pressure

The reporting suggests the opposition lent legitimacy to the idea that Maduro controls Tren de Aragua, advocating for the theory publicly and in private, seeing its interests align with the Trump administration. Reuters could not establish whether the campaign influenced Trump's policies.

In the months after the Waltz meeting, Washington designated Tren de Aragua as a terrorist organization threatening the United States and under Maduro's control. It has offered a \$50 million reward for his arrest.

Since September, the U.S. military has bombed at least eight drug boats off the of U.S.-bound cocaine passes through the South American country, according to the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration.

Trump said the 11 people killed in the first strike were members of Tren de Aragua, without offering evidence. Earlier this month, Trump said he authorized covert CIA operations in Venezuela and has said strikes on its territory might be in the cards.

Machado is unwavering in her support for Trump's militarized strategy, saying Maduro should step down to prevent escalation.

Machado declined to comment for this story. Waltz, now the U.S. ambassador to the United Nations, did not respond to questions about the January 6 meeting.

Venezuela's Information Ministry did not respond to detailed requests for comment from Maduro about the allegations made in this story.

In office since 2013, Maduro has overseen economic collapse, and is accused of extrajudicial executions, corruption and political repression, opens new tab. Backed by the military, he refused to relinquish power despite international recognition that the Machado-led opposition won 70% of the vote in a presidential election last year.

Sanctions, negotiations and criminal indictments have failed to unseat him.

"You cannot have freedom without strength when you are facing a criminal structure," Machado said, when asked on NPR after her October 10 Nobel win whether the U.S. military should intervene to restore democracy to Venezuela, which has the world's largest proven oil reserves.

Machado dedicated her prize to the Venezuelan people and to Trump, "for his decisive support of our cause."

Maduro told Trump in a September letter it was "absolutely false" his government was connected to drug gangs. Maduro says accusations of rights crimes are untrue and insists Venezuela is a democracy.

Reuters was unable to reach any representatives of Tren de Aragua.

Several governments in Latin America say Tren de Aragua, originally a prison gang and now present across South America, is a major threat in their countries. However, a U.S. appeals court rejected the idea it was mounting "an invasion" into the United States in a case brought by the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) against the administration's deportation policy. How a Naples museum protects its treasures

WITH the art world on high alert for any sign of the missing Louvre jewels, one Italian collection says its method of creating a photographic fingerprint of its own priceless gems and artefacts could make them harder to break apart and sell on.

A team of gemology experts has spent more than a decade studying the most valuable pieces of the collection at Naples' Tesoro di San Gennaro. Using microscopes and specialised equipment, the team has photographed more than 10,000 stones.

As well as the armed security and alarmed displays that provide physical protection for the site, the process has allowed them to certify the unique characteristics of the gems to provide a kind of forensic fingerprint that experts liken to DNA.

Major European museums have declined to comment on their security protocols in the wake of the Louvre theft, but the Naples method offers a rare insight into some of the measures used by institutions.

"If the Louvre had adopted this security system, thieves would not be able to resell the stones from the stolen jewellery," Ciro Paolillo, a former professor of investigative gemology at La Sapienza University in Rome, who led the mapping work, told Reuters.

"The stones would be identified, even if cut, at the first official quality certification by an international body."

Reuters was unable to verify whether the French museum had undertaken a comparable analysis of the stolen stones. The museum did not respond to requests for comment. Louvre director Laurence des Cars has said she had repeatedly warned that the centuries-old building's security was in a dire state. She said exterior security cameras did not offer full coverage of the facade, adding that the window through which the thieves broke in was not monitored by CCTV.

The Paris prosecutor said on Sunday suspects had been arrested over the robbery, but declined to give further details, saying newspaper reports about the arrests would hinder the search for the stolen jewellery and the perpetrators.

The San Gennaro treasures, a trove of sacred art and jewels, have been assembled over seven centuries from donations from popes, royals and the wealthy. It includes a cross adorned with emeralds and diamonds given by Joseph Bonaparte, the eldest brother of Napoleon, who was king of Naples in the 1800s.

Nestled beside Naples' cathedral, the museum houses over 21,000 pieces, among them a mitre encrusted with nearly 4,000 precious stones and a necklace with over 1,500 gems. (Reuters)



Kiwi, supplements may improve constipation

THE British Dietetic Association has released dietary guidelines for chronic constipation.

These guidelines discuss specific foods, supplements, and drinks that may provide relief. Dietitians say other lifestyle choices, such as exercise and stress management, may also help. If constipation persists or is accompanied by other symptoms, it's important to see a doctor.

Chronic constipation affects more than 1 in 10 people worldwide. This condition can disrupt daily life with symptoms like infrequent bowel movements, hard stools, and abdominal discomfort. While many people turn to dietary changes for relief, past medical guidelines have mostly focused on general advice to eat more fiber or drink enough water, offering little detail on what actually works. Now, for the first time, the British Dietetic Association (BDA) has developed comprehensive, evidencebased dietary guidelines for adults with chronic constipation, drawing on results from 75 clinical trials. The guidelines were published on October 13 in the Journal of Human Nutrition and Dietetics.

recommendations specific foods, supplements, and drinks that can improve symptoms — and reveal which popular remedies may not help at

Dietary approaches to chronic constipation

To create the new guidelines, the BDA convened a Guideline Steering Committee of seven experts in nutrition, dietetics, gastroenterology, and gut physiology.

Their goal was to review the totality of scientific evidence on diet-based approaches for chronic idiopathic constipation in otherwise healthy adults.

Secondary constipation — that's caused by another condition or medications was not the focus, though the researchers say the findings may be cautiously applied in those cases.

The team conducted four systematic reviews and meta-analyses, each targeting a different category of dietary intervention:

- ▶ fiber supplements
- ▶ probiotic and synbiotic supplements
- food, vitamin, and mineral supplements
 - \blacktriangleright foods, drinks, and whole diets

Only randomized controlled trials (RCTs) were included for supplements, to ensure high-quality evidence.

Other types of intervention trials were also reviewed for foods and drinks, but guideline statements were only made when at least two RCTs supported the finding.

The researchers searched electronic databases between February 2022 and July 2023. Two reviewers independently screened studies, extracted data, and assessed risk of bias, resolving any differences with additional team members.

Additionally, wherever possible, they pooled results in meta-analyses.

Effect sizes were reported as either risk ratios for binary outcomes (such as the number of people who improved) or mean differences for continuous measures (such as bowel movements per week).

The committee used the GRADE (Grading Recommendations, Assessment,



Development and Evaluation) approach to rate the quality of evidence — from high to very low — and to determine whether each recommendation should be "strong" or "qualified." A strong recommendation meant the intervention was likely to benefit most people with chronic constipation; a qualified recommendation meant benefits might depend more on individual circumstances.

Statements were finalized through a modified Delphi consensus process, requiring at least 85% agreement among committee

New guidelines for constipation relief

The guidelines include 59 dietary recommendation statements — 27 strong and 32 qualified — across supplements, foods, and drinks. Evidence quality was often limited: 66% of statements were based on low-quality evidence, 20% on very low, and only 14% on moderate-quality studies.

Fiber supplements

Psyllium stood out as the most consistently effective fiber supplement, increasing the number of people who experienced relief, boosting stool frequency, and softening stool consistency. Some other fibers, like polydextrose or inulin mixtures, did not improve treatment response. Fiber supplements could increase flatulence, but generally didn't worsen bloating or abdominal

Probiotics

Overall, probiotics slightly increased the chance of symptom improvement and raised stool frequency, although effects varied widely by strain. Bifidobacterium lactis increased stool frequency but not consistency, while multi-strain probiotics slightly softened

Few strains showed consistent benefits for global symptoms, and no single strain could be recommended across all outcomes.

Side effects were generally mild and similar to placebo.

Synbiotics

Supplements combining probiotics and prebiotics did not improve stool frequency, stool consistency, or global symptoms, based on the small number of available trials.

Mineral and herbal supplements

Magnesium oxide improved both overall constipation symptoms and quality of life, with moderate-quality evidence.

Senna, despite its popularity, showed no consistent benefit for treatment response or stool frequency when results from two trials were combined.

Specific foods

Kiwifruit improved certain symptoms, such as reducing abdominal pain and the sensation of incomplete evacuation, and may be preferred over psyllium for people prone to bloating or gas. Rye bread increased bowel movements but also slightly worsened overall gastrointestinal symptom scores compared to white bread, though the effect was small and might not matter to all patients.

Drinks

High mineral-content water — particularly those rich in magnesium and sulfate — was more effective than low-mineral water at helping people achieve softer stools or more frequent bowel movements. However, it did not improve overall symptoms, abdominal pain, or quality of life compared to lowmineral water. The mineral content in the studies was far higher than typical U.S. tap water. **Healthline**

Dimitrov wins on comeback as Paris Masters enters new era

GRIGOR Dimitrov returned to action by beating Giovanni Mpetshi Perricard 7-6 (7/5), 6-1 in the first round of the Paris Masters on Monday as the event made its debut in its new La Defense Arena home.

After being held for nearly 40 years at Paris' Bercy Arena, the tournament has moved across the city to set up shop in the cavernous multi-purpose arena.

Opened in 2017, the venue is best known as the home ground of French Top 14 rugby club Racing 92 and for having played host to the swimming events at the Olympics last year. It also welcomes concerts and political rallies.

Now in its current guise as a tennis venue, La Defense Arena boasts the second largest showpiece court on the current global tennis circuit - second only in size terms to the US Open's Arthur Ashe Stadium.

It was the scene of a triumphant comeback for former world number three Dimitrov as he played his first match since having to retire injured from his fourth-round match at Wimbledon when leading two sets to love against eventual champion Jannik Sinner.

"Winning or losing this match today would have been a win for me, I'm just so happy to be able to compete again," 34-year-old Dimitrov said on court.

"I had to be extremely patient with my- Frenchman Mpetshi Perricard.

self... clearly I'm playing against such an amazing player but I'm just grateful (to win)."

Dimitrov overcame fervent home support in the night session to grind out the first set on a tie-break against the big-serving Frenchman Mpetshi Perricard. Bolstered by his lead, the Bulgarian swiftly secured the first break of the match in the opening game of the second set and never looked back as he glided through to the round of 32.

There he will meet either former Russian world number one Daniil Medvedev or

Spain's Jaume Munar, who play on Tuesday.

Russian 12th seed Andrey Rublev earlier raced to a 6-1, 6-4 win over Britain's Jacob Fearnley.

Rublev cruised through the opening set before pouncing on Fearnley's serve at 4-5 to book his spot in the second round.

"Jacob didn't feel the serve in the first set, which helped me a bit," Rublev said. "He played well in the second and I'm happy to have won."

Earlier, the event opened with a pair of hard-fought wins for French wildcards.

Arthur Cazaux christened the new 17,500-capacity centre court with a 7-6 (7/5), 7-6 (7/4) triumph over Italy's Luciano Darderi.

Shanghai Masters runner-up Arthur Rinderknech then further delighted the local fans with a win by the exact same score against Hungary's Fabian Marozsan.

Rising Italian hope Flavio Cobolli kickstarted play on court one with a 6-1, 6-4 victory over Czech Tomas Machac and Kazakh 13th seed Alexander Bublik defeated Australia's Alexei Popyrin 6-4, 6-3.

Tenth seed Karen Khachanov will complete the day's play against American qualifier Ethan Quinn.

The blunder threw Bafana Bafana's qualification campaign into turmoil, but Hugo Broos' charges showed great resilience to regroup and secure a spot at next year's World Cup, which will be staged across the United States, Mexico, and Canada.

"SAFA must come [before Parliament] because I have listened and members today were deliberating, saying SAFA must come because they cannot just get off the hook," McGluwa told Thabiso Mosia on Ra-

dio 2000

"Before December, even if it's via Zoom, they must come and give us answers because I think they almost left us in big trouble as far as what transpired. We can't claim a victory now and all of a sudden forget what happened.

"What if we had lost that game [against Rwanda]? Then what would have happened to us, preventing South Africa from going to the World Cup? So they will definitely come and, by December at the latest, they must appear before Parliament."

Aston Martin committed a "very minor" procedural breach of Formula One's cost cap regulations.

Aston Martin escape sanctions after 'very minor' F1 cost cap breach

Aston Martin committed a "very minor" procedural breach of Formula One's cost cap regulations last year due to exceptional circumstances but will face no penalties, the sport's governing body said on Tuesday.

The International Automobile Federation (FIA) said the other nine teams and five engine manufacturers were all in compliance, despite speculation last week that a more substantial breach might be announced.

The FIA said the breach, involving a failure to submit signed versions of its audited annual financial statements by a March deadline, was due to unpredictable circumstances

outside the team's control.

Significantly, Aston Martin had not exceeded the cost cap level.

The Silverstone-based team had acted cooperatively and in good faith, added the FIA, entering an Accepted Breach Agreement last month to resolve the matter.

"The Cost Cap Administration confirm that there is no accusation or evidence that AMR has sought or obtained any undue advantage as a result of the breach," the FIA said.

Speculation about a team being in breach of the cost cap had mounted after the FIA was late publishing the accounts for the 2024 season.

Sinner says 'impossible' to finish year as world No 1

JANNIK Sinner said Tuesday that he had come to terms with finishing the season behind rival Carlos Alcaraz in the rankings.

The Italian world No 2 lost top spot in the standings when he was fell to the Spaniard in the final of the US Open in September – after having held it for 65 weeks.

"It's impossible (to finish the year at No 1). Honestly, I'm not thinking about this at the moment. It's going to be a goal for next year," Sinner told reporters ahead of his opening match at the Paris Masters.

Trailing the Spaniard by less than 1 000 points, Sinner could theoretically overtake Alcaraz if he wins the Paris Masters and his rival fails to reach the last four.

But he will then have to defend 1 500 points at the season-ending ATP Finals in Turin – which he won in 2024 – whereas his rival was eliminated in the group stage and has few points to lose.

"This year it's not in my hands," Sinner simply added. "It's impossible (to finish the year at No. 1). Honestly, I'm not thinking about this at the moment. It's going to be a goal for next year," Sinner told reporters ahead of his opening match at the Paris Masters.

Vilakati was referring to the renowned Y'ello Sunday activations, likely to feature the big fixture between Wanderers and Highlanders.


