

Japan grants Eswatini E12 mln to boost school transport for learners with disabilities

ESWATINI has secured a JPY 103 million (about E12 million) grant from the Government of Japan to improve school transport for learners with disabilities.

The funding follows the signing of the Universal Accessible School Transport Project between Eswatini and Japan through the Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA).

At the signing ceremony in Manzini, officials confirmed that the grant will be used to procure four universally accessible buses and provide specialised training for drivers and technicians. The initiative aims to ease long-standing transport barriers, especially for children in rural communities while advancing the country's inclusive education agenda.

Japan's Ambassador to Eswatini, Shimizu Fumio, said the project highlights a significant step forward in the two nations' cooperation. He noted that the buses are designed to allow learners using wheelchairs to board safely without needing to disembark, ensuring dignity, safety and reliable school access.

"This assistance provides educational opportunities for individuals who are disadvantaged," he said, adding that the grant reflects Japan's continued commitment to strengthening development ties with Eswatini.

Ambassador Shimizu highlighted this year's active high-level exchanges between the two countries, including Prime Minister Russell Mmiso Dlamini's visit to Japan during the Osaka Kansai Expo 2025 and His Majesty King Mswati III's participation in the TICAD Summit in August. He said these engagements strengthened cooperation and helped pave the way for initiatives like the transport project.

The Ambassador emphasised that while Eswatini's policies support inclusive educa-



He said the buses funded through the grant will help close that gap.


The project was initiated following a request from Deputy Prime Minister Thulisile Dladla, whose advocacy highlighted the urgent need for improved mobility for learners with disabilities. Shimizu noted that Japan was compelled to respond, aligning its support with Eswatini's National Disability Action Plan, the Persons with Disabilities Act of 2018 and other national development priorities.

He urged the Ministry of Education and Training and the Deputy Prime Minister's Office to ensure proper management and maintenance of the buses to secure longterm sustainability.

Moreover, Ambassador Shimizu emphasized Japan's commitment to supporting Eswatini's inclusive development efforts and expressed hope that the new buses will open doors to greater educational opportunities and improved life outcomes for children with disabilities.

DPM hails accessible transport deal as boost for inclusive education

ESWATINI has strengthened its push for inclusive education following the signing of a new partnership with the Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA) to improve school transport for learners with disabilities. Speaking at The George Hotel in Manzini, Deputy Prime Minister Thulisile Dladla said the introduction of universally designed buses represents a firm national commitment to removing mobility barriers and expanding opportunities for all learners. Dladla said the agreement aligns with Eswatini's broader goals of equity, social justice and accessible essential services. She noted that many children with disabilities continue to miss school due to inaccessible transport, poor rural roads and a shortage of specialised vehicles. She stressed that inclusive education can only be realised when every child can reach school safely and learn in a supportive environment.

The DPM emphasised the need for coordinated investment in safer roads, universal design in transport planning and

stronger collaboration among the education, transport and local government sectors. She urged that organisations of persons with disabilities be central to these efforts, reiterating the principle of "nothing about us without us."

While welcoming the JICA support, Dladla said buses alone will not solve the long-standing challenges but should mark the beginning of sustained action. She thanked Japan for its continued partnership and expressed confidence that through joint efforts, no child will be excluded from education due to disability or lack of transport

The DPM emphasised the need for coordinated investment in safer roads, universal design in transport planning and stronger collaboration among the education, transport and local government sectors.

THE Minister for Foreign Affairs and International Cooperation has sounded a strong warning on the growing threat of disinformation, stressing that false narratives are actively harming Eswatini's international reputation. Speaking during the official opening of the Countering Disinformation and Promoting Digital Transparency workshop at Happy Valley Hotel, the Minister, represented by Minister for Public Service Mabulala Maseko, called for a national, multi-sector response to safeguard the country's image and strengthen digital resilience.

Opening the workshop, the Minister said the presence of government officials, tech professionals, media practitioners and communications experts demonstrated the urgency of addressing misinformation in an age where damaging content spreads faster than truth. He extended heartfelt appreciation to the Government of Taiwan for funding and supporting the programme, noting that Taiwan's commitment to digital transparency and global cooperation continues to add value to Eswatini's institutional capacity. He emphasised that disinformation is no longer a distant or abstract challenge but a direct threat to governance, democracy, economic prospects and the social cohesion of the Kingdom. "In today's interconnected world, false narratives can erode trust, sow discord, and undermine democratic processes. For Eswatini, the impact is particularly severe. Disinformation is damaging our global image, often painting an inaccurate picture of our nation and our people," he said. The workshop, which runs for three days, aims to strengthen skills in identifying, analysing and countering coordinated misinformation campaigns, especially those targeting public institutions, leadership and major national programmes. The Minister said the Ministry is deeply aware of the growing risks and is prioritising digital literacy, critical thinking

and coordinated communication as tools to protect the country from manipulation.

He outlined three key objectives driving the workshop. First, to improve the capacity of participants to recognise and respond effectively to disinformation, whether originating locally or abroad. Second, to promote collaboration and the exchange of best practices among government, private sector and civil society. Third, to strengthen the country's ability to project an accurate, dignified and fair representation of Eswatini to the world. "We envision a future where Eswatini is recognised not only for its natural beauty and vibrant culture, but also for its commitment to truth and transparency in the digital realm," he said.

Transparency

Throughout the opening session, the Ministerhighlightedthatdigitaltransparency is now a global standard, and countries that fail to adapt risk being misrepresented and misunderstood on the international stage. He encouraged participants to use the workshop as a platform for innovation, partnership and constructive dialogue. "As you deliberate over the next three days, I urge you to champion media literacy, critical thinking, and robust fact-checking. Let us leave this workshop with renewed purpose and determination to ensure that the digital space becomes a force for good not division," the Minister concluded.

... Taiwan pledges strong partnership in fight against misinformation

TAIWAN'S Ambassador to Eswatini, Jeremy Liang, has reaffirmed Taiwan's commitment to helping Eswatini strengthen its defences against misinformation, describing challenge as one of the most pressing threats facing modern societies.

during Speaking the Countering Disinformation and Promoting Digital Transparency workshop at Happy Valley Hotel, Ambassador Liang said Taiwan stands ready to work "hand in hand" with Eswatini to build resilience, enhance media literacy, and reinforce public trust in government.

At the request of Minister for Foreign Affairs and International Cooperation Pholile Shakantu, Taiwan brought four digital diplomacy experts to Eswatini to lead the workshop. Ambassador Liang said the team will share practical strategies on responding to misinformation, online fraud, cognitive warfare, and AI-driven attacks on governments. "The programme is rich and comprehensive, supported by training materials, and I am confident all participants will find it highly informative and rewarding," he said.

He noted that misinformation has become a global challenge that undermines stability, erodes trust, and distorts government policies. Taiwan, he explained, is one of the most targeted countries in the world. "For

11 consecutive years, Taiwan has ranked as the country most heavily targeted by foreign disinformation. Every day, we confront waves of misinformation," he said. Through these experiences, Taiwan has developed valuable tools and approaches that it is willing to share with Eswatini.

Ambassador Liang highlighted

Memorandum of Understanding signed earlier this year by Taiwan's Foreign Minister Dr. Lin Chia-lung and Minister Shakantu, establishing a framework for cooperation on information integrity. "This MOU strengthens our collaboration and demonstrates Taiwan's readiness to share expertise on media literacy, fact-checking

mechanisms, and digital resilience," he said. He welcomed the strong turnout from

government ministries and the media, noting that effective response to misinformation requires cooperation between public institutions and civil society. "Your presence demonstrates a shared commitment to this crucial issue," he told participants.

Fire contained at Mankayane Govt Hospital as quick response averts tragedy

A POTENTIALLY devastating fire incident at Mankayane Government Hospital was narrowly avoided after the Eswatini National Fire and Rescue Services responded swiftly and successfully contained a blaze that broke out in the male medical ward.

The fire, which erupted earlier today, prompted an immediate emergency response as hospital staff and rescue teams worked together to ensure the safety of patients and personnel. According to reliable sources, more than 12 patients were admitted in the affected ward at the time of the

All patients were quickly evacuated and moved to safety before the situation could

Eyewitnesses described moments of tension as smoke filled the ward, but calm coordination by hospital workers helped prevent



panic. Patients were escorted outside the building while emergency procedures were activated. Their swift action is credited with saving lives and minimising injuries.

The Eswatini National Fire and Rescue Services arrived promptly after being alerted and immediately began firefighting operations. Firefighters managed to bring the flames under control within a short period, preventing the fire from spreading to adjacent hospital wards and other critical areas of the facility.

ENFRES Public Relations Officer Mandla Dlamini confirmed the incident and praised

the rapid response by firefighters and hospital staff. He said the situation could have resulted in one of the country's most tragic hospital disasters had it not been for the timely intervention.

We can confirm that our teams responded promptly and managed to contain the fire before it could spread further. There were no fatalities reported and no injuries to patients or staff," Dlamini said.

He further confirmed that only the male medical ward was affected by the fire, while other sections of the hospital remained operational. The extent of the damage is still being assessed by relevant authorities.

According to Dlamini, investigations are currently under way to establish the cause of the fire. He said ENFRES specialists are working closely with hospital management and other stakeholders to determine how the blaze started and whether safety systems functioned as expected.

"At this stage investigations are ongoing. Once completed, we will be able to provide a clearer picture of what led to the incident,"

PRIME Minister Russell Dlamini has reiterated the Government's unwavering resolve to fortify the legal and regulatory environment guiding the Royal Eswatini Police Service (REPS), describing the ongoing reforms as essential to building a disciplined, trusted and future-ready Police Service.

The Prime Minister was addressing Honourable Senators during a Police Service Regulations Workshop held on Tuesday at SibaneSami Hotel in Ezulwini, where he emphasised that the modernised Police Service Regulations of 2025 are central to enhancing professionalism, accountability and operational efficiency across the force. The Regulations, which have already been passed by the House of Assembly, serve as an extension of the Police Service Act No. 22 of 2018.

Dlamini explained that the comprehensive reforms address key pillars of policing, ranging from recruitment and promotions to conduct and retirement, thereby creating a uniform standard for officers at all levels. "The role of the Police Service in upholding the law, preserving peace and ensuring the safety of all emaSwati cannot be overemphasised," he told Senators. "A disciplined, well-regulated and supported Police Service is essential in building public trust and maintaining stability in our country."

PM backs stronger police regulations

According to the Prime Minister, the 2025 Regulations also introduce one of the most progressive institutional developments within the Police Service, the establishment of the Royal Eswatini Police Service Staff Association. This association is designed to offer officers a structured and recognised platform to raise concerns about welfare, conditions of service and representation in government negotiations.

Government, he said, envisions a Police Service whose internal governance matches the complex demands of modern policing. For this reason, the Regulations take deliberate steps to clarify disciplinary procedures, streamline appointments, and ensure fairness and merit-based progression. The advocacy for sound regulatory structures, the PM observed, is directly connected to the broader national agenda of safeguarding peace and advancing the rule of law.

"These Regulations are meant to empower and capacitate our Police officers so that they may execute their duties with professionalism, integrity and confidence, as we intensify our fight against crime and social

disorder," Dlamini said. The Premier further underscored that the reforms reinforce the need for operational discipline and ethical accountability, two fundamental traits of an effective Police Service.

Beyond the technical aspects of the new framework, Dlamini used the platform to commend the collaborative spirit demonstrated during deliberations in the House of Senate, noting that such unity reflects the best of national leadership. "The spirit of unity demonstrated in the House of Senate is commendable. Our Kingdom will go very far if all the Houses work together in oneness for the collective good of the nation," he said.

The Prime Minister concluded by reaffirming that unity remains a driving force behind sustainable national development. He urged members of all Houses to maintain cooperative engagement, arguing that shared commitment and purpose are pivotal as Eswatini undertakes complex reforms aimed at strengthening institutions and fostering long-term stability.

EEC, Ubombo seal E1.5bn energy expansion agreement

ESWATINI'S pursuit of greater energy independence advanced significantly on Monday as Ubombo Sugar Limited (USL) and the Eswatini Electricity Company (EEC) signed a major Power Purchase Agreement (PPA) worth E1.5 billion.

The agreement paves the way for a major expansion of USL's cogeneration project, increasing its maximum export capacity to 40 MW by June 2028.

The project is one of the largest private-sector energy investments in the country and is expected to play a central role in reducing Eswatini's reliance on imported electricity.

The signing took place at the Hilton Garden Inn in Mbabane, attended by senior government officials, industry executives, and energy regulators.

According to technical details presented during the ceremony, the Standard Core Generation Asset will export up to 40 MW into the national grid once the expansion is complete.

This will add 24 MW to the existing generation output, building on the current 16 MW PPA relationship between USL and EEC.

Once the expanded plant reaches stable operation, it is projected to deliver approximately 141 GWh of energy per year, equivalent to around 40 per cent of Eswatini's energy needs.

"This project builds on the experience of the existing 16 MW power purchase agreement relationship between EEC and Ubombo Sugar Limited. Notwithstanding any technical contracts and limitations of a sugar-processing cogeneration plant, both parties will draw from their expertise and experience to ensure the success of the 40 MW maximum export power purchase agreement," said HRH Prince Lonkhokhela, the Minister for Natural Resources and Energy.

Prince Lonkhokhela described the agreement as a significant step toward reducing Eswatini's dependence on imported power.

The minister said, the PPA between Ubombo Sugar and EEC is a step in the right direction for Eswatini to achieve energy sovereignty.

He emphasised that the government fully supports projects that expand local generation using renewable and agricultural by-product resources, noting their long-term economic value.

Meanwhile, Eswatini Energy Regulatory Authority (ESERA) CEO Sikhumbuzo Tsabedze highlighted the national impact of the agreement, confirming the increase in USL's contribution to the electricity mix.

"This Power Purchase Agreement is very important, as it will increase power generated by Ubombo Sugar Limited from 5% to 10%," Tsabedze stated.

He noted that cogeneration aligns with ESERA's broader strategy of diversifying Eswatini's energy sources, especially through independent power producers (IPPs).

EEC Managing Director Ernest Mkhonta expressed strong support for the project,

linking its economic impact to reduced electricity imports. Mkhonta said, increasing local generation capacity directly translates to a reduction in electricity imports.

He further explained that keeping more energy expenditure within the country would benefit the national economy.

"The subsequent decrease in external payments will ensure that the local currency, the Lilangeni, circulates within the country," said Mkhonta.

He concluded that the project would enhance employment opportunities, stating that the localised economic activity would substantially contribute to the country's fiscal health and promote increased employment opportunities.

In the same tone, USL Managing Director Muzi Siyaya praised the efficiency with which the agreement was concluded, citing his long experience in energy-sector negotiations.

"Leveraging 15 years of experience in energy transactions, I commend the expeditious pace at which this cogeneration power plant agreement was successfully concluded "he said

He added that the project demonstrates the capacity of institutions in Eswatini to finalise complex transactions, especially those involving renewable resources and agricultural synergy.

The ceremony began with remarks by ES-ERA CEO Skhumbuzo Tsabedze, who reiterated the strategic importance of integrating agriculture, manufacturing, and electricity generation.

"The procurement of power from cogeneration plants strategically explores the synergy among agriculture, manufacturing, and electricity generation, all of which are critical for the economic growth and development of the Kingdom of Eswatini," said Tsabedze..

Worth noting the agreement positions Ubombo Sugar as one of the largest contributors to Eswatini's renewable energy production and solidifies its role as a key Independent Power Producer. The E1.5 billion expansion is now expected to move into the implementation phase, with completion targeted for mid-2028.

THE Health Promotion Unit, in partnership with UNICEF Eswatini, launched the Childhood Lead Poisoning Awareness Campaign on Monday, highlighting a global publichealth concern that affects millions of children each year.

Speaking at the launch, Senior Medical Officer (Public Health) Dr. Shabangu said lead remains a widely present toxic metal found in paint, contaminated water systems, industrial waste, certain cosmetics and some traditional herbs.

He noted that children may show few or no obvious symptoms, yet exposure can interfere with brain development, reduce learning ability, affect school performance and impair concentration.

Lead poisoning is recognised internationally as a major contributor to disease. Global public-health data indicate that lead exposure contributes to more than a million deaths each year, largely linked to long-term health complications.

Research also shows that children's developing nervous systems are more vulnerable to even low levels of exposure. No level of lead in the bloodstream is considered completely safe for children.

Recent global assessments estimate that approximately one in three children worldwide have blood lead levels high enough to be considered harmful.

According to reports, the burden is highest in low- and middle-income countries, including many in Africa and Asia, where exposures often stem from unsafe recycling of lead-acid batteries, industrial pollution, contaminated soil, old paint, unsafe water systems and consumer products containing lead. In sub-Saharan Africa, millions of children are estimated to have elevated blood-lead levels above internationally recommended thresholds. Several countries in the region have recorded cases linked to industrial emissions, legacy mining sites, informal battery recycling, contaminated food or spices, and unsafe waste disposal practices.

One example documented in the region includes long-term contamination in mining towns where smelting operations

once operated.

In such areas, lead dust has been found in soil, homes, and playgrounds, with children recording high blood-lead levels years after mining activity ceased. Other countries have reported incidents involving lead in imported products, traditional medicines or household paints used in older buildings.

At the launch, UNICEF Eswatini and the Health Promotion Unit noted the role of the media in sharing verified prevention messages.

They also announced plans to expand communication strategies using creative and arts-based approaches to improve public awareness at community level.

"The campaign aims to inform households, caregivers, schools and communities about potential sources of exposure, the importance of safe waste disposal, checking older paint, monitoring water sources and being cautious about unregulated products that may contain lead," said Shabangu during the launch.

The Ministry of Health and UNICEF stated that protecting children from lead exposure is essential for supporting healthy physical and cognitive development and for reducing preventable health risks linked to environmental contaminants.

REPS swift action leads to arrest of woman in boat cruise scam

THE Royal Eswatini Police Service has acted swiftly in arresting a woman accused of defrauding unsuspecting victims in a cross border fraud scheme that left several people stranded in South Africa.

Thandeka Mamba was arrested following an investigation into allegations that she collected a large sum of money from a group of bank employees under the pretext of organizing a leisure trip that never materialized.

According to police reports, Mamba allegedly promised seventeen bank workers a luxury boat cruise experience in Durban South Africa. The victims reportedly paid a total amount of E131 000 believing the trip was legitimate and fully arranged. However upon their arrival in Durban the promised boat cruise did not exist and attempts to contact Mamba proved unsuccessful as she had vanished without trace.

The victims were left stranded and confused after realizing that no booking

had been made and no cruise operator had any record of the alleged trip. Following the ordeal the matter was reported to the authorities which prompted an immediate investigation by the Royal Eswatini Police Service.

Confirming the arrest Deputy Police Information and Communication Officer Assistant Superintendent Nosipho Mnguni said the police wasted no time in tracking down the suspect once a formal report had been lodged. She said investigations revealed that the suspect had misrepresented herself as a tour organizer and had convinced the victims that all arrangements including accommodation and leisure activities had been fully secured.

Efficiency

Assistant Superintendent Mnguni commended the professionalism and efficiency of officers involved in the operation stating that the arrest demonstrates the police service's commitment to protecting the public from financial crimes. She further revealed that the suspect is expected to appear before court soon to answer to charges related to fraud and theft by false pretenses.

Police investigations are ongoing as authorities seek to establish whether there may be more victims who fell prey to similar schemes allegedly orchestrated by the suspect. Members of the public who may have information related to the case or who

believe they may have been defrauded in a similar manner have been urged to come forward and assist with investigations.

The incident has sparked widespread concern as it highlights the growing prevalence of travel related scams especially during the festive season when many people are planning group trips and leisure activities. Police have cautioned the public to exercise extreme care when making payments for travel packages and to always verify the credentials of individuals or companies offering such services.

Assistant Superintendent Mnguni advised citizens to insist on written contracts proof of bookings and to confirm directly with service providers before parting with their money.

She further encouraged the use of established travel agencies and reputable operators to minimize the risk of falling victim to fraudulent schemes.

Meanwhile the affected bank workers are said to be cooperating fully with police as they seek justice and possible recovery of their funds. While no injuries were reported the emotional and financial distress caused by the ordeal has been described as significant.

Nhlangano town projects E1.5 million surplus

... on E27 mln budget

The Nhlangano Town Council is projecting a strong financial performance for the current financial year, with the latest official report indicating a surplus of E1,555,599 by March 2025.

This marks a significant turnaround from the initial 2024/2025 Budget Estimates, which expected a deficit of E187,392.

The updated figures, outlined in the Financial Performance section of the report, show that the council's fiscal trajectory has shifted positively despite minor revenue shortfalls

The performance is largely attributed to tighter spending and slower-than-planned capital expenditure.

According to the report, the council is operating on an approved budget of E27.03 million, funded through property taxes (both government and private), own-source revenue, and government subvention.

"A review of the revenue performance shows that the council expects to collect E26.6 million by the end of March 2025 slightly below the budgeted E27.03 million, creating a negative variance of E430,000. This means the council is on track to collect 98 per cent of its projected income," reads the report in part.

Meanwhile, property tax, one of the key revenue streams, was budgeted at E10,547,698. It is now forecast at E9,947,698, which comes in at 94 per cent of the target.

The report further states that, government rates, however, are performing better than anticipated. Initially budgeted at E9,679,790, the revised projection puts collections at E9,947,698, achieving 103 per cent of the budget. While income shows mixed results.

Country's financial system stable – CBE

ESWATINI's financial system remains stable and resilient, according to the Central Bank of Eswatini (CBE), which released its 2025 Financial Stability Review on Tuesday.

The Bank says that despite rising fiscal pressures including a projected E2.46 billion deficit the country's financial sector continues to operate from a position of strength.

Presenting the Review, CBE Governor Dr Phil Mnisi said the stability is supported by accommodative monetary conditions, steady credit flows and strong capital positions within financial institutions.

" A key contributor was last year's 75 basispoint cut to the discount rate, bringing it to 6.75 per cent which eased borrowing conditions and supported economic activity through the 12 months to June 2025," said Mnisi in his presentation.

The Review shows that banks remain wellcapitalised, liquid and able to withstand shocks, despite global economic uncertainty.

According to Mnisi credit to households and ousinesses continued to grow at a moderate pace, while non-performing loans remain contained. Mnisi said this performance reflects prudent regulation and sustained confidence in the financial system.

However, the CBE also pointed to emerging pressures, particularly within government

"The projected E2.46 billion fiscal deficit, widened by the recent public-sector salary review, remains one of the main risks the Bank is monitoring. While the deficit is significant, the CBE stressed that it is manageable and does not currently threaten financial stability," he

Mnisi said highlighting the deficit is part of the Bank's proactive approach to risk identification, aimed at ensuring policymakers respond early before fiscal challenges spill into the banking sector.

He emphasised that coordination between fiscal and monetary authorities will be essential to maintaining stability through 2025.

Despite these pressures, the tone of the Review is broadly positive. The CBE maintains that Eswatini's financial system continues to show resilience, supported by sound regulation, stable credit conditions and improved market confidence.

The Bank reiterated its commitment to transparency, noting that publicly releasing the Review helps strengthen trust and ensure that financial institutions and the public remain informed about risks and opportunities.

Government pushes for healthy competition to drive economic growth

THE government has reiterated its commitment to strengthening competition in Eswatini's markets, saying fair and healthy competition is essential for economic growth, innovation and consumer welfare.

Speaking on behalf of the Minister for Commerce, Industry and Trade Manqoba Khumalo, Under Secretary Phesheya Dube said the government continues to support strong regulatory systems that promote fair play among companies, prevent anti-competitive conduct and safeguard consumers.

He was addressing delegates during the commemoration of World Competition Day, held under the global theme Artificial Intelligence, Consumers and Competition Policy.

Dube said competition is not merely a technical concept but a central driver of development

"Competitive markets drive efficiency, stimulate innovation, attract investment and ultimately contribute to job creation and social welfare," he said.

He added that the government recognises the role of the Eswatini Competition Commission (ECC) in maintaining a fair economic environment.

"By protecting consumers from exploitative and unfair practices, the Commission contributes directly to public confidence in the economy," he said.

Dube noted that as markets evolve through digitalisation and artificial intelligence, competition policy must keep pace. Emerging risks such as data misuse, market concentration and unfair digital practices, he said, require stronger vigilance and collaboration across sectors.

"Regulators cannot afford to look backwards while markets move forward. No single institution can address these challenges alone; coordination and shared understanding are essential," he said.

He further emphasised that strong competition policy supports the government's broader goals under the national development agenda.

"Markets that work well create opportunities for all Emaswati and encourage wider participation, which in turn reduces inequality," Dube said.

Meanwhile, ECC Board Chairperson Sandile Simelane officially opened the commemoration, stressing that competition and consumer protection are fundamental pillars of a healthy economy.

Simelane acknowledged that many people still do not fully understand the role of the Commission, but said its work remains critical in safeguarding the integrity of markets.

"Most of us did not understand the function of a competition commission until we saw the impact of its work," he said.

He pointed to practical examples within the region, emphasising that effective enforcement improves pricing, efficiency and fairness.

"Look at South Africa when Covid-19 tests dropped from E800 to E400 after competition intervention. That shows why a competition commission matters," he said.

Simelane encouraged wider public engagement with the ECC to ensure businesses and consumers are fully informed about

their rights and obligations.

He said technological advancements, particularly in AI, present both opportunities and risks that regulators must understand and respond to.

"AI can improve services and expand choice, but it can also lead to unfair conduct if not supervised. Competition authorities must remain vigilant so innovation supports rather than undermines fair markets," he said.

Worth noting both speakers highlighted that Eswatini's economy is increasingly shaped by digital platforms, mobile money, automated systems and AI-driven tools used in banking, retail and public services.

Dube said that with more consumers interacting with automated systems daily, safeguarding their rights is a priority.

"Consumer spending drives economic activity. By ensuring proper safeguards against unfair practices, competition policy strengthens confidence, enabling businesses to grow while consumers benefit from choice and affordability," he said.

Simelane echoed the message, noting that while AI improves efficiency such as faster loan processing or round-the-clock customer support it must be used responsibly.

He said companies must ensure transparency and fairness in how digital tools operate. "Businesses should clearly disclose when customers are interacting with chatbots and provide an option to speak to a real person," he said. He added that consumer data protection remains essential.

Both the government and the Commission stressed that promoting fair competition requires partnership among regulators, businesses and civil society. Dube called for ongoing cooperation to ensure markets remain fair and competitive.

"We encourage continued engagement between the Commission, sector regulators, the private sector and civil society to ensure that competition policy remains responsive and effective," he said.

Simelane said the Commission will con-



tinue educating stakeholders and enforcing competition law to maintain open, fair markets. "Healthy competition strengthens our

kets. "Healthy competition strengthens our economy. It drives better products, better prices and better opportunities for all," he said.

He thanked delegates for participating and expressed confidence that the day's discussions would contribute meaningfully to Eswatini's economic development.

Samancor Chrome and the joint venture between Glencore and Merafe Resources have said they are considering job cuts because of pressures including the cost of electricity.

Energy regulator Nersa is currently reviewing an interim power tariff adjustment for the two firms, and the government is working on a longer-term mechanism to support competitive pricing for the ferrochrome sector, Eskom said.

South Africa holds approximately 80% of the world's known chrome ore reserves, according to Glencore, positioning the country as a key player in global ferrochrome production.

Once an interim tariff for Samancor Chrome and the Glencore-Merafe Chrome Venture is approved the companies have committed to suspend layoff processes and bring back about 40% of their furnace capacity while a long-term solution is being developed, Eskom added.

million signing bonus and full cost carry (of around \$135-\$150 million) for three wells".

The chief executive at PetroSA, which holds 100% of Block 2C, pending the deal, did not immediately respond to a request for comment.

A Shell spokesperson said commercial sensitivities prevented any comment on "specific opportunities", but added the company was "continuously evaluating various portfolio options to grow our busi-

Shell is already aiming to explore along South Africa's west coast and in July was granted environmental authorisation to drill up to five deep-water wells in the Northern

Cape Ultra Deep Block in the Orange Basin.

It has not said when any drilling will begin.

In October Shell applied to appeal a high court decision blocking exploration in the west coast offshore Block 5/6/7, as a number of court cases brought by environmental groups delay planned drilling.

PetroSA, which this year was incorporated into the new South African National Petroleum Company, holds many assets, including offshore acreage and a gas-to-liquid plant at Mossel Bay in the Western Cape, which is under care and main-

But Paramount's latest attempt means the jockeying for Warner Bros and its prized HBO and DC Comics assets will not come to a conclusion swiftly.

Paramount's \$30-per-share cash offer includes financing from Affinity Partners, the investment firm run by Jared

Kushner, U.S. President Donald Trump's son-in-law, and several Middle Eastern governmentrun investment funds, and is backstopped by the Ellison family.

Larry Ellison, the world's second-richest person, is the father of Paramount head David Ellison and has close ties to the White House.

The studio argues its bid for the entirety of Warner Bros Discovery is superior to Netflix's bid, providing shareholders \$18 billion more in cash and an easier path to regulatory approval. It also argued that Paramount-Warner Bros combination would be in the best interest of the creative community, movie theaters and consumers, who would benefit from enhanced competition.

Madlanga Commission:

Tebogo Thobejane condemns killing of witness

FORMER "Muvhango" star Tebogo Thobejane has condemned the killing of Madlanga Commission witness Marius van der Merwe, who was shot on Friday, December 5, in Brakpan.

The witness's death comes after he testified before the Madlanga Commission of Inquiry last month, where he implicated the suspended Ekurhuleni Metro Police Department (EMPD) Deputy Chief, Julius Mkhwanazi. The commission is probing allegations of police interference and corruption within law enforcement structures.

Thobejane used a series of Instagram stories, which have since been deleted, to speak about the death of witness D.

She questioned the state of South Africa's justice system, saying the country continues to invest millions in the Madlanga Commission while witnesses remain exposed.

Broken

"My heart is broken. There are so many flaws in this system that it has become painful to watch. Millions are being poured into commissions while the people who have suffered under these criminals are left unprotected. Witness D's death showed us everything we needed to know," Thobejane said. Thobejane herself survived an assassination attempt in 2023. The social media star was shot in Sandton and sustained a gunshot wound on her foot after she was attacked by three men on the N1 highway. Thobejane's ex-boyfriend, Vusimuzi "Cat" Matlala, was linked to an alleged assassination attempt against her. However, Matlala has denied any involvement in this tragic incident.

Matlala is also facing allegations of police infiltration, money laundering and corruption within the justice system.

Thobejane added that Witness D's murder was further proof that the system does not prioritise people on the ground.

"The justice system does not care about ordinary citizens. Those inside the commission sit behind protected walls. We are the ones who bleed, bury, and fear for our lives. And somehow, we are told to stay calm and stop 'venting'," she wrote. IOL

When he met Buang and fell in love with her, that love completely surpassed the loyalty he had for his family." Before acting, Thandolwethu's dream was to pursue sports on the field and off the field as a commentator and presenter. Today he's fully dedicated to his craft. He goes through intense training for his scenes. There are scenes where he had to walk barefoot across the North West terrain and a scene on a bus where it was extremely hot. "By the time I stepped onto the Outlaws set, we had a stunt coordinator, Jose, who knew how to work with us. Because of my training from Shaka iLembe, I had all that muscle memory. I knew how to move, and Jose told me we didn't need extra lessons. Coming from a production with heavy stunt work helped.'

Having shared the screen with legends including Dawn Thandeka King and Slindile Nodangala means Thandolwethu learnt from the best. "Mam' Sli played a huge role in my acting career. On set she would give me notes and share insights about her craft. She was like a mother to me. Sometimes I'd watch the veterans work when I'm not in the scene. KIDNEY stones are hard objects made from chemicals in your pee.

They may be as tiny as a grain of salt or as big as a corn kernel. The stones can be brown or yellow, smooth or rough. They're a sign that you might be taking in too many minerals and not enough fluids. Sometimes, you don't have any symptoms from kidney stones. But other times, it will be obvious. Pain is the most common symptom of kidney stones. Flushing one out of your body as you pee can hurt, sometimes a lot.

Kidney Stone Pain

You may not have symptoms until the stone starts to stir. It can move around inside your kidney or into your ureter, the tube that connects your kidney to your bladder. These parts, along with your urethra (the tube taking urine from your bladder outside your body) make up your urinary tract. This illustration shows the parts of your urinary tract. (Photo Credit: iStock/Getty Images)

You may feel pain:

- ► In your side or back, below your ribs
- ► In your lower belly
- ► In your groin or testicles

The pain can shift around to different places in your body. This means the stone is making its way from your kidney through the ureter to your bladder. It might also hurt more when you pee. Your pain may range from mild to so strong that you end up in a hospital. Waves of severe pain may last from 20 minutes to an hour, before stopping for a while and then returning.

Urinary Kidney Stone Symptoms

Besides pain, you might experience the following kidney stone symptoms:

- ▶ Burning when you pee. This means a stone is near or in your bladder. It can cause a burning feeling when you urinate.
- ▶ Needing to pee more often. The kidney stone is in the lower part of your urinary tract and is irritating your bladder, causing you to have the urge to pee.
- ▶ Trouble peeing. While the kidney stone is irritating your bladder, it's also blocking your urine flow.
- ▶ Pink, red, or brown blood in your urine (hematuria). If the stone is large enough, it can irritate the lining of your urinary tract and cause it to bleed.
- ► Small stones in your pee. They're sometimes called gravel. These may or may not cause you pain.
- ► Cloudy or bad-smelling pee. The kidney stone could lead to an infection in your urinary tract.


Fever and Chills

While most of your kidney stone symptoms will be in your urinary tract, you might also get the following symptoms that affect other parts of your body:

- ▶ Fever and chills. These are signs of infection. When your immune system is fighting an infection, your body temperature rises. You may feel chilly when the fever starts and hot when the fever breaks.
- ▶ Nausea and vomiting. Kidney stones can affect nerve connections between your urinary tract and digestive system, which may result in nausea and vomiting.

Kidney Stone Symptoms in Women vs. Men

Kidney stone symptoms



Women and men have the same kidney stone symptoms with a few differences:

- ▶ Men and people with penises may have pain in the testicles or groin because the stone is near those areas.
- ▶ Women and people with vaginas may have pelvic pain or get a urinary tract infection (UTI). A kidney stone can encourage bacterial growth, and women have shorter urethras than men, which makes it easier for bacteria to reach the bladder.

Men are twice as likely as women to experience kidney stones. Scientists have been researching the reasons and point to these factors:

- ▶ **Water intake.** Men often drink less water than women. Drinking too little water is a risk factor for kidney stones.
- ▶ **Calcium intake.** A diet high in calcium lowers the risk of kidney stones, and women tend to consume more calcium than men.
- ▶ **Protein intake.** Animal protein is associated with a higher risk of kidney stones in men and older women.
- ▶ **Hormones.** Postmenopausal women are at a greater risk of kidney stones than premenopausal women, suggesting that the female hormone estrogen might have a protective effect.
- ▶ **Urinary makeup.** Men tend to have a lower urine volume and more of the minerals sodium and oxalate in their urine than women. These are all factors that raise the likelihood of kidney stones.

The number of women experiencing kidney stones is rising, which may be because of their lifestyle and dietary changes.

Kidney Stones Symptoms vs. UTI

Symptoms of kidney stones and UTIs can be similar, sometimes leaving you confused over which condition you might have.

Both conditions have the same symptoms

- ► Burning while peeing
- ► Frequent urge to pee
- ► Cloudy, bloody, or smelly urine
- ▶ Pain in your body

Here are some of the differences:

- ▶ With a kidney stone, you might have pain in your back or side. With a UTI, you might have pain in your bladder, groin, or lower abdomen.
- ► With kidney stones, your urine is more likely to contain blood.
- ▶ With a UTI, your pee is more likely to be cloudy and smell bad.
- ► With a UTI, you might have pain when having sex.
- ▶ With kidney stones, you might have fever, nausea, and vomiting if you get an infection. There's a strong connection between having UTIs and kidney stones, meaning that if you've had one of these conditions, you're at a raised risk of getting the other.

Do Bigger Stones Hurt More?

Generally, yes. If a stone gets stuck in one of your ureters, then it will cause a lot of pain. Your ureters are very narrow, only 3-4 millimeters (about 1/8 inch) wide. A big stone is more likely to get stuck there.

If the stone isn't moving through your ureter and is just sitting in your kidneys,

then it may not cause any pain even if it's big. Small stones that are on the move may cause you more pain.

How Long Can Kidney Stone Symptoms Last?

Symptoms last at least until your stones pass. So how long do stones take to pass? It depends on the size of the stone.

All in all, you might have pain and symptoms for at least a month. After the stone passes, you may still have a little residual pain and soreness from your urinary tract being irritated, but it should go away in a few days.

What Are the Symptoms of Passing a Kidney Stone?

The first one is pain. Kidney stone pain will ebb and flow with the movement (or nonmovement) of the stone. Most of the time, the pain goes away when the stone enters your bladder. Your urethra is at least twice as wide as one of your ureters, so a kidney stone shouldn't give much trouble exiting your bladder, unless it's very big.

Once your stone makes it to your bladder, your body pain usually subsides, but you might start to get bladder problems like burning and frequent pee. If your stone is very large, you might have more pain as it pushes through the urethra and out your body

Kidney Stone Pain Relief

If you've been diagnosed with kidney stones, you should:

- ▶ Drink plenty of fluids to try to flush out the stone. Aim for 2-3 quarts a day. Water is best.
- ▶ Take over-the-counter pain medication such as ibuprofen or naproxen (but ask your doctor first; NSAIDs can be harmful to your kidneys). Ask your doctor about prescription medicines like nifedipine (Adalat and Procardia) or tamsulosin (Flomax) that relax your ureter to help stones pass through.

When to See a Doctor

You should see a doctor if you have:

- ▶ Pain that prevents you from sitting comfortably
- ▶ Pain with nausea and vomiting
- Pain with fever and chillsBlood in your urine
- ▶ Problems with peeing

These are all signs that you have a kidney stone. Your doctor can do blood and urine tests and a CT scan to confirm. They'll advise whether to wait for the stone to pass on its own or take other measures. In the case of larger stones, your doctor can give you treatments to break up the stones, install a stent to make the ureter temporarily wider for easier passage, or surgically remove the stones from your body.

See your doctor right away if you have severe pain or signs of an infection or urinary blockage. **WebMD**

Salah also said there is "no relationship between us" when asked about under-fire manager Arne Slot, leaving his position in the team near-untenable.

The Egyptian added that he would say "goodbye" to Anfield after next weekend's home game against Brighton but stopped short of admitting he wants to leave, instead referencing his depature for the Africa Cup of Nations.

It feels very unlikely Salah will feature in that game either barring a dramatic change, with Liverpool moving on without him for a very

Tearful Norris takes F1 title

ABU DHABI, - McLaren's Lando Norris sobbed tears of joy and relief as he won the Formula One championship for the first time and ended Max Verstappen's four-year reign with a nervy third place at the Abu Dhabi Grand Prix on Sunday. Red Bull's Verstappen, whose eighth triumph of the campaign was one more than the new champion managed, won the season-ender with McLaren's Oscar Piastri runner-up and 12.5 seconds behind at the chequered flag. Norris, Britain's 11th Formula One world champion at the age of 26 and McLaren's eighth since 1974, took his points tally to 423 with Verstappen on 421 and Piastri third with 410.

"Thank you guys," he gasped over the team radio. "You have made my dreams

McLaren, who secured the constructors' championship in October for the second year in a row, won both titles in the same season for the first time since 1998.

"I've not cried in a while. I didn't think I would cry but I did," an emotional Norris said in the post-race interview, after also shedding tears inside his helmet on the slowing down lap around the floodlit Yas Marina circuit. "It feels amazing. I now know what Max feels like a little bit.

"I want to congratulate Max and Oscar, my two biggest competitors the whole season. It's been a pleasure to race against both of them. It's been an honour, I've learned a lot from both," he added.

Norris's mother Cisca gave Piastri a con-

soling hug while both Verstappen and the Australian congratulated McLaren's first champion since Lewis Hamilton in 2008 in a show of sportsmanship.

The victory denied Verstappen five titles in a row, a feat only Ferrari great Michael Schumacher has managed to date.

"The way we fought back in the second half of the season, we can be really, really proud of that," said the Dutch driver, who was 104 points behind then-leader Piastri at the end of August, over the radio to his team.

"So, don't be too disappointed. I'm definitely not disappointed. I'm really proud of everyone for not giving up."

LIV Golf CEO says informal talks with PGA Tour ongoing, no deal imminent

LIV Golf CEO Scott O'Neil has said informal conversations between the Saudi-funded circuit and the PGA Tour are continuing but any hope of ending the sport's longest-running civil war is not currently on the ho-

O'Neil maintains regular contact with PGA Tour CEO Brian Rolapp, a friend and former business-school classmate, but said their communication has not brought any meaningful progress towards finalising the framework agreement the two circuits announced in June 2023 before either were in their current role.

"The reality is we continue to have conversations, and Brian and I do have a relationship - we text, we talk relatively regularly," O'Neil told Reuters during an interview from LIV Golf's New York of-

"We are not in any serious negotiation at this point. We both believe that there are opportunities to work together, and we both believe that there is plenty of space in golf. We at LIV Golf are intently focused on developing LIV Golf around the world."

LIV Golf, which held its inaugural event in June 2022, has shaken up the golf world like never before and, with the help of mega-money contracts and lucrative purses, has lured several top names from the PGA Tour into its stable of players. LIV players

include the likes of Bryson DeChambeau -- considered golf's greatest showman -and fellow major champions Jon Rahm, Dustin Johnson and Brooks Koepka.

After a year of acrimony, the PGA Tour, Europe-based DP World Tour and Saudi backers of LIV Golf announced in June 2023 a framework agreement to house their commercial operations in a new entity but have failed to reach a definitive agreement.

The divide has even captured the attention of U.S. President Donald Trump, an avid golfer who was part of two meetings on the matter at the White House in February when there was optimism that the schism between LIV Golf and the PGA Tour would soon be resolved.

O'Neil said he still felt LIV Golf should "do something" with the PGA Tour but did not elaborate on what any sort of agreement would look like. He also did not give details on when, or if, the two sides plan to meet next, a stance he said he shared with Rolapp. "We both agreed that we are going to keep all that stuff between the two of us," said O'Neil. "If there is ever anything to report we'll report it." When it comes to LIV's ongoing bid for world ranking points, which are considered critical given the majors use them to help determine their fields, O'Neil is hopeful a decision on the matter could happen in the coming weeks. (**Reuters**)


'Feeling strong and fit' Miller said his time away from the game, to nurse a hamstring niggle, was good in the sense it allowed him to reflect on himself and his career.



CAPITAL CITY GIANTS HEAD COACH 'FLOORED':

Ernest condemns E100 000 fine scuffle

PUNCHED or pushed to the floor, someone has to pay the PLE big bucks - a maximum E100 000 fine is a possibility.

PLE stands for Premier League of Eswatini. Following a half-time drama at Mavuso Sports Centre, Manzini on Sunday between army outfit Young Buffaloes and capital city giants Mbabane Highlanders, the latter's head coach Ernest Mavuso found himself down on the floor after falling off during the scuffle under the tunnel to the dressing rooms. Officials and players got involved, some appearing to be aggressively manhandling the other and hurling all sorts of insults. Sparking this was one of the marshals who the away team accused of blocking their way, suspecting him of using foreign substances where their players would pass. While police, some of both teams' officials, and PLE representatives were quick to intervene and separated the warring factions.

Some claimed to have been slapped in the midst of the scuffle that could see the teams charged and fined up to E100 000. This is according to Article 35 of the PLE Master Rules providing for such misconduct. A near similar case of misconduct between Buffaloes and Moneni Pirates in Mayaluka, Big Bend, got the former fined E40 000, with E20 000 suspended but they can not be charged and found guilty for a similar case until the end of the season, or it will get worse. "It's very bad for our football that we have to

fight over a passage. We can't condone such but condemn it in the best possible way.

"We can't have a tunnel scuffle. We dont encourage it. Otherwise, I don't know how the scuffle involved me, but I got pushed as I was trying to open up space," he said. Mavuso said he missed his step during the pushing and shoving that was happening in the scuffle and fell. "I lost balance from the push I got during the scuffle and suddenly found myself rolling on the floor," he said. Mavuso then congregated his team and man of the match winner Msimisi Zwane.

"We have been working hard on the team cohesion, and in this game, it showed because we scored two, but there's still room for improvement," he said. He said they would definitely be beefing up the squad in the upcoming second transfer window. Mavuso will, on Wednesday, lead his team against Ubombo Sugar at the same venue, Mavuso Sports Centre, in the first match of two MTN Premier League fixtures. There was no immediate comment from PLE. However, it is anticipated that the PLE Chief Executive Officer (CEO) will soon be in a position to state if any of the two teams are getting charged for the misconduct.
