MINISTER PRINCESS LINDIWE TELLS PARLIAMENT:

24-hour Lavumisa Border in motion

MINISTER for Home Affairs Her Royal Highness Princess Lindiwe has reported to Parliament on her ongoing high-level discussions with South African authorities about transitioning the Lavumisa Border Post to a 24-hour operation.

She indicated that talks are at an advanced stage, aimed at facilitating easier movement of people and goods between Eswatini and South Africa.

Princess Lindiwe made the remarks when responding to a question posed by Gege Member of Parliament Magesi Dlamini, who asked why the border gate was still not operating around the clock. The minister explained that Eswatini had already expressed its readiness and was now finalising cross-border operational agreements with South Africa's Ministry of Home Affairs. She indicated that discussions are progressing well, with the aim of easing the movement of people and goods between the two countries. She emphasised that Lavumisa is a strategic entry point whose upgrade to a 24-hour operation will significantly enhance regional trade and travel. "We recognise the importance of ensuring our border operates efficiently to promote

economic activity and provide convenience for our citizens," Princess Lindiwe said. She highlighted the potential benefits of the shift, including shorter waiting times for travellers, improved logistics for transport operators and strengthened economic ties with South Africa.

The minister assured MPs that her ministry is committed to resolving any logistical and procedural issues related to the transition. She confirmed that ongoing negotiations include enhanced security arrangements and customs procedures to ensure the border can operate safely throughout the night. She added that she has also engaged South African Revenue Authority officials to ensure that all stakeholders are fully aligned. When finally achieved, this move will follow the successful extension of operating hours at the Ngwenya Border Post, which now runs 24 hours for light vehicles and pedestrians. This was one of the significant milestones achieved by her ministry in 2021, when she worked with her South African counterpart to ensure that both the Ngwenya and Oshoek border posts moved to full-time operations. The Minister for Home Affairs further committed to keeping Parliament informed as talks progress, emphasising that the Ministry of Home Affairs remains focused on modernising border management. "We are confident that this initiative will significantly impact the lives of our citizens," she said.

THE Kingdom of Eswatini took centre stage at the United Economic Summit 2025, hosted by the United Diplomatic Council (UDC) in Klang, Malaysia which is an event that drew diplomats, business leaders, and global policy influencers from across continents.

Among the distinguished participants was His Excellency Ambassador Menzie Sipho Dlamini, High Commissioner of the Kingdom of Eswatini to Malaysia, whose involvement reinforced the country's growing diplomatic and economic presence within the ASEAN and South Asian regions.

Eswatini's longstanding partnerships with India and Malaysia formed a strong foundation for the discussions held at the summit. India and Eswatini share decades of warm, development-focused cooperation across sectors such as pharmaceuticals, ICT, agriculture, textiles, and education. India's continued support through training and technical assistance has played a vital role in strengthening Eswatini's development trajectory and economic resilience. Malaysia, meanwhile, has cultivated steadily expanding ties with Eswatini, particularly in agro-processing, tourism, trade facilitation, and major investment-led initiatives within

Southern Africa.

These relationships provided a fitting backdrop to a summit that placed strategic economic collaboration at its core. As global investors increasingly look toward Southern Africa for growth opportunities, Eswatini has positioned itself as a stable and attractive destination. With membership in SACU and SADC, as well as preferential access to major global markets, including the United States under AGOA and the European Union; Eswatini offers meaningful advantages for companies seeking to establish or expand their presence in the region. Complementing these access points are the country's ongoing economic reforms, predictable policy environment, and competitive workforce.

During the summit, delegates explored a range of sectors presenting strong prospects for international partnerships. These included agro-processing, sugar and ethanol production, textiles and garments, pharmaceuticals, mining, forestry,

timber, renewable energy, infrastructure development, tourism, and ICT. Eswatini's well-developed agro-industrial base, particularly in sugar and citrus, offers significant potential for joint ventures with Asian partners. Meanwhile, the country's ambitions in renewable energy development align closely with Malaysia's and India's advancements in engineering, technology transfer, and low-carbon solutions. The textile and apparel sector, one of Eswatini's largest employers, also stands out due to favourable export regimes and expanding global demand.

Much of the dialogue centred on opportunities for trilateral cooperation between Asia and Southern Africa. The convergence of India's manufacturing capabilities, Malaysia's industrial expertise, and Eswatini's resource-rich landscape opened pathways for collaboration in agribusiness, healthcare manufacturing, capacity-building programmes, renewable energy projects, and broader industrial

development. Delegates emphasised the potential for these partnerships to deliver sustainable, long-term economic outcomes for all participating regions.

Moreover, when reflecting on the significance of the summit, UDC President Dr. Asif Iqbal stated, "Africa is not just the future but it is the present. Eswatini stands at a unique intersection of opportunity and readiness. Our shared efforts must unlock growth that benefits all parties and builds lasting prosperity across continents."

In line with these aspirations, the UDC announced plans to dispatch a high-level business delegation to Eswatini. The visit aims to identify sector-specific investment opportunities, strengthen trade ties, and support the country's development priorities, while paving the way for deeper engagement with India, Malaysia, and the wider ASEAN economic network.

Minister Pholile reports progress on new defence force forward bases

MINISTER of Foreign Affairs who also serves as Defence Minister Pholile Shakantu has updated Parliament on the ongoing construction of forward bases for the Eswatini Defence Force (EDF), describing the project as a crucial step in strengthening military operations and improving conditions for soldiers.

She delivered the update in response to a question from Lomahasha Member of Parliament Zanele Mashaba, who sought clarity on the state of military infrastructure.

Minister Shakantu confirmed that seven forward bases are currently under construction across the country, with four of them already completed in the Shiselweni region. She said the government's intention is to ensure that soldiers deployed in remote and high-pressure areas have access to proper facilities and support systems. "We are committed to providing improved working conditions for our army," she told Parliament.

According to the minister, the new bases

will play a pivotal role in enhancing logistics for the EDF. They are designed to securely store and distribute essential supplies such as food, fuel, ammunition and operational equipment. This development directly responds to concerns raised by MP Mashaba, who highlighted risks faced by soldiers when depending on assistance from nearby homesteads during deployments.

The Minster said the forward bases will also provide safe spaces for troops to rest, regroup and plan operations without compromising their security. "The well-being of our soldiers is a top priority," she emphasised, adding that the new facilities will support both daily operations and long-term strategic capacity.

She informed Members of Parliament that government is committed to strengthening military infrastructure beyond the current projects. Barracks with deteriorating structures are already receiving semi-permanent

upgrades to improve living standards for personnel. Shakantu further encouraged Parliament to consider an increased budget allocation for the next financial year, which would allow for additional permanent structures to be constructed.

Eswatini presses forward in strengthening HIV response

ESWATINI has emphasized its national commitment to ending AIDS as a public health threat during the World AIDS Day commemoration at Hhukwini, where Prime Minister Russell Mmiso Dlamini encouraged the nation to build on progress and intensify prevention efforts.

Speaking at the ceremony, the Prime Minister acknowledged the strides the country has made in expanding treatment access, increasing awareness and exceeding the UN-AIDS 95-95-95 targets. He noted, however, that the latest figures of 4,000 new HIV infections and 2,800 AIDS-related deaths recorded annually serve as a reminder that continued vigilance and proactive action are still necessary.

"These numbers remind us that our work is not finished," he said, urging the nation to continue strengthening prevention, treatment and community support systems. "We have made significant progress as a country, and with renewed focus, we can reduce these figures even further."

This year's commemoration brought together government leaders, health experts, youth representatives and civil society organisations to promote collective responsibility in addressing HIV, particularly among adolescents and young adults.

Prime Minister Dlamini stressed the importance of empowering young people with accurate information, life skills and supportive environments. "Our young people must be guided and encouraged to make informed and responsible choices," he said, highlighting the role of education and mentorship in reducing vulnerability among adolescents.

Health experts at the event echoed the

Prime Minister's call for strengthened prevention strategies. Dr. Nomsa Dlamini, Director of NERCHA, noted that while antiretroviral therapy continues to save lives and improve health outcomes, prevention efforts must keep pace. "We must invest equally in prevention and treatment. Education, awareness and behavioural change remain essential pillars of the national response," she said.

The event also showcased community-driven approaches that are making a difference on the ground. Youth-friendly health services, peer support networks, and

school-based awareness campaigns were highlighted as effective tools for reducing new infections and expanding access to testing and counselling.

The Prime Minister emphasized that all sectors of society-including families, communities, educators and faith-based organisations-have a role in guiding and supporting young people. "Prevention begins at home and is strengthened in our schools and communities," he said.

He also made strong emphasis on government's commitment to scaling up voluntary testing services, strengthening sexual and reproductive health programmes, expanding youth engagement platforms, and deepening partnerships with development agencies.

Over 20 people receive new PrEP drug

ESWATINI stepped confidently into a new era of HIV prevention as the long-awaited long-acting injectable PrEP, known as lenacapavir, was officially introduced during the World AIDS Day 2025 commemoration at Hhukwini Inkhundla.

The milestone launch, led by Prime Minister Russell Mmiso Dlamini and Minister of Health Mduduzi Matsebula, highlighted a major advancement in the country's HIV response.

Lenacapavir, administered only twice a year, offers a discreet and convenient alternative to daily oral PrEP. Its long-acting nature is expected to ease many of the challenges individuals have faced with adherence, privacy, stigma and busy schedules. Health officials confirmed that more than 20 people received the injection on Monday, signalling strong early interest and acceptance among the public.

Prime Minister described the rollout as a significant stride toward His Majesty King Mswati III's vision of a healthier nation supported by modern health innovations. He noted that expanding prevention options is crucial in meeting the needs of diverse groups, especially young people, adolescent girls and young women, and key populations who remain disproportionately vulnerable to HIV. He emphasised that the new tool strengthens the country's push toward achieving an AIDS-free Eswatini by 2030.

The scientific breakthrough behind lenacapavir has been widely celebrated globally. The injection, by blocking the virus from multiplying and establishing infection, offers highly effective protection with minimal clinic visits. Minister Matsebula highlighted that lenacapavir addresses one of the biggest challenges associated with oral PrEP adherence by requiring only two doses per year.

Healthcare workers at the commemoration expressed optimism that the new in-

THE Chairperson of the National **Emergency Response Council on HIV** and AIDS (NERCHA) Ntsika Fakudze has emphasised the need for pragmatic action guided by evidence and community realities. Fakudze said this during the World AIDS Day held at Hhukwini which was attended by the Prime Minister Russell Dlamini and Minister for Health Mduduzi Matsebula.

In his remarks, Fakudze said, "The data presented here today reminds us that our fight is far from over. When only half of our young people have sufficient knowledge about HIV prevention, we must strengthen education. When poverty and unemployment push our youth into risky situations, we must build supportive systems. We cannot ignore the root causes driving new infec-

He referred to the worrying statistics reflected in national reports. Only 51 percent of young women and 47 percent of young men aged 15 to 24 have comprehensive knowledge of HIV prevention. Young people continue to experience early sexual debut, with five percent of females and twelve percent of males initiating sex between the ages of 18 and 24. Intergenerational relationships remain widespread, affecting about

jectable will reduce both client and facility burden. With fewer clinic visits required, health workers can dedicate more time to counselling, follow-up and reaching underserved communities. This shift is expected to improve the overall quality of prevention services and deepen trust between communities and the health system.

Young people who attended the event welcomed the new option, saying it offers privacy and relief from the pressure of daily medication. Many noted that stigma and fear of judgment often discourage them from accessing prevention services. A twice-yearly injection, they said, gives them more control and confidence in protecting themselves.

The introduction of lenacapavir also reinforces Eswatini's position as a global leader in HIV control. The country has surpassed the UNAIDS 95-95-95 targets and continues to invest in innovations that strengthen its health response. The government and its partners view the rollout as part of a broader strategy to widen HIV prevention choices, rather than replace existing methods. Condoms, oral PrEP, behavioural interventions, community education and gender empowerment programmes will continue to play essential roles.

The Ministry of Health announced a phased rollout to ensure facilities are adequately prepared, healthcare workers trained and communities well informed. Awareness campaigns will accompany the implementation to educate the public on eligibility, availability and safe use. Community leaders and youth groups endorsed the approach, urging continuous engagement to reach even the most remote areas.

A candle-lighting ceremony closed the commemoration, honouring lives lost to AIDS-related illnesses and reaffirming commitment to supporting those living with

32 percent of females in Eswatini. Fakudze stressed that these behavioural and social patterns must be confronted with honesty, community dialogue and stronger intervention programmes.

He also echoed the Prime Minister's firm message directed at families, schools and community leaders. Prime Minister Russell Mmiso Dlamini had earlier reminded the nation that "A school child is not expected to attend or expected to indulge in sexual intercourse." He expressed deep concern over the country's persistent 4,000 new HIV infections annually and the estimated 2,800 AIDS related deaths recorded each year. The Prime Minister urged communities to protect the youth and strengthen moral, educational and social guidance to shield them from high risk behaviour.

Fakudze called on traditional leaders, teachers, parents and youth groups to collaborate with NERCHA as the new board begins its national mandate. "Every community structure represented here today has a role to play. We must rebuild an environment where young people are informed, protected and empowered. Ending AIDS in

He further highlighted the need to address gaps in prevention and treatment uptake.

The image presented during the ceremony noted that only 21 percent of young people are aware of oral PrEP and that viral suppression among adolescent girls and young women stands at approximately 76 percent. Fakudze welcomed the introduction of lenacapavir, the new long acting injectable PrEP launched during the event. He described it as a vital addition to the HIV prevention toolbox that will benefit young people who struggle with daily medication.

"The arrival of long acting PrEP gives us a real opportunity to reach groups we have struggled to protect. When a person only needs two injections a year, the barriers of daily pills and stigma begin to fall away. This is innovation that speaks directly to our national needs," he said.

Minister for Health Mduduzi Matsebula praised the new NERCHA board and expressed confidence that Fakudze's leadership will strengthen coordination across sectors. He emphasised that the fight against HIV requires continued investment in health workers, improved service delivery, reliable data and strong partnerships with development organisations.

PRIME Minister Russell Dlamini addressed the House of Assembly on Monday, unveiling plans to enhance the welfare of police officers.

This initiative comes in response to growing concerns raised by legislators regarding the inadequate support systems in place for police officers, particularly those in junior ranks, who operate under challenging and often dangerous conditions.

During his address, Prime Minister acknowledged the critical role that police officers play in maintaining law and order, emphasizing that their welfare is paramount to the effectiveness of the police force. He stated, "The men and women in blue are our first line of defense against crime and violence in our society.

It is our duty to ensure that they are adequately supported in their roles, so they can carry out their responsibilities without fear for their own well-being."

The Prime Minister's remarks come as lawmakers highlighted alarming issues related to the welfare of police personnel. Many officers, especially those at junior levels, are reportedly without essential benefits such as medical aid and insurance. This lack of support has raised serious concerns about their ability to perform their duties effectively, given the inherent risks involved in police

Officers are often exposed to dangerous situations that can lead to physical harm and mental health challenges, making adequate support an urgent necessity.

Moreover, the Prime Minister pointed out that insufficient medical aid could deter individuals from seeking necessary medical attention following incidents on duty. This

could lead to long-term health issues that not only affect the officers personally but also compromise their operational readiness. "We cannot afford to have our officers hesitant to seek medical assistance due to unfavourable circumstances. We must build a system that encourages them to prioritize their health and well-being," Dlamini stressed

In addition to addressing healthcare concerns, the Prime Minister also touched upon the need for improved training and professional development opportunities for police officers. He articulated that a well-trained force is crucial to effectively tackle the complexities of modern-day policing, including cybercrime and community relations. "Continuous professional development should be a priority for our police force.

We must equip our officers with the necessary skills and knowledge to adapt to the evolving landscape of crime," Dlamini remarked.

The Prime Minister's commitment to police welfare has also been well received by various stakeholders, including police unions and community organizations. Many of these groups have long advocated for better working conditions and support for law enforcement personnel.

Their leaders have expressed cautious optimism regarding the government's dedication to addressing these issues. "We appreciate the recognition that the welfare of our officers needs urgent attention. We hope that this commitment translates into tangible benefits for those who serve and protect

our communities," said a police officer when engaged by this publication.

Further, as part of the new initiative, the government plans to conduct a thorough review of existing welfare programs and identify areas for improvement. Dlamini indicated that engaging with police personnel to better understand their needs will be an essential part of this process. "Listening to our officers is crucial. They are the ones on the ground, and their feedback will guide our efforts to create a supportive work environment that fosters their well-being," he

Budgetary allocations for police welfare will also be a focal point of the government's plan. The Premier assured Parliament that ensuring sufficient funding for welfare initiatives will be prioritized in the upcoming fiscal budget.

"We recognize that investing in our police force is investing in our safety and security as a nation. We are committed to making sure our officers have the resources they need to carry out their duties effectively," he explained.

Churches reinforce support during 16 Days of Activism

THE 16 Days of Activism against Gender-Based Violence (GBV), an annual international campaign, serves as a crucial period for heightened awareness and action.

This year, local churches in Eswatini are being called upon to actively strengthen their internal support systems to combat the pervasive issue of GBV. This focus on faithbased organisations underscores their vital role in community safety and healing.

The imperative for religious institutions to lead this charge was highlighted recently by Nonhlanhla Motsa of the Pastors' Wives Foundation during an appearance on Eswatini TV's Kusile Breakfast Show, signalling a unified commitment within the spiritual community to address and ultimately eradicate gender-based violence.

Motsa highlighted the importance of awareness and reporting mechanisms in all community spaces, including churches.

According to Motsa, while faith-based organisations are often seen as safe spaces, instances of abuse particularly sexual and emotional abuse can occur unnoticed. Many of these cases go unreported due to social stigma or the belief that abuse does not happen within religious settings.

"The church is a cornerstone of community life, and its leadership plays a key role in protecting vulnerable members. Awareness, education, and clear reporting channels are essential to ensuring that support is available when needed," she said.

The Pastors' Wives Foundation, an organi-

sation dedicated to supporting pastors' families and promoting safe environments in faith communities, has been active in training leaders and congregants on recognising and addressing abuse.

Motsa emphasised that the aim is not to single out any particular group but to strengthen systems of care within all churches.

Meanwhile, the 16 Days of Activism against Gender-Based Violence is observed annually from November 25 to December 10. The campaign, initiated by the United Nations, seeks to raise awareness about gender-based violence, mobilise communities, and encourage prevention measures. Activities during this period include workshops, media campaigns, public discussions, and community outreach programs.

In Eswatini, the campaign has grown to

involve government agencies, civil society organisations, and faith-based groups. Through joint initiatives, participants aim to highlight practical measures that families, institutions, and communities can take to reduce vulnerability and ensure prompt assistance for victims of abuse.

Officials from the Ministry of Justice and Constitutional Affairs have also noted the value of partnerships between religious organisations and local authorities.

"Faith leaders are influential in shaping community behaviour. Their engagement in campaigns like the 16 Days of Activism helps create safe spaces where individuals feel empowered to speak up," read the Ministry's commitment statement.

During her appearance, Motsa encouraged members of congregations to familiarise themselves with their church's support

structures, including pastoral care teams and external referral networks.

She also highlighted the role of education in preventing abuse, noting that understanding the signs and impact of emotional and sexual abuse can help families and communities respond effectively.

EU spotlights civil society's role in Eswatini development

THE European Union (EU) in Eswatini convened a high-level consultative meeting recently, bringing together civil society organisations (CSOs) to discuss the promotion of good governance, human rights, and social inclusion

The event, hosted at the Royal Villas in Ezulwini, aimed to strengthen collaboration be-

tween CSOs, government, and international partners in advancing national development priorities.

The dialogue focused on key areas including women's rights and gender equality, youth and vulnerable groups' inclusion in decision-making, advocacy for policy development, and the promotion of social, cultural, and economic rights, alongside climate justice initiatives. Zombodze Emuva hosts men's dialogue to break silence on GBV

A VITAL community dialogue held at Mpandeni, under the Ngwenyameni Chiefdom in Zombodze Emuva Inkhundla, has brought men and young men together to openly confront the realities of gender-based violence (GBV) and its root causes.

The session, hosted as part of the national 16 Days of Activism Against GBV campaign, was led by the Nhlangano AIDS Training Information and Counselling Centre (NAT-ICC).

The engagement created a safe and supportive environment where participants reflected on pressing issues affecting families. Men spoke candidly about money-related conflicts, the weight of societal expectations placed on them, unemployment pressures, and household power dynamics which are all factors that often fuel violence when communication and emotional support are lacking.

Participants acknowledged that while men are often perceived only as perpetrators, many also suffer in silence. They highlighted the stigma and ridicule men face when attempting to report abuse, a barrier that prevents them from seeking help and perpetuates cycles of unreported violence.

The dialogue also unpacked key domestic offences outlined in the Sexual Offences and

Domestic Violence Act (SODVA) of 2018. Facilitators clarified legal implications surrounding cases involving persons under 18 and shed light on the rarely discussed issue of men experiencing sexual abuse.



Govt plans massive GHG reduction

PRIME Minister Russell Mmiso Dlamini has called for accelerated national action on climate resilience as Eswatini moves to implement its strengthened pledge to reduce greenhouse gas emissions by 2.24 million tonnes by 2035.

The Prime Minister delivered the message during the 2025 Temvelo Awards ceremony held at the Royal Swazi Spa, where he urged government institutions, the private sector, development partners and communities to support the Kingdom's transition toward a more sustainable and climate-secure economy. Dlamini described Eswatini's updated climate commitments as a deliberate shift from broad environmental awareness to measurable implementation.

He stated that the country's participation in multilateral environmental agreements, including the Paris Agreement on Climate Change, the Convention on Biological Diversity, and the UN Convention to Combat Desertification, is tied to a national obligation to protect ecosystems and preserve the Kingdom's biodiversity.

"Eswatini is entering a critical phase in its environmental response, one defined by reforms such as the new Ozone Depleting Substances and Hydrofluorocarbons Regulations of 2025 and improvements in meteorological capacity and early detection systems," said the Priemer.

The Prime Minister further highlighted Eswatini's status among the first ten countries globally to submit a new round of climate pledges under the Paris Agreement, known as Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs) 3.0.

He said the submission reflected a readiness to move beyond commitments on paper and into concrete action. Noteworthy Eswatini's updated NDC outlines sector-wide mitigation measures across energy, waste, industry and land use, combined with adaptation plans covering water security, health systems, ecosystems, and infrastructure protection.

"Under the 2035 target, the government intends to cut 2.24 million tonnes of greenhouse gases relative to projected emissions. A portion of this reduction will be achieved through domestic resources, while the balance is conditional on international support through climate finance, technology transfer and capacity-building," he said.

In addition, he said, the NDC places emphasis on strengthening renewable-energy adoption, scaling up clean-cooking solutions, restoring degraded land and expanding afforestation efforts, alongside improvements in agricultural practices and waste-management systems.

Worth noting, Eswatini's new climate plan was developed through a nationwide consultative process led by the Ministry of Tourism and Environmental Affairs.

Stakeholders included government agencies, municipalities, private-sector representatives, non-governmental organisations, youth groups and community structures.

The document aligns climate actions with national development priorities and introduces mechanisms for improved financial tracking, including climate-budget tagging and potential use of green-financing instruments.

According to the NDC, the country intends to limit climate-related economic losses,

strengthen early-warning systems and ensure the continued operation of health facilities during climate shocks.

It also sets long-term objectives to restore degraded ecosystems, secure water sources, reinforce infrastructure and expand access to sustainable energy.

Meanwhile, Dlamini said the Temvelo Awards illustrate the level of innovation and community participation required to fulfil these national goals.

He recognised the award recipients for their environmental stewardship, stating that their work demonstrates what is possible when institutions and individuals adopt sustainable practices.

The 2025 ceremony recognised a range of winners across multiple categories, including the Municipal Council of Mbabane as Green Municipality, Swazi Organics as Green Business in the SME segment, Malandela's Lifestyle Centre as the leading Large Business, and Olive Country Lodge in the Sustainable Eco-Tourism category.

Additional awards went to Enhlanhleni Methodist Primary School as Green Primary School, Motjane Inkhundla as Green Inkhundla and Sibusiso Dlamini as Environmentally Responsive Journalist.

Inclusive

Other categories included Environmentally Responsive Digital Media House, Climate Change Champion (Group and Individual), Young Eco-Hero, Innovative Waste Management, UNDP SDG recognition for the most inclusive institution, Ecosystem Restoration Hero, the FNB Sustainable Manufacturing Industry Award, Green High School, Green Parastatal and a Lifetime Achievement Award.

While the Temvelo Awards focused on national achievements, Eswatini's climate ambitions form part of a broader global landscape in which many countries have begun setting 2035 targets.

A number of early submitters in the 2025 NDC cycle have outlined comparable or more aggressive goals. Among them is Brazil, which announced a target to cut emissions by 59 to 67 per cent below 2005 levels by 2035.

The United Kingdom adopted a statutory goal to reduce emissions by at least 81 per cent by the same year, and New Zealand reaffirmed its pathway toward a 51 to 55 per cent reduction below 2005 levels by 2035. The United Arab Emirates also set a 2035 emissions target, committing to reduce its emissions by 47 per cent relative to 2019 levels.

These developments illustrate the growing use of 2035 as a benchmark year for global climate planning under the Paris Agreement, following the initial focus on 2030.

For many countries, including Eswatini, 2035 targets offer a medium-term horizon that allows governments to integrate new technologies, adopt climate-finance mechanisms and align environmental policies with economic-development strategies.

According to the PM, Eswatini's progress will depend on how successfully the country mobilises domestic and international support for its mitigation and adaptation measures.

The government has already outlined plans to expand renewable-energy capacity, improve climate-risk governance and scale up land-restoration projects. The extent of international climate finance, however, will play a key role in determining whether the full target can be achieved.

Meanwhile, many developing countries face similar constraints and have tied a portion of their targets to global partnerships through institutions such as the Green Climate Fund, regional development banks and bilateral cooperation programmes.

The Prime Minister emphasised the need for each sector of society to assume responsibility for advancing the Kingdom's environmental agenda.

He said future progress will depend on collaboration among regulators, industries, farmers, community organisations and the media. He added that environmental protection cannot be limited to policies and legislation, but must be reflected in everyday practices, investment decisions and long-term planning across the economy.

Dlamini concluded by reaffirming that the Temvelo Awards represent a national call to shift from intention to measurable impact. He said the recognition given to institutions and individuals across this year's categories reflects the type of innovation and commitment required as Eswatini moves to implement its 2035 climate target.

The Prime Minister said the Kingdom remains determined to follow a path that protects its natural environment, strengthens its resilience and contributes to global climate efforts.

Britain withdraws \$1.15 bln backing from TotalEnergies-led Mozambique LNG

THE British government has decided to withdraw its \$1.15 billion backing for the TotalEnergies-led Mozambique Liquefied Natural Gas project, it said on Monday.

Britain had promised financial support for the \$20 billion project via UK Export Finance in 2020, shortly before it pledged to stop providing direct government support for overseas fossil fuel projects.

The development has been slated to make Mozambique a major LNG exporter to Europe and Asia, but was halted in 2021 due to an Islamist insurgency.

Total lifted force majeure on the project in November, but made restarting construction conditional on the Mozambican government's approval of a new budget, which the president said he may dispute.

"In preparation to restart the project, UKEF was presented with a proposal to amend the financing terms it had agreed originally," British business minister Peter Kyle said in a statement.

"My officials have evaluated the risks

around the project, and it is the view of His Majesty's Government that these risks have increased since 2020."

"This view is based on a comprehensive assessment of the project and the interests of UK taxpayers, which are best served by ending our participation in the project at this time."

TotalEnergies declined to comment.

In February TotalEnergies CEO Patrick Pouyanne told investors that Mozambique LNG shareholders were ready to exercise their contractual rights to ensure UKEF and Atradius, the Netherlands' export finance arm, approved the funds initially promised.

Kyle said UKEF would pay back the project for any premium paid. A UKEF spokesperson declined to name the amount.

A spokesperson for Dutch export arm Atradius said in July an independent human rights due diligence review was ongoing, but that "there is no clearly defined deadline" for that review.

In March, the U.S. Export-Import Bank approved a nearly \$5 billion loan for the pro-

ject.

The project has been criticised by environmental and human rights groups.

Human rights nonprofit ECCHR last month filed a criminal complaint against TotalEnergies, alleging it was complicit in torture and enforced disappearances allegedly carried out by government soldiers in Mozambique. The company has said there is no evidence.

In April UKEF hired law firm Beyond Human Rights Compliance LLP to investigate risks around Mozambique LNG following media reports of the alleged torture, three people interviewed by the firm told Reuters.

A London court in 2023 dismissed a court challenge by environmental group Friends of the Earth against the British government's funding for the project.

TotalEnergies holds a 26.5% operating stake in Mozambique LNG. Japan's Mitsui owns 20% in the project and Mozambique state firm ENH 15%, alongside smaller stakeholders including India's ONGS and Oil India. (**Reuters**)

NIGERIA'S Dangote Refinery said on Monday it is able to deliver 1.5 billion litres of petrol a month and invited the sector regulator to validate daily volumes after the watchdog published data saying it was supplying only around a third of that.

The argument that refineries in Nigeria are unable to meet national demand was part of the reason the government last month dropped plans to ban imports of refined petroleum products.

The regulator estimates national demand at 55 million litres per day, or around 1.67 billion litres a month.

The refinery said it is "ready and able" to deliver 1.5 billion litres of petrol per month in December and January, with output rising to 1.7 billion litres monthly from February 2026 onward.

Dangote said that to ensure transparency, it is inviting officials from sector regulator the Nigerian Midstream and Downstream Petroleum Regulatory Authority to its site from December 1 to validate and publish daily supply volumes.

The invitation follows data published by the NMDPRA over the weekend which said the Dangote Petroleum Refinery was supplying about 18.03 million litres daily.

Dangote said it is willing to make its daily production and stock figures public so the regulator can directly confirm the volumes it processes.

Olivier, CFO since 2019, will remain in an executive role overseeing priority projects critical to that strategy, the retailer said. She helped steer the company through the Covid-19 pandemic, the 2021 KwaZulu-Natal riots and a two-step recapitalisation, opens new tab programme in 2025.

"In her new role at Pick n Pay, Ms Rookledge will leverage her experience to support the Group's turnaround strategy, focusing on operational performance, sustainable growth, and long-term value creation for stakeholders," Pick n Pay said.

India orders smartphone makers to preload state-owned cyber safety app

INDIA'S telecoms ministry has privately asked smartphone makers to preload all new devices with a state-owned cyber security app that cannot be deleted, a government order showed, a move likely to antagonise Apple and privacy advocates.

In tackling a recent surge of cyber crime and hacking, India is joining authorities worldwide, most recently in Russia, to frame rules blocking the use of stolen phones for fraud or promoting state-backed government service apps.

Apple (AAPL.O), opens new tab, which has previously locked horns with the telecoms regulator over development of a government anti-spam mobile app, is among the companies, such as Samsung (005930. KS), opens new tab, Vivo, Oppo and Xiaomi (1810.HK), opens new tab bound by the new order.

The November 28 order, seen by Reuters, gives major smartphone companies 90 days to ensure that the government's Sanchar Saathi app is pre-installed on new mobile phones, with a provision that users cannot disable it

For devices already in the supply chain, manufacturers should push the app to phones via software updates, the ministry said in its order, which was not made public and was sent privately to select companies.

A lawyer specialising in technology matters said India's move was cause for concern, however.

"The government effectively removes user consent as a meaningful choice," said Mishi Choudhary, who works on internet advocacy

issues.

Privacy advocates criticised a similar requirement by Russia in August for a state-backed messenger app called MAX to be pre-installed on phones.

One of the world's largest telephone markets, India has more than 1.2 billion subscribers, and government figures show the app, launched in January, has helped recover more than 700,000 lost phones, including

50,000 in October alone.

APPLE OFTEN REFUSES SUCH RE-OUESTS

The government said the app was essential to combat "serious endangerment" of telecom cyber security from duplicate or spoofed IMEI numbers, which enable scams and network misuse.

Apple's iOS powered an estimated 4.5% of 735 million smartphones in India by mid-

2025, with the rest using Android, Counterpoint Research says.

While Apple pre-installs its own proprietary apps on phones, its internal policies prohibit installation of any government or third-party app before sale of a smartphone, a source with direct knowledge of the matter said.

"Apple has historically refused such requests from governments," said Tarun Pathak, a research director at Counterpoint.

"It's likely to seek a middle ground: instead of a mandatory pre-install, they might negotiate and ask for an option to nudge users towards installing the app."

Apple, Google, Samsung and Xiaomi did not respond to requests for comment. India's telecoms ministry also did not respond.

A 14- to 17-digit number unique to each handset, the IMEI, or International Mobile Equipment Identity, is most commonly used to cut off network access for phones reported to have been stolen.

The app is mainly designed to help users block and track lost or stolen smartphones across all telecom networks, using a central registry. It also lets them identify, and disconnect, fraudulent mobile connections.

With more than 5 million downloads since its launch, the app has helped block more than 3.7 million stolen or lost mobile phones, while more than 30 million fraudulent connections have also been terminated.

The government says it helps prevent cyber threats and assists tracking and blocking of lost or stolen phones, helping police to trace devices, while keeping counterfeits out of the black market.

Amazon and Google launch multicloud service for faster connectivity

AMAZON and Google introduced a jointly developed multicloud networking service on Sunday to meet growing demand for reliable connectivity the companies said in a statement, at a time when even brief internet disruptions can cause major outages.

The initiative will enable customers to establish private, high-speed links between the two companies' computing platforms in minutes instead of weeks.

The new service is being unveiled a little over a month after an Amazon Web Services outage on October 20 disrupted thousands of websites worldwide, knocking offline some of the internet's most popular apps, including Snapchat and Reddit. That outage will cost U.S. companies between \$500 million and \$650 million in losses, according to analytics firm Parametrix.

The new offering combines AWS' Interconnect–multicloud with Google Cloud's Cross-Cloud Interconnect, to improve network interoperability, according to announcements by the two cloud providers.

"This collaboration between AWS and Google Cloud represents a fundamental shift in multicloud connectivity," said Robert Kennedy, vice president of network services at

Rob Enns, vice president and general manager of cloud networking at Google Cloud, said the joint network is intended to make it easier for customers to move data and applications between clouds.

Salesforce is among the early users of the new approach, Google Cloud said in a statement.

AWS provides computing power, data storage and other digital services to companies, governments and individuals and is the world's largest cloud provider, followed by Microsoft's tab Azure and Google Cloud.

Tech companies including Alphabet, Microsoft and Amazon are investing billions to build infrastructure that can handle surging internet traffic with the growing demands of artificial intelligence, as the need for computing power to support these services accelerates.

Amazon's cloud business delivered robust growth in the third quarter, generating \$33 billion in revenue; more than double that of Google's \$15.16 billion.

South Korean police probe massive data leak at Coupang

SOUTH Korean police said on Monday they were tracing IP addresses and looking into possible tech vulnerabilities at Coupang after the e-commerce giant suffered the country's worst data breach in over a

Shares of the company were down around 9% in premarket trading.

The personal data of more than 33 million customers was leaked in a breach believed to have started on June 24 through overseas servers, though the company did not learn of the problem until November 18. South Korea's Science Minister Bae Kyung-hoon said on Sunday the perpetrator had "abused authentication vulnerabilities" in Coupang's servers, and that authorities would be investigating whether the company violated rules regarding the protection of personal information.

Coupang, which is backed by Japan's SoftBank Group (9984.T), opens new tab, has said the breach exposed customers' names, email addresses, phone numbers, shipping addresses and certain order histories, but not payment details or login credentials. Broadcaster JTBC has reported that after conducting an internal investigation, Coupang suspects that a Chinese former employee, who was responsible for authentication tasks, was a key figure in the data breach.

A former employee used their authentication key that was still active after the termination of the person's contract to get access to customer information, lawmaker Choi Min-hee said in a statement on Monday.

Police and Coupang declined to comment on possible suspects.

As of Monday afternoon, internet postings showed that more than 10,000 people planned to join a possible class action lawsuit against Coupang. Lawyer Ha Hee-bong said the potential class action could seek compensation of more than 100,000 won (\$68) per person.

Coupang, founded by Korean-American Harvard graduate Bom Kim in 2010, is the country's most popular e-commerce platform. It has overtaken family-owned conglomerates like Shinsegae in South Korean e-commerce and is also expanding into food delivery, streaming and fintech.

Intensified diplomacy to end Europe's deadliest war in generations jumped across the Atlantic on Monday after U.S. and Ukrainian officials held talks at a golf resort built by Trump's envoy and fellow real estate magnate Steve Witkoff.

Zelenskiy, in Paris, received a show of support from French President Emmanuel Macron on Monday, and will head to Ireland on Tuesday. Ukraine's defence minister was due in Brussels for meetings with NATO. Witkoff, meanwhile, was headed to Moscow, where he will meet Russian President Vladimir Putin on Tuesday.

Kyiv and its European allies have been pushing Washington to revise a proposed U.S. peace plan that initially endorsed Russia's main demands: that Ukraine give up more territory, curb the size of its army, renounce joining NATO and be barred from hosting Western troops.

Ukraine says those terms would amount to capitulation, and leave it prone to eventual conquest by Russia, which invaded in 2014 and 2022.

RUBIO SAYS 'WE'VE MADE PRO-GRESS'

"There are some tough issues that still have to be worked through," Zelenskiy said on X, describing a packed agenda of meetings across Europe to discuss the outcome of the Florida talks. "It will be a very substantive day."

Macron posted a picture of himself and Zelenskiy striding in front of an honour guard at the Elysee Palace. "The work for peace continues," the French president wrote.

U.S. Secretary of State Marco Rubio, who hosted the talks at Witkoff's Shell Bay club near Miami, said on Sunday Washington was "realistic about how difficult this is, but optimistic, particularly given the fact that as we've made progress".

"There's more work to be done. This is delicate," Rubio said. "There are a lot of moving parts, and obviously there's another party involved here ... that will have to be a part of the equation, and that will continue

later this week, when Mr. Witkoff travels to Moscow."

INTENSIFIED TALKS COME AT DIFFICULT JUNCTURE FOR KYIV

The intensified negotiations have arrived at a difficult juncture for Kyiv, which has been losing ground at the front while facing the biggest corruption scandal of the war.

Zelenskiy's chief of staff, who had also led the Ukrainian delegation at peace talks, resigned on Friday after anti-corruption investigators searched his home. Two cabinet ministers have been fired and a former business partner of Zelenskiy has been named as a suspect.

Trump, who promised to swiftly end the war, has expressed frustration that a deal seems to be elusive.

"Ukraine's got some difficult little problems," Trump told reporters on Air Force One on Sunday, referring to the corruption scandal. He repeated his view that both Russia and Ukraine wanted to end the war and said there was a good chance a deal could be reached.

RUSSIA BOMBARDS UKRAINIAN CITIES

So far, Russia has shown no sign of backing off its maximalist demands while its forces continue to make slow progress on the 1,200 km (750 mile) front line.

At least four people were killed and 22 injured by a Russian attack on the Ukrainian city of Dnipro overnight.

Russia said on Monday its forces had captured another settlement in eastern Ukraine, Klynove in the Donetsk region. Reuters could not independently verify the situation there. Moscow has been saying it is on the verge of seizing the ruined city of Pokrovsk, its biggest prize in nearly two years.


Meanwhile, it has been bombarding Ukrainian cities nightly with long-range strikes, mainly targeting energy infrastructure, leaving Ukrainians in frequent cold and darkness as the war's fourth winter sets in.

Ukraine, for its part, has been launching long-range strikes to target Russia's oil exports. On Monday the Kremlin denounced Ukrainian attacks on a Russian oil-exporting terminal that serves a pipeline from Kazakhstan, and on two tankers in the Black Sea.

Ramaphosa dismisses Trump's threat to bar South Africa from 2026 G20 summit

SOUTH African President Cyril Ramaphosa dismissed on Sunday U.S. President Donald Trump's threat to exclude Pretoria from next year's G20 summit, reaffirming South Africa's status as a founding member of the group.

Washington boycotted the Group of 20 leaders' summit held under South Africa's presidency in Johannesburg on November 22-23, with Trump repeating allegations, widely discredited, that the host country's Black-majority government persecutes its white minority.

Trump said last Wednesday that South Africa would not be invited to the summit to be held in Florida next year because it had refused to hand over the G20 presidency to a senior representative of its embassy who was at the closing ceremony. Pretoria says it handed over the rotating presidency to a U.S. embassy official.

"South Africa is and will remain a full, active and constructive member of the G20," Ramaphosa said in a state of the nation address on Sunday.

He also described as "blatant misinformation" Trump's repeated claims that South Africa was committing "genocide against Afrikaners" - descendants of Dutch settlers - and confiscating land from white citizens.

Ramaphosa noted that despite the diplomatic rift, U.S. businesses and civil society groups engaged actively in G20-related events in Johannesburg in November.

"We value those constructive ties and will continue to work within the G20 framework," he said, signalling Pretoria's intention to maintain dialogue.

Europeans rally round Ukraine as Trump envoy heads to Moscow

EUROPEAN leaders rallied to show support for Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskiy on Monday after U.S.-Ukrainian talks to revise a peace proposal that initially favoured Russia, while Donald Trump's envoy headed to Moscow to brief the Kremlin.

Zelenskiy was warmly received by French President Emmanuel Macron in Paris, and the two joined a call with about a dozen other European leaders including those of Britain, Germany, Italy, Poland and the EU.

"The war must end as soon as possible. Much now depends on the involvement of every leader," Zelenskiy posted on X. Macron posted a picture of himself and the Ukrainian leader striding in front of an honour guard at the Elysee Palace.

Earlier, Zelenskiy made clear that Ukrainian and U.S. negotiators had not yet fully hammered out revisions to a proposed U.S. peace plan, despite two rounds of talks to adjust terms that initially endorsed Russia's main wartime demands.

There were "some tough issues that still have to be worked through", Zelenskiy posted following Sunday's U.S.-Ukrainian talks, held at a Florida luxury golf resort built by Trump's envoy and fellow real estate magnate Steve Witkoff.

Witkoff left the talks to travel to Mos-



cow where he will meet Russian President Vladimir Putin on Tuesday.

CHANGES NOT MADE PUBLIC

U.S. and Ukrainian officials have yet to make public any amendments they have so far agreed to the 28-point plan which Washington presented to Kyiv less than two weeks ago.

AS confirmed by MultiChoice, "BET Africa" is officially shutting down on January 1, 2026, ending more than a decade of broadcasting on the continent.

To make sure fans don't miss a single moment, the channel will air double episodes of its South African telenovela "Black Gold" from December 22 until the channel goes off air. The drama originally aired from Monday to Thursday at 6.30pm.

Launched in August, "Black Gold" quickly became a must-watch drama. The series, set in KwaZulu-Natal, follows themes of betrayal, family legacy and the fight for power. At its centre is Nomalanga Shozi as Amandla Zungu, a principled woman whose world is turned upside down by treachery.

She is joined by Saftas-winning actress Dawn Thandeka King as the cunning Florence Zungu and Sello Maake kaNcube as Tom Motsepe, a mining tycoon with a dangerous past. Other cast members include Warren Masemola, Sweet Guluva, Thulani Mtsweni and Nomsa Buthelezi.

Sources close to the production told "City Press" that filming for "Black Gold" recently wrapped up, and the accelerated double-episode schedule is designed to make sure every story beat is shown before BET Africa shuts down. Black Coffee takes Nota Baloyi to court

WORLD-FAMOUS DJ and producer Nkosinathi "Black Coffee" Maphumulo has launched an urgent high court bid to silence controversial music executive Nhlamulo "Nota" Baloyi after a series of explosive social media posts that accused the star of associating with criminals, abuse, and shady financial dealings.

The Grammy-winning DJ, who recently revealed in his divorce case that he is worth more than R1-billion, wants the court to force Baloyi to delete all the posts immediately, order him to publish a full public apology worded exactly the way he wants, and declare the statements false and defamatory.

According to the court papers that this publication has seen, Black Coffee wants to make Baloyi pay legal costs on the harshest possible scale. The court document shows that Black Coffee first tried to get an emergency order without notifying Baloyi (an "ex parte" application). He has now come back with a second urgent application.

Baloyi, in his responding papers, accuses Black Coffee of using his money and fame to bully and intimidate ordinary people who dare criticise him. He said the application is not about defamation; it's about muzzling public discourse on issues that affect society.

Right to freedom of expression

He insists everything he posted is either true or fair comment and is protected by the constitutional right to freedom of expression.

He also accuses Black Coffee of harassing his mother by contacting her directly in an attempt to pressure him, a conduct Baloyi calls intimidatory.

In a bold counterattack, Baloyi is asking the court to dismiss Black Coffee's case and make the DJ pay punitive legal costs, order Black Coffee to pay R25 000 as compensation for the distress caused to Baloyi's mother, and ban Black Coffee and his team from contacting Baloyi or his family except through official court channels.

Baloyi wants the matter postponed so Black Coffee can first hand over certain documents he believes will prove his allegations. In the court papers, he pointed out that Black Coffee waited weeks before bringing the urgent application, even though the posts had been online for some time. He argues that this shows there is no real urgency, saying Black Coffee is trying to harass and bankrupt him. (Sunday World)

Stella assures Piastri he can still be champion

OSCAR Piastri was robbed of victory in Qatar but the Australian can take hope from history in his bid to become Formula One champion next weekend, according to McLaren boss Andrea Stella.

The 24-year-old did everything right at the Lusail circuit, winning the Saturday sprint from pole position and leading Sunday's race from pole until a team strategy blunder left him having to settle for second to Red Bull's Max Verstappen.

The Australian said he was speechless with what had happened and McLaren were quick to apologise for a mistake that left him third overall and 16 points behind teammate Lando Norris, who finished fourth. Verstappen is second, 12 off the lead.

"Clearly Oscar was in control of the race and deserved to win it, and we lost the podium as well with Lando," Stella told reporters.

"Oscar, from a points point of view, is definitely in condition to win the title," added the Italian.


"We have seen before in the history of Formula One that when you have this kind of situation sometimes it's the third one that actually wins."

LESSONS FROM 2007 AND 2010 CHAMPIONSHIPS

Stella, who joined McLaren after years at Ferrari, spoke from personal experience.

In 2007 Ferrari's Kimi Raikkonen won the championship after going into the final race third overall and behind McLaren's Fernando Alonso and a rookie Lewis Hamilton, who ended up level on points and missing out by one.

In 2010 Sebastian Vettel took the first of his four championships with

Red Bull after going to Abu Dhabi in third place and behind teammate Mark Webber, now Piastri's manager, and Alonso who was by then at Ferrari.

McLaren have said they are well aware of the precedents but will not abandon the policy of treating their drivers as equals and Stella emphasised that Piastri will be free to race while he still has a chance of the ti-

"We will let the drivers be in condition to race each other but above all what's important for us is that we are in condition to beat Verstappen with one of our two drivers," he

"We want to be fair to our drivers, we want to race with integrity and we want to race in a way that doesn't surprise our drivers.

"So between now and Abu Dhabi there will be further conversations with Lando and Oscar. We will confirm our racing approach but certainly what I can say is that if any of the drivers is in condition to pursue the quest to win the title, then we will respect this."

"I understand the question regarding going hard in attack and trying to win but this is a competition where if you get a point away, you take two points away from the opponent," he said.

"We knew that if we went with a lot of numbers upfront, we could suffer from that because this team is very dangerous when they have spaces to use. So, not allowing spaces means attacking with balance which allows us to always manage the result of the game. On the other side, it's always interesting to see that people don't sometimes give credit because Alger defended very well.

"They had the capacity to cope with our offensive game and they closed the middle by not allowing the ball to go to some of our players who are very important and forced us to go on the outside. We didn't arrive in the box as many times as we wanted but it's also clear that MC Alger didn't enter ours in order to score."

Sundowns remain top of Group C on goal difference, level on four points with Al-Hilal, who claimed a 1-1 draw away to Saint-Éloi Lupopo on Sunday. Cardoso also emphasised the contrasting demands of the Champions League compared to their Betway Premiership matches.

Red Bull regret suggesting Antonelli moved aside for Norris

RED Bull issued a statement of regret Kimi receiving online abuse." on Monday after senior team members made "incorrect" comments accusing Mercedes' Kimi Antonelli of moving aside for McLaren's Formula One leader Lando Norris at the Qatar Grand

Red Bull's 82-year-old motorsport consultant Helmut Marko told reporters after the race, won by Red Bull's Max Verstappen, that it was obvious Antonelli "more or less waved Lando by" for fourth place on the penultimate lap.

Verstappen's race engineer Gianpiero ambiase also observed over the radio that Antonelli appeared to have made it easy.

Mercedes boss Toto Wolff angrily accused his fellow-Austrian Marko of "total, utter nonsense" and Red Bull moved to calm the situation when it emerged Antonelli, 19, had faced social media abuse.

"Comments made before the end of and immediately after the Qatar GP suggesting that Mercedes driver Kimi Antonelli had deliberately allowed Lando Norris to overtake him are clearly incorrect," the statement

"Replay footage shows Antonelli momentarily losing control of his car, thus allowing Norris to pass him.

"We sincerely regret that this has led to

The overtake meant Norris, whose car has a Mercedes engine, goes to the final round in Abu Dhabi with a 12-point lead over Verstappen rather than 10.

Antonelli explained the incident as a mistake made in dirty air while following Carlos Sainz's Williams - also a Mercedes-powered car - and almost crashed.

"No, not yet," said Guardiola, when asked at a press conference on Monday that lasted just a few minutes, if Rodri was available.

Asked if he could feature at the weekend, Guardiola said: "I don't know."

Guardiola also spoke about goalk-eeper Gianluigi Donnarumma, who was booked for a fourth time in his short City career in the last-gasp 3-2 win over Leeds on Saturday.

Leeds manager Daniel Farke also accused Donnarumma of feigning injury to allow Guardiola to deliver a key team talk. The Italian is now just one yellow card away from a suspension.

"Yes, he has a lot (of bookings), he has many," said Guardiola. "It is what it is."

Asked if he had spoken to Donnarumma about it, he said: "No."

Guardiola was more willing to discuss the work of Fulham manager Marco Silva after their impressive 2-1 win away to Tottenham.

"Marco is many, many years there and always (when we) have been there – really, really tough games,


The South African mentor also welcomed the return of midfielder Bongiswa' Pumba' Dlamini from a long-term injury.
